RECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

My Dear Friends and Parishioners,

I welcome you to this 84th Annual Meeting of the Vestry of this Parish. This is the first meeting that I have had the honour of presenting the Annual Report. You will remember that last year Mr. Calver carried out that duty in a very able manner. This meeting is a very important one, and reminds us of the democratic nature of our Church. At this vestry meeting any adult parishioner who is a full member of the church is entitled to speak, vote, and can be elected to office in the church. The meaning of full member is, the person (man or woman) of the age of twenty-one years, and is confirmed. It is the parishioners opportunity to direct, approve, or disapprove the actions of their elected representatives for the past year, and to place their wishes and directions before the incoming Parish Council. It should be remembered that as in the parliaments of our country the elected church officers represent you for the ensuing year in the councils of this parish, and on the Synod and Nomination Board of the Diocese.

The elected representatives have a responsible position, a position of trust and great importance. They are to assist the Rector in his Cure of the Parish, and to make provision for the extension of the Kingdom of God under his leadership. It is not always recognised that an office in the Church of God is a distinct honour and privilege to the holder. They at once associate themselves with their Lord and Master Jesus Christ, and are pledged to carry out His commands.

The world to-day is facing a time of crisis. I believe that our way of life is in the balance of judgment, will it be found wanting. We who pride ourselves on the democratic way of life must as Churchmen see to it, that it does not lose its Spiritual content. It is idle to talk of democracy freedom, liberty and social well-being unless they are based on the Christian Faith which is the chief corner stone of our way of life. I believe that democracy is a God given way of life, it came into being when God made man, in His own Image, and endowed him with the greatest gift that life possesses, the gift of a Free Will. That gift was given at tremendous risk, and the sad story of the human race is wrapped up in the fact that man has abused the gift and the Giver. The gift carries with it responsibility, and that responsibility is laid upon us all, from the beginning, the responsibility of knowing how God wants that gift to be used. God seeks our co-operation in making that will known to humanity. That is the task of the Church, and here at Petersham we can do our part in seeing that our way of life does not lose its usefulness, by losing its Spiritual content. Democracy without its author, God, becomes an empty shell, a vacuum which will not meet the crisis of our age. We see the Way, the Truth, and the Life in the person of Christ. He is the way through the giant problem of disorder that has been created in the world, by the greatest strategist of all time (the Devil) who has had it very much His own way because he has fooled humanity into the belief that man alone can solve the riddle of the world. Men are slowly realising that we live in community, not the community of a classless society as pictured by

Marx and his Communists, but a fellowship of love, as taught by God in Christ. Community is not founded on human evolution but by the Divine intervention of God. It had its beginning in the old Israel who rejected it, in the people of "the Presence" who failed to fulfill their destiny. God therefore founded the new Israel, the Christian Church, the body of Christ, and that tremendous privilege and challenging call comes to you and to me to-night to witness to the truth in Christ, for it is the only Hope of the World. In the dark hour of our times, Christ is the only Light than can illuminate the Way for us.

I would like to take this opportunity of saying how much Mrs. Johnson, Howard, Patricia and I appreciated the very warm welcome we received on taking up our work here, and the preparations that were made for the Induction Service.

This year has been a busy one, and we have found much joy and interest working with the various organisations of the parish. It has been a great pleasure to see increased attendances at Church, and also a corresponding increase in the income of the Parish so that for the first time in many years our worthy Treasurer will be able to report that we finished with a small credit balance instead of a substantial debit on the General Funds. I believe that the Duplex Envelope system has helped considerably, and we need to increase our membership of this system of direct giving. Will you all encourage it and seek to interest someone in it.

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DISTRICT VISITORS

We are indebted to these ladies for a very wonderful effort this year, they have been responsible for raising the sum of £515. Their task is not easy but they have stuck to it and we do want them to realise that we appreciate their work very much. There is a great need for new workers in this field, and much more could be done. For instance it would be a great advantage if a Church of England person in their own street would take on that street and collect and deliver the Chronicle each month. Our income could be doubled from this source and I hope that we can organise it. It has been found useful to have a Secretary for the District Visitors and who would organise and watch the situation each month.

