All Saints' Patronal Festival:

The Saints' Day appropriate to this Church is All Saints' Day which falls on 1st November each year. This is our special day in the Church's year, and we mark it by celebrating our Patronal Festival on the nearest Sunday, which this year is November 2nd.

Special services have been arranged and there will be two guest preachers. At 11 a.m., we will be pleased to have the Rev. Cecil W. Dillon, Rector of St. Andrew's, Strathfield, while at Evensong, we will welcome the Rev. Edward Storey, Rector of St. Stephen's, Hurlstone Park. The Rector sincerely trusts that, because of the importance of the day, and the willingness of these two speakers to join in our celebrations, each parishioner will make a determined effort to attend an extra service on this day.

The Rector will speak at the 8 a.m. Service of Holy Communion.

Y.C.I. Commemoration Service:

The Annual Service to mark the formation of our Y.C.I. (Young Churchmen's Institute) in November, 1910, will take place on Sunday, 23rd November at 7 p.m. Guest preacher will be the Rev. F. A. J. Eglington, Th.L., Deputy Senior Chaplain to the Mission to Seamen.

Known as the Y.C.I. Commemoration Service, a good attendance of Y.C.I. members is hoped for; some will be taking part in the Service. "The Messiah"

1969 CONFIRMATION

The Right Rev. A. J. Dain, Bishop Coadjutor, administered the Sacred Rite of Confirmation to 28 candidates from All Saints' on Tuesday, 21st October. The Bishop gave a practical and inspiring address to the confirmees, based on the text from part of verses 11 and 12 of chapter 6 of Paul's First Epistle to Timothy, which reads:

"But thou, O man of God, flee these things; and follow after righteousness. Fight the good fight of faith."

Bishop Dain said that although Paul wrote this Epistle when he was in Prison, chained continuously to a Roman soldier, and facing a martyr's death, it revealed no complaints by Paul about himself, but good practical advice to his young friend, Timothy.

The Bishop explained the text under four headings.

"Thou, O man of God."

First, we are called to be men and women: boys and girls of God. As such, we must live as men of God would live, looking into our own lives, reminding ourselves of our own failures, and seeking God's pardon for our shortcomings. The rest of the text guides those seeking to be men of God.

"Flee these things"

Paul says we must shun evil, because it is all too evident in the world of today how much sorrow, harm, and difficulties befall those who do not shun it. For example, in the previous verse, Paul has said that "the love of money is the root of all evil." Bishop Dain added that money itself is neutral—it can do good or evil as we choose—but it is the love of it, or greed, which is really bad, and must be shunned.

"Follow after Righteousness".

Paul now turns to a positive instruction: seek righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, and meekness. The Christian must commit himself to follow all of these in his daily life.

"Fight the Good Fight."

This is the teaching of the whole of the New Testament: fight the battle of Christ on earth. The modern translation of the Bible expresses it "Run the great race." but it is still a struggle or contest that the Christian must engage in to overcome the evil that he will face in life. Just as one cannot be a good soldier without discipline, nor a good athlete without discipline, so one cannot be a good Christian without disciplining himself to follow consistently what we have been taught. This will include daily prayer, daily bible reading, weekly Church attendance, and consistent participation in the Holy Communion service.

By turning from evil, and fighting for what we know is good and right, we can be Christ's until life's end.

This year, we are hoping to equal last year's wonderful record takings of \$3,626. Indeed, what a wonderful thrill it would be for us all if we could surpass this figure. Main aim of the fete this year is to bridge the gap between the Church's annual income and expenditure, caused by the continuing loss of parishioners from this district and the consequent fall in offertories.

In fact, in the last financial year of the Church, the net proceeds of the Fete were just on 33% of Church and Parish Hall revenue. This shows that if we didn't have an annual fete, All Saints' could not carry on financially.

We have been richly blessed in every fete we have held over the past 13 years, and with your help, we look forward with great confidence to attaining our goal this time. Please do all you can to help the great effort, support the various stalls and entertainments, and by your attendance, make this another happy and prosperous day for All Saints' and for yourselves.

For several reasons, there will be many workers from past fetes who, unfortunately, will not be with us this year. They must be replaced, however, if we are to keep up our figures, and we appeal especially to folk in the following categories to come forward and fill the gaps in our ranks:

- Parishioners not active in former years;
- Those who attended but did not work on the stalls;
- Newcomers to the Parish.

Performing Dogs

Free shows by Arthur Rep's team of performing dogs will take place in the grounds at 2.30 p.m. and 3.30 p.m. These dogs put on a colossal performance at our 1967 fete, when they attracted great crowds; they have also appeared on television.

The dogs have been described as "amazing," "colossal" and "almost human." They can even count and talk. If you don't believe these claims, make sure you're at the fete to check them.

Other Great Attractions

The following additional entertainment will be provided:

- Merry-go-Round and Trackless Train rides all day;
- Sydney Ladies' Pipe Band will march and play from 2 p.m.
- Burwood Police Boys' Band will play during the morning.
- Hoopla and other games of skill: lots of prizes.
- All attending, including workers, are eligible to sign the visitor's book and have a chance of winning one of the two big poultry dinners and grocery hampers.

