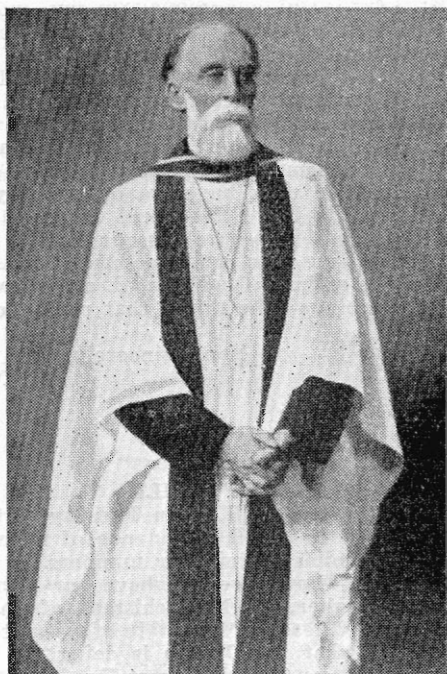

### Y.C.I.

Y.C.I. "Manuscript Journal"—Our Men's Club, the Y.C.I. includes in its Syllabus of Meetings a "Manuscript Journal" night each quarter. The articles contributed by members deal with various matters and frequently there appear matters of general interest to parishioners so we propose publishing some from time to time. Here is the first article.

#### Loyalty

One of my dictionaries defines loyalty as the state of being faithful in allegiance to ones Sovereign or Country, but to me this seems rather too restricted. I prefer the briefer definition in another dictionary, which defines loyalty as faithfulness, and brief as it is, a larger field is

covered. Loyalty to God, to one's Church, Choir, Sunday School or organisation and last but not least, loyalty to ones Employer, family and friends. There is really no limit to the area of loyalty.

Here we enjoin our members to be loyal to the Y.C.I. and thank God that many have shown loyalty throughout the years, otherwise the the Institute would not be in existence to-day. As with loyalty to one's country here is, unfortunately, a minority unconcerned about the need for loyalty and are quite unmindful of the meaning of loyalty and duty. We generally find that those members who are loyal to the Y.C.I. are loyal to the Church. Those who are apathetic towards Y.C.I. adopt a similar attitude to the Church. Few of the latter would like to see either the Y.C.I. or the Church go out of existence but, nevertheless, their disregard of the appeal for regular attendance at meetings indicates that they do nothing to help keep our organisations intact.

A writer stated in a recent issue of the "Journal" that some of the people who refer to "dear old All Saints" never attend the services nor do they help financially. The same attitude is to be found among some Y.C.I. members, fortunately, only a few, in their lip service to our Institute. Loyalty to the Y.C.I. goes hand in hand with loyalty to your pals in the Y.C.I. If you help those who are doing a job for the Institute you show loyalty to them as well as to the Y.C.I. Not only with the Institute, but with other Parochial organisations and our Choir we could do with more loyalty from more members.

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### ALMOST 200 ATTEND DIOCESAN RALLY

The first annual Diocesan Rally was held at the Church of England Conference Centre, "Gilbulla" at Menangle, on Saturday, 10th October. It was a most successful Rally. Following lunch, a service of Prayer and Thanksgiving was held on the lawns of "Gilbulla". A special form of service was used. The Cathedral Choir led the singing and the service was conducted by the Dean and the Deputy Registrar. The Archbishop gave the address and passed on some startling facts concerning the growth of the Diocese over the past year. Because of the many requests to print these facts we have set them out in this issue of the Newsletter.

#### Growth of the Diocese of Sydney

From 1st January, 1957 to October 1958

##### (a) Population Growth.

Present Anglican Population—1 Million.

1833—1 clergyman to 3,000 of total population.

1958—1 clergyman to 3,800 Anglicans.

Needs: The greatest need in all these areas is manpower. Following investigations carried out by the Anglican Building Crusade, many new sites have been purchased and new buildings erected through assistance given by the New Housing Areas Assessment Fund, Church Buildings Loan Fund and the Church of England Endowment Fund and more recently the new Finance and Loans Board.

**New Districts:** It has been usual for a new District to be formed from a well-established Parish but during the period under review, two Provisional Parishes and one Provisional District have been divided, e.g.:

The Provisional District of Villawood: In April, 1955 the new Provisional District of Villawood was formed. On 1st April, 1957 (only two years later) the new Provisional District of Yagoona was formed from Villawood.

New Districts formed are:—

St. Mark's, Yagoona—1st April, 1957.

St. Clement's, Jannali with Como—6th March, 1958.

St. Paul's, Gymea with Gymea Bay—1st April, 1958.

Holy Trinity, Bexley North—1st April, 1958.

Heathcote with Engadine—1st April, 1958.

St. Luke's, Regents Park—1st April, 1958.

St. George, Marsfield—1st April, 1958

and since the Rally—

St. Stephen's, Villawood with Bass Hill and George's Hall—1st December, 1958

St. Philip's, Caringbah—1st December, 1958.

St. Bede's, Beverley Hills—1st January, 1958.

Buildings: 19 Church Halls have been dedicated at—Bamaderry in the Parish of Nowra; Clempton Park in the Parish of Sth. Canterbury; Cringilla in the Parish of Port Kembla; East Fairfield in District of Villawood; Fairymeadow in the Parish of Corrimall; Littleton in the Parish of Lithgow; St. Peters, Mortdale; St. Mark's, Narwee; St. Luke's, Mascot; North Springwood; St. Timothy, Narraweenah; St. Mark's, Reesby; Primbee in the Parish of Port Kembla; St. Philip's, South Turrumurra; West Pennant Hills; West Strathfield in District of Homebush-Flemington; Warilla in Parish of Jamberoo; St. Andrews Larra Bay; and extensions to St. Bede's Church Hall at Beverley Hills

Five new Churches have been licensed.

School Chapels have been dedicated at Barker College, Hornsby; and Trinity Grammar School at Summer Hill.

The Army Chapel at Ingleburn has been re-designed and dedicated as the St. Stephen's Garrison Chapel.

Finance: 23 centres have received loans from the New Housing Area Assessment Fund—Total Amount Loaned, £15,400.

#### (b) Training.

Moore College—1957 commenced with an enrolment of 90 students; 101 students in 1958.

Deaconess House—1957, 36 students; 1958, 39 students.

Lay Training Courses—over 1500 enrolled. An increased number applying for Parochial and Diocesan Readers Licence.

#### (c) Evangelism.

The Board of Diocesan Missions has organised and run over 60 Parish Missions. Two large area missions have been conducted.

C.E.N.E.F. Youth Centre and Youth Department. The Centre has been used by an increasing number of young people.

Port Hacking: Rathane and Chaldercot—Accommodation has been doubled following alterations and additions.

Camp Howard: First cabin opened in 1958; 7 cabins now in process of erection, 8 more have been planned and will be in process before Christmas. Dining Room also in course of construction. Camp should be completed in 1959 and will accommodate 6000 per annum.

"Blue Gum Lodge" was opened this year. This is a Youth Centre replacing "Shuna" which was destroyed by bush fire.

Television: Church of England Television Society set up by Ordinance in June, 1957. The Society is jointly responsible for a total of 6 half-hourly programmes each month.