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GUILD

During the year our women's Guild has worked hard, especially for the Fete, their stalls being a great success. They also paid another twenty-five pounds into the Hall Fund, and have helped the Ladies' Home Mission Union, and the Home of Peace. We appreciate their work and look forward to their help and co-operation in the future. The Guild bought linen which Mrs. Bosward kindly made up into veils for the Communion Vessels.

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YOUNG MARRIEDS' CLUB

The members have held regular meetings throughout the year and have run several functions to aid the finances of the Church, and helped in catering for functions, also by taking stalls at the Fete and helping with the Sunday School Picnic. We thank them for their help and co-operation during the past year.

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CHOIR

The Choir, under the able direction of our Organist and Choirmaster, Mr. Rowland Eagar, has upheld worthily the tradition, and standard of music that All Saints' is noted for. I would like to express my thanks to Mr. Eagar and the members of the Choir for their work throughout the year, and to urge upon them the important part that they play in the effectiveness of the worship of the Church. We are sorry to lose key members this year in the persons of Mr. and Mrs. F. Gunner, and of Mr. B. Sayers. We are glad that Mrs. Sayers is still able to come. We need more members and will be glad to welcome any who are interested in this very worth while church work. To Mr. F. Gunner, Miss Norman, and

Mr. Ron Thomas a thank you for assisting at the organ when required. I would like to say how much I have appreciated the co-operation of Mr. Eagar and also to thank Mr. Jim Carroll for his work as Secretary to the Choir. Miss Browning has started a Junior Choir and we thank her for this splendid effort, we thank the children for their help on Sunday mornings, and Mrs. B. Sayers for taking practices.

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FELLOWSHIP

Our membership has increased this year, and I would like to thank Mr. Eric Olofsson and his wife for their work in the Fellowship. Just after I came I appointed Mr. Olofsson as Leader, he had been carrying on the work during the vacancy in the parish. Mrs. Olofsson has worked enthusiastically as Secretary, and both leader and secretary have been supported by the members. The Fellowship took an active part in the Fete and did very well, also they put on another Review which was a great success, and helped the Roof Fund. We look forward to a year of continued progress and increasing membership.

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SUNDAY SCHOOL

The Sunday School has continued to do well under the direction of Mr. Atkinson who is ably assisted by Mr. Alan Jones as Hon. Secretary, and a staff of teachers. This year a Girls' Bible Class has been started, and is taken by Mrs. Johnson. The Boys' Extension Group is functioning well and is looked after by Mr. Harold Jones and Mr. Reg Miniter. The Children's Library which had fallen into disuse is now controlled by the Sunday School and is proving very popular. We thank those who have sent books to us and would be grateful for new books. The Missionary Contributions of the Sunday School have been maintained. The Sunday School Anniversary was a great success as was the picnic which was enjoyed by all.

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THE KINDERGARTEN

This department of our Sunday School is under the direction of Mrs. Quelch assisted by a staff of teachers. Miss Browning takes a very keen interest in the little ones and is responsible for the welfare of the well equipped kindergarten room. The Cradle Roll is kept in this department and is a means of keeping in touch with those who are baptised at All Saints and who, we hope, will later join our Sunday School. I would like to say thank you to the Staffs of both departments of the Sunday School for their work during the year.

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Y.P.U.

In the days gone by the parish had a strong group of young children in the Y.P.U. This organisation is a section of the work of C.M.S., seeking to interest young people in the work of Missions. Mrs. Carroll has now taken over the leadership of this group and we do hope that parents will allow their children to come on Thursdays at 4 p.m. to work, learn, and give to Missions.

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ROOF FUND AND REPAIRS

During the year the Churchwardens re-issued the Roof Appeal Boxes, and we have to thank Mr. Quelch for his work in this direction. Repairs have been carried out on the roof, and new copper guttering has been placed around the church. The contractors have not finished the work yet and some of what they have done is to be corrected—one or two slates have again moved, and your parish council has decided to withhold further payments pending a correction of these faults. The ventilators have to be repaired and certain brick and stone work has to be carried out. It is hoped that the balance in hand will meet these commitments. It has been found that the drainage from the church roof is defective at the east end, and new drains will have to be set. This will be additional work and

not within the contract price. We shall therefore be glad to have further contributions from the boxes during the coming year.