Here is the latest news from stallholders:

● **Books, Books, Books:** Mrs. Reid is busy sorting out the books with the help of Mrs. J. Fagg, and reports some really good reading matter. Recent donations include magazines, paper backs (new), sport, fishing, boating, gardening, good housekeeping, medical, cooking, educational comics, etc. There will be a book to suit you amongst the fantastic stocks.

Bring the children and browse through. Books will be on sale from one cent. You may find a GEM.

● **Toys:** Manned by the Fellowship, this stall will have a wide range of stock for children of all ages. The young folk have been working through the year, but it is not too late to send along donations; toys needing minor repairs especially welcomed.

● **Refreshments:** Any donation of sandwich fillings, cakes, scones and biscuits would be very much appreciated. Mrs. Champion would be grateful if intending donors could let her know a few days before the fete, as this will greatly assist in obtaining the remainder of the provisions needed.

● **Vegetables:** The proceeds from the Car Drive will be used to buy a large stock of fresh vegetables direct from the Chinese gardens at Arncliffe on the morning of the Fete. At this time of the year, they usually have lettuce, spinach, rhubarb, beetroot, carrots, shallots, celery, radishes, potatoes and pumpkin. Additional gifts of home grown fruit and vegetables from parishioners would be most welcome, and could be left at the Hall on Friday night or at the stall on Saturday morning.

● **White Elephant:** This is the famous stall that sells what other people don't want, and which has achieved remarkable sales figures in past years by disposing of items donated by parishioners. This year two marquees outside the front of the Parish Hall will be crammed full of wonderful bargains. Even if you cannot help any other stall with a donation, there must be something at your home that you no longer need, or which is in the way. Just contact Mrs. Humphreys or any Y.C.I. Member, or the Rectory, and collection will be arranged.

● **Groceries:** The Sunday School enrolment is continually dropping and some problems have been experienced in securing as big a stock as last year, so that any further donations will be gratefully received. The scholars are now conducting a drive for packet and bottled groceries—gifts may be sent along to Sunday School with the children, or left at the stall on the Friday night or Saturday morning. Every little helps.

● Mrs. I. Clark extends her sincere thanks to all who have helped her with donations of wool, etc., for her Fancy Work Stall. Any further gifts of left-over wool would be appreciated.

● **Clocks and Watches:** Mr. Arthur Cook is grateful for the many donations he has received. He will have a wide selection of new and used clocks for sale, as well as new and used watches. All used items have been overhauled and are in tip-top condition. By the way, Mr. Cook's appeal for old gold is still open, and you can even let him have it on fete day. Top market prices are now available, and all proceeds will go to fete funds.

● **Girl Guides Stall:** We welcome back the Girl Guides' Stall this year. Among the attractions will be a lucky dip with lots of wonderful prizes for the girls and boys.

THE FIRST EPISTLE GENERAL OF PETER



The first letter of Peter was addressed to a number of Christian congregations in different parts of the ancient world, generally situated in what is now called Turkey. As Peter was not writing to one particular group, his letter had a wide appeal and application, and one which makes it universally relevant to the Church.

The main purposes of the letter are two-fold. There is no doubt that the congregations to whom St. Peter wrote were under threat of fierce persecution and the letter was aimed at their encouragement.

However, the author not only addresses himself to this particular threat but reinforces his encouragement by re-instating the fundamental convictions of the faith into which his readers had been converted. Indeed, the rehearsal of basic Christian teaching is so recurrent throughout the letter that a number of scholars have suggested that the letter, or parts of it, were used as a "sermon" or "exhortation" at baptisms. Whatever the particular reason for the letter, it speaks to its readers in this two-fold way. First, as an instruction or reminder as to the nature of the faith which the reader holds, and second, it brings powerful words of encouragement whether the difficulties facing the reader are those of direct persecution, or adversity of a personal kind.

The writer returns constantly to the sufferings and death of Jesus Himself and reinforces his arguments by references to Jesus' death and victorious resurrection. His destruction of the power and claims of sin, and the example of righteousness and steadfastness which He left for men. Far from being an abstract theological treatise, Peter deals with the difficulties confronting his readers in their domestic lives; the problems of being a good citizen in a pagan empire; how a Christian wife should live and deal with a pagan husband; how ill-treated slaves should accept the consequences of their bondage and how elders or ministers within the churches should exercise their ministry.

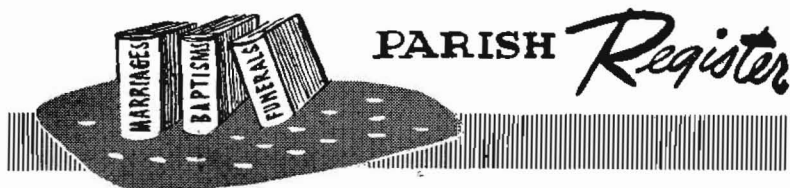
Behind all that the Apostle writes there is the great thought which is introduced to us in the opening verse of the Letter. Peter addresses his readers as exiles, strangers and pilgrims. He saw his readers, as every Christian must see himself, as one whose true home lies outside his present world and culture. We are called to live positively as good citizens within a world which is passing away. Our true country, our real citizenship lies elsewhere and when that kingdom is established the sufferings and persecutions of the present time will be a faded memory swallowed up in the glory of the Kingdom which Peter saw ready to be revealed at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

* * *
