## THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,  
31st October, 1948.

Dear People of All Saints',

Writing to you at the close of this year's Patronal Festival, prompts me to say that whilst we are grateful for the inspiration of this day's services, it is difficult to understand why people, who claim to belong to All Saints', cannot be present at their parish Church's Festival. Of course, had there been a Confirmation here this year, to-day would have been the first Communion for the Confirmees, but even making allowances for this, there are still numbers of others who ought to have been in their Church to-day, and were not. The loss is yours as well as ours; for it points to a lack of loyalty on the part of some whom we might reasonably expect to join in the All Saints' Festival; and your absence takes away from us the complete fellowship which All Saints' people should have on All Saints' Day, or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Once again, we have to thank the Choir for the well-rendered services and appropriate music throughout the day. Proportionately speaking, our Choir members attend far better than does the congregation. Most of them are here three times on a festival Sunday, whilst some parishioners cannot manage even once! Thanks also to Mrs. T. H. Bosward and Miss E. Olofsson, who were responsible for the Church flowers.

We thank General Osborne and the Rev. J. R. Le'Huray, who were the occasional preachers, for their very helpful addresses, and the Rev. Graham Delbridge, for his assistance at the Celebration. We will all remember the General's quotation in reply to the question: "What makes a Saint a Saint?" This was the answer given:

"Because they were cheerful when it was hard to be cheerful,

Patient when it was hard to be patient,

Because they pushed on when they wished to stand still,

They kept silent when they wished to talk,

They were agreeable when they wished to be disagreeable.

That was all."

That takes some doing! The Saints would certainly add that it was their Lord who inspired and gave them the grace to be cheerful, patient, persevering, considerate and charitable. Still, the answer is, insofar as it goes, significantly apt and true. Saints were not, as some suppose, born Saints—they became, or were made, Saints. They grew to be Saints because they did not meander aimlessly through life, but with unswerving and consistent decision, they chose the one and only highway of obedience to God—the way of sacrifice and self-surrender.

All Saints' Day brings with it the fond memory of at least one person who has commended himself or herself to one's own knowledge and remembrance as being in reality a true Saint of God. Surely most of us have known more than one such person; some of us, perhaps more privileged than others, have known many, whom, in spite of all weaknesses, in spite of all failings, falterings and falls, we should call true Christian Saints. Whilst All Saints' Day encourages us to remember with thanksgiving those Saints, it also must remind us of the Maker of Saints, whose life, whose Living Spirit lives on from age to age in the lives of His creatures, their living ideal, their unfailing inspiration, their living and abiding source of strength.

We are approaching the end of another Church year, November 28th being the first Sunday in Advent. The urgency of the Advent call to "Awake" is doubly real in these anxious and troubled, yet challenging days. It calls us back to the source of our strength, and bids us prepare for Christmas, which stands for the birth of Divine life in human conditions,


the light of heaven breaking through the darkness of earth, and the possibility of real contact with God, not only in our exalted moments, but in the difficult business of ordinary, everyday life. No longer can we say that God is so high we cannot attain unto Him, for through the Coming of Christ, God has entered into personal relations with men.

It is a world-wide custom to observe the eve of St. Andrew's Day as a day of continuous prayer for the Missionary work of the Church. We shall, therefore, keep **Monday, November 29th**, as a day of Intercession, commencing with a Celebration of Holy Communion at 7.30 a.m., and concluding with Evening Prayer at 5 p.m. If you would care to join in this Day of Prayer, will you please put your name down on the roster you will find in the Church porch, indicating the period for which you will be available, so that the continuity of prayer may be preserved throughout the day.

We commend to your consideration and action, Bishop Pilcher's commendation, which follows this letter. The needed eighteen per cent. increase is going to be met, not by a few people doing a lot, but by a lot of people doing a little. Of course, we take boxes and envelopes for Missions during Lent, as we should; but are we doing anything regularly? Have you a Missionary box? If not, will you take one, and help to do our part towards finding the additional amount so urgently required?

We join with many others in extending our welcome to His Grace the Archbishop and Mrs. Mowll.

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**COMMENDATION FROM THE RIGHT REVEREND BISHOP PILCHER,  
COMMISSARY**

The Chairman of the Australian Board of Missions, Bishop Cranswick, has written to me in common with other Bishops and Administrators of Dioceses drawing attention to the urgent tasks the Board is faced with in providing for the minimum needs of its South-West Pacific Missions in the current year. These needs are greatly swollen by increasing costs and the attempts being made by the Missionaries to meet some of the opportunities for development which are challenging them on all sides. Every Mission under the Board has been compelled to ask for a larger grant this year and Bishop Cranswick adds:

"If it were not for the fact that the Missionaries themselves are living on the smallest possible amounts and are economising in every possible way the amounts asked for would have been much larger."

The whole Church in Australia is asked to enable the Board to meet the situation presented in these opportunities and challenges by increasing its giving to Missions by 18 per cent. more in the year which began on 1st June. On this basis our own Diocese has been asked to raise for the A.B.M. £835 additional, which would make the total asked for this year £5,855.

It will be the duty of the Rev. A. J. A. Fraser, the Secretary of A.B.M. in New South Wales, to bring the Board's request before the Church people in those parishes where he is invited to preach or speak, and in so doing he will have my warmest approval and prayers.

**C. of E. Immigration Bureau.**—The Director writes as follows:—Next year, the Commonwealth Public Service is bringing out young women from England to take up employment in the various Commonwealth offices in Sydney. Starting in January, 10 typists and 6 female assistants will



arrive every month. These girls are being specially selected by Australia House, London. As a high proportion of them will be Church of England girls, the C. of E. Immigration Bureau has been asked whether members of our congregations in suburban areas would be willing to accommodate girls for, say, a period of six months, until they are able to find accommodation for themselves. If any parishioner is willing to accommodate one or more of these young women, would she please send details to the C. of E. Immigration Bureau, St. Andrew's Cathedral (MA 2927), Sydney. Major-General Osborne also asks whether any parishioner could find accommodation for the following family: Mr. W. E. Gutteridge, aged 36, wife and two children (boy 6, girl 4½). Mr. Gutteridge is a Production Foreman Engineer employed by Austral Bronze Co. Pty. Ltd., of O'Riorden Street, Alexandria. He arrived in Australia 18 months ago, and has been employed in the Company's factory at Hobart, but has just been transferred to Sydney. His wife and children are due to arrive in Sydney at the end of October, and he is unable to find accommodation for them. He had previously secured accommodation at Hobart. Mr. Gutteridge was formerly a parishioner of Perry Barr Parish Church, Birmingham, and has attended St. Mary's, Moonah, for the past 18 months, where he was an enthusiastic member of Toc H. He served in the Artillery during the war.