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HALL FUND AND REPAIRS

You will notice by the Financial Statement that £100 has been paid off the principal, I hope that during the year we shall be able to pay more off this hall. The debt has been standing far too long, and should be removed as soon as possible. I hope that if our Fete is a success and we reach the figure we aim at namely £500 we should be able to pay an additional amount off the Principal and thus save interest. There is an urgent matter regarding the hall that needs immediate attention. The drainage under the stage. For some reason or other water is still finding its way into the basement, and from it there is arising a very unpleasant odour. Not only is the odour unpleasant but damage is being done to the building. I hope that the incoming Council will give this matter their attention. I would like to draw your attention to the fact that the hall has very largely supported itself this year, if we had a full-time verger it could earn a larger income.

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THE C.E. ADAMS MEMORIAL

The Parish Council decided that a Rector's Prayer Desk and Stall should be added to the Sanctuary in memory of your late Rector, and the work has been entrusted to Ernest Mills & Son, at a cost of £130. This will be a fitting memorial to one who laboured faithfully for 22 years in this parish. You will notice that we have £96 in hand towards this. We will need at least another £50 to meet the added cost plus the inscription. The tablet indicating the resting place of the late Rector's ashes has been completed and set in position.

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THE Y.C.I.

The membership of the Y.C.I. has increased and some splendid evenings have been spent which have proved most interesting and it is gratifying to see the younger members taking their share in the programme. The Institute also helped with the Fete and organised a Welcome Dinner to the new Rector which was very well attended. We look forward to increasing the membership and invite young men to link up with us. The Club-room is being used more frequently and is well equipped for the entertainment of members. Members have given assistance at working bees and in many ways which is greatly appreciated. The Christmas Party was one of the happiest and best functions of the year.

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PROJECTOR AND SOUND FILMS

During the year a projector and screen was purchased. A friend who wishes to remain anonymous made available to us the purchase price of the projector on loan to be repaid within two years. We hope to clear that debt this year, an amount of £35. We are indeed grateful to our friend, for at the time, when the projector was offered at this nominal figure we were not in the position financially to take advantage of it. The investment, I believe, has been a sound one and we have already been able to show some very interesting films from the Living Bible Series, shown during Lent. The fourth Sunday of the month has been set aside for the screening of Biblical and Missionary films at the after Church Social Hour. I trust that this session will not only cater for regular church-goers but encourage others to join our ranks. I can assure them of a very warm welcome. The equipment will also be used in our other organisations including the Sunday School as a teaching medium.

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RENOVATION OF CHURCH INTERIOR

When the Church roof is finally repaired I hope we will deal im-

mediately with the interior of our lovely church, I propose that consideration be given to the painting of the walls in a suitable pastel shade which will give more light and considerably brighten the interior, the oak panelling needs re-polishing, and the pews need attention. A new carpet is needed as the present one is badly worn. You will remember that I made an appeal for £5 for this purpose of interior decorating of the church and I have received so far £110 which has been banked with the A.N.Z. Bank in a Trust Suspense Account which will not be operated on until we commence this work. I shall be very glad to receive more donations of £5 for this purpose. We propose to do this work by voluntary labour in order to save and do as much as possible. I would like to thank all who have helped me in this direction so far.

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THE ORGAN

We are fortunate at All Saints in having a very fine organ, it makes a very fine contribution to our worship. Some consideration must be given in due course to the renovation of the instrument. When that is done I would like to see it re-built and the console and pedal board removed to a position on the south side of the church. A third manual needs to be added and there is enough material in the instrument to make provision for this. The pedal board needs bringing up to R.C.O. specifications. It is a project we can bear in mind for the near future; repairs will have to be carried out and a new blower installed and the cheapest way would be to do it in one job such as suggested.

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THE RECTORY

We are grateful for the painting of the kitchen, and the front room at the Rectory, and I would like to thank Mr. Bosward and Mr. Moreton for their work in this connection. Mr. Atkinson repaired all the sash cords. It was surprising how many were broken. The building needs quite a bit of attention, particularly upstairs where the bathroom needs modernising and the rooms painting. It would also be a very great help to have a hot water system installed. The exterior woodwork of the Rectory needs painting and guttering needs replacing. All buildings should be painted every five years on the outside to preserve the woodwork. The longer it is left the more costly it becomes. We are indebted to Mr. Eric Olofsson for the provision of a power point in the kitchen and thank him for his prompt execution of the work.

