## THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,  
31st August, 1942.

Dear People of All Saints':

The Consecration Festival of 1942 is over and remains but a memory; though a very happy memory. We had perfect weather throughout, very good congregations and well-rendered, inspiring services. I should like to add my appreciation to that recorded by our Choir Secretary, of the members of St. Clement's, Marrickville, Choir, who combined with us so felicitously at Evensong, adding a word of commendation of our own choristers for their uniformly good work throughout the day. We are most grateful to the Rev. Ian Shevill and the Rev. C. E. Hulley for their very helpful addresses at the Communion Breakfast and at Evensong respectively. We record our thanks to those good people who provided and served an excellent breakfast—where they obtained potatoes for so many in these days of shortage is something we haven't dared to ask! We, at the Rectory, are especially grateful to Mrs. Reilly, Mrs. Gill, Miss Watkins and Miss Lucas, who took over all the responsibility and preparation during my sister's enforced absence.

You will be glad to know that this year's Special Appeal (in lieu of a fete) is already ahead of last year—having reached £155/10/7. There are still some boxes outstanding, and perhaps there are some parishioners who have not yet been able to return the Special Envelopes issued with last month's "Chronicle," so the total should mount a little higher. The Churchwardens join me in wholeheartedly thanking **ALL**, who by their special gifts have enabled us to face the liabilities of our Parish Hall debt for a sixth year without a fete.

The Festival Tea, always a successful parish function, was even more so this year; the attendance being greater than any previous year. On all sides one hears appreciative comment on our Parish Festival Tea. Mr. Harold Lobb (organist of St. Clement's, Marrickville) gave a most enjoyable Recital after the Tea, and, after Evensong, an attractive programme was presented in the Parish Hall, when the Misses Byrne, Middleton, Norma Calver and Master Cecil Davey were the soloists, and "Weirdo" again entertained us in fine style; Mrs. Clifton Smith and Mrs. Davey kindly acting as accompanists. Sir Bertram Stevens, recently returned from India, was the principal speaker, and we are grateful to him for a very vivid picture of some of the people and places of that great land which is so prominent in the world situation of to-day. When Mr. T. A. Willmott (now of Roseville) spoke of this Festival marking the Jubilee of his association with All Saints', Petersham, Mrs. Donald Robertson, then and there, generously donated £5 in honour of this record. After Mr. E. C. King had spoken on the progress of the Special Appeal and thanked parishioners for their response, the Festival was brought to a close. We are most grateful to **ALL** who helped to make it so successful.

Will you please note that on Sunday, September 6, we revert to **Evening Service**, commencing at a quarter-past seven. The mid-week service will also be held in the evening, and commences at a quarter to eight each Wednesday. Possibly more people will find the Sunday evening a more convenient time than the afternoon. My own conviction is, that if we **want to**, we can make almost any hour convenient for worship. All kinds of things are being done now on Sundays; things which could be done on other days of the week. While we continue to flout God—His Day, His House, His Word, the first act on a Day of Prayer should surely be an act of Penitence. "The fool hath said in his heart 'there is no God'"—that, says Leslie Weatherhead, is not a reference to an atheist. Judaism knew none. The fool to whom the Psalmist refers is the man who has got into the way of acting as though there were no God. The same writer points out that the factors which have given Britain her spiritual strength and enabled her to win the admiration of the whole world, are factors which lie behind the guarding of one day for the things

of God. Power in a nation, as in an individual, is not merely physical but spiritual, and needs all the spiritual support it can get.

Although nothing is quite definite at the moment of writing, I expect we shall be losing Mr. Nicholls very soon. The Bishop of New Guinea is willing for him to proceed to that diocese as soon as possible, and he will probably conclude his ministry here about mid-September. He will take with him our prayers and good wishes as he goes forth to serve in a Missionary Diocese in one of the danger areas of the Pacific.

It was with deep regret we heard the news of the tragic death of the Duke of Kent. The sympathies of British people throughout the world will go out to the Duchess of Kent and her children, to the King and Queen, the Queen Mother and all the Royal family. They have ever been close to their people, but this great sorrow brings them even closer and emphasises the nearness of the Royal Family to the people in this war.

Wednesday, September 16, the first of the Ember-days in September, will be observed in this parish as a day of continuous prayer. Prayer will begin with Holy Communion at half-past seven and will then be continued silently up to the service in the evening.

**Quarterly Offertory.**—The last Sunday in September, the twenty-seventh, will be our Quarterly Offertory Sunday.

**The Y.C.I.**—At the meeting of the Y.C.I. of August 28, 1917, Mr. L. C. Calver was elected Hon. Secretary, and at the meeting held on August 28, 1942, marked the completion of twenty-five years of his occupancy of that position. It is recognised that this is a unique record, that must be unrivalled in the whole diocese, and those associated with the Institute are proud of the achievement. At the meeting of August 28, 1942, friends and former members of the Y.C.I. joined with the present members in paying tribute to Mr. Calver for his service and his unflagging enthusiasm over the years, and the part he has played in linking young men of the Parish with the Church.

The Rector, in speaking of the matter, said that out of his work for the Institute had come the subsequent honour of election as People's

Warden of the Parish. Mr. E. C. King congratulated Mr. Calver upon the record he has established and said it was refreshing in these days to find a man prepared to sacrifice time and energy for the advantage of others and assured the Institute of their fortune in the possession of such a personality as their Secretary.

Among other speakers was Mr. F. J. Kinnings, brother of the former secretary (who was tragically killed during the Railway strike of 1917), who expressed his pride of the association between his own sons and Mr. Calver from boyhood and in being associated with a Church organisation in which a man had given such signal service.

Messages of goodwill and acknowledgment were received from absent members, many of whom are away in the fighting forces, all bearing witness to the esteem in which Mr. Calver is held, and to the fact that due to his work their pleasure in Y.C.I. membership has been enriched.

Occasion was taken to make a presentation to Mr. Calver. One of the pleasing features of the presentation was that it was contributed to by members away in the forces (and consequently from all parts of the world) and from many old friends of the Institute, which is tangible proof of the appreciation of his work. A charming gesture of the evening was the gift of a book, on behalf of the sister of the late Secretary, which was a presentation to her brother during his membership of the Y.C.I. During supper opportunity was taken by members to personally congratulate Mr. Calver upon his years of work.—D.B.H.