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CHURCH GROUNDS

During the year several working bees have been held to clean up the church grounds and I would like to express my thanks to all who have given their time to this worthy cause. We have beautiful grounds but they need a great deal of attention. It is quite clear that we cannot hope to keep the lawns in order without a power mower. It will be cheaper by far in the long run to purchase one. The Council has decided to purchase one when funds are available. We are grateful to those who have started off the Fund and trust that before long the machine will be at work. One of our real needs in a Verger who can give time both to Church, hall and grounds. I hope it will not be long before we have one. Coupled with the problem of the grounds is the need for an adequate incinerator; one has been designed by Mr. Ken Grant and we have also the offer of volunteers to erect it. We hope to put the work in hand soon.

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NOTICE BOARDS

The main notice board giving the parochial information is to be redesigned and erected. Mr. Locke is kindly attending to that matter for us. During the year a second weekly notice board was made by Mr. J. Carrol and Mr. Peter Willis and has proved a very effective way in letting people know that All Saints still lives and is doing things.

Mr. Carrol looks after this board and with stencils donated by Mr. Pat Boyle.

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FETE

The Fete proved to be a great success and with only a short time to organise it a very good result was achieved. I would like to thank all who helped and gave towards it. We are hoping for even bigger things this year and trust that our hopes will be realised. We were happy to have Mrs. O. Pitt, the wife of the Dean of Sydney, to open the Fete and were greatly encouraged by her speech and support.

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PARISH TEA

A most successful Parish Tea was held, it is looked upon as the event of the year and last year's effort was no exception to the rule. A happy spirit of fellowship prevailed and a good musical programme, together with an Organ Recital in the church, was appreciated by all. An amount of £46 was added to the General Funds of the Church.

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PLAYS

The Kingsford Dramatic Society presented a play in our parish hall in order to help our funds and was greatly enjoyed by all who came to see and hear it. Miss Ida Newton and her players presented later in the year the play "Two Dozen Red Roses," which was greatly appreciated. Our own Choir presented a Concert assisted by the Studio Choir of Mr. Eagar in which we were presented with a most interesting and enjoyable programme of contemporary music. We thank all who helped in these matters. The Fellowship again delighted a large audience with a Revue in the lighter vein and did very well raising the excellent amount of £46 towards the Roof Fund.

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PARISH CHRISTMAS PARTY!

The parish Party held at Christmas was greatly enjoyed by all who came to it. The items—coral singing together with a Christmas Tree and the visit of an actual Santa Claus provided just the right atmosphere and made the function a successful conclusion to a very busy year. We take the opportunity of saying thank you to all who co-operated and helped; to Mr. B. Sayers as M.C. and to "Santa" who, of course, must remain anonymous but hope he will visit us next year.

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SPORTING ACTIVITIES

All Saints has been well represented in the churches sporting competitions. A junior and senior cricket team represented us and I am grateful to Mr. Minter for sponsoring the Juniors—the Senior team came second in the Competition. Our baseball teams did quite well and great enthusiasm was shown by our teams. Special attention was given to the training of the younger boys on Saturday mornings and we are indebted to all who helped in this connection. We look forward to some keen games this season.

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PARISH PAPER AND CHURCH ANNOUNCEMENTS

Our Chronicle continues to place before the Parish the doings of our church and its many active organisations. A change was made in the method of printing the District Visitors amounts, this has resulted in saving a considerable amount over the year in printing costs. The cost of the Chronicle is still high, and consideration should be given to see where this cost can be reduced if possible.

A new method of making announcements in church has been introduced. A duplicated sheet with the services and meetings, etc., is now handed to each parishioner on entering the Church. Instead of a long list of announcements being made by the Rector they are placed on this sheet. Time is saved, and more important still the jarring note so often introduced into a solemn and beautiful service by the announcements

is avoided. I am indebted to Mr. Alan Jones for looking after this important aspect of church life, and he is frequently assisted by Mr. R. Atkinson.

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SANCTUARY FLOWER GUILD

I appreciate very much the many people who have come forward together with our church organisations to contribute and provide flowers for our Sanctuary. The flowers this year have been particularly good, and many have taken the opportunity to provide flowers in memory of loved ones. Mrs. Johnson has looked after the roster, and we are grateful to her for attending to it. It is not an easy task as it varies from time to time and requires careful watching.

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HALL LETTING

As you will see by the Financial Statement the hall has been let on a number of occasions. This has helped to pay off the principal debt by £100 and to pay the interest charge, and general maintenance charges. It is very necessary as I have already mentioned that a Verger be employed for it is almost an impossible task to let it frequently to outsiders if there is no one responsible to see that it is cared for and locked up and cleaned afterwards.

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DUPLEX ENVELOPE SYSTEM

We have approximately 90 sets of these envelopes out in the parish. They provide for and encourage regular, systematic giving on the part of our people and if you are away the idea is that you still give your weekly contribution, and bring it with you when you next come to church. This enables your church not only to have a regular income but the Churchwardens and parish council can budget for their needs more effectively. Secondly, they encourage regular Missionary giving, and it is by this method that we hope to meet our Missionary commitments, together with our Special Appeal in Lent for A.B.M. and C.M.S. I commend the system to you and if you have not joined yet, please see Mr. Quelch.

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SERVICES

It is a great joy to report that during the year there has been evidence of an improvement in the attendance at our services. There is still room for improvement. The Christmas and Easter Services were well attended, also the Good Friday service. I was particularly pleased to see a good response to the Children's Service on Good Friday morning. During the year 4,050 took communion in the parish. Forty candidates were presented for Confirmation. The Dedication and Consecration Festivals together with the Anniversary of the laying of the foundation stone were observed and special music for the occasions was presented by the choir. His Grace the Archbishop attended my Induction Service and instituted me to the Cure of Souls in this parish, this is an honour for the parish. This Church being a Barker Church was visited by His Grace during the year when a history of the parish was read by the Rector, and His Grace gave a most interesting account of the life of Bishop Barker who was second Bishop of Sydney and to whom we owe so much as a Diocese.

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VISITING PREACHERS

During the year the following visiting preachers visited All Saints: His Grace the Archbishop, Bishop Pilcher, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of Rockhampton, Archdeacon F. O. Hulme-Moir, Bishop-elect of Nelson, Archdeacon R. B. Robinson, Archdeacon E. A. Wight, the Revs. H. M. Arrowsmith, A. Deane, D. Hoey, R. G. Fillingham, D. G. H. Johnson, A. E. Gardner, Frank Coldrake, R. C. M. Long, P. M. Tankard, and Captain Gwilt, Church Army. We thank them for their message and help to the parish.

OBITUARY

It is with deep regret and sincere sympathy with the relatives of the following parishioners that we record the passing of Eva Constance Cusiter, John Kain, Lily Buckley, Hubert Spencer, Eugene Clement Byrne, Edith Matilda Hall, and Francis James Kinnings.

SCHOOLS

During the year the following schools have been visited for religious instruction: Fort Street Boys' High, Petersham Intermediate Girls' High School, Petersham Public School, Petersham Infants, Crystal Street Infants, Stanmore Home Science, Stanmore Infants, and Stanmore Public School. The Rector of Stanmore helps with classes at Fort St., Petersham and Stanmore. Miss Atkinson teaches at Petersham and Stanmore. Mrs. E. Olofsson teaches at Crystal St. A total of twenty classes per week with approximately 1,570 scholars. The Diocesan Board of Education sends two teachers to Stanmore to assist with the Religious Education. This particular part of our parish life is not only difficult but takes up a considerable amount of time. Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday being taken up with School work. Without the help of Mr. Tipping, Miss Atkinson, Mrs. Olofsson and the Board of Education it would be impossible to carry on. As it is, I take seven classes per week teaching 850 children, Mr. Tipping takes six classes teaching approximately 320 children, Miss Atkinson, Mrs. Olofsson and the two teachers from the Board take the remaining 390 between them. This will give you some idea of the task we are tackling. I would like to express my sincere thanks to the Rector of Stanmore Miss Atkinson, Mrs. Olofsson and the Board of Education for their loyal help during the past year.

HOSPITALS

We have within the parish one large General and Private Hospital namely Lewisham, and several Private Nursing Homes and Homes for aged people. These have to be visited, and a regular celebration of Holy Communion is held in three of them. In addition to our own hospitals visits have to be made from time to time to Sydney Hospital, King Geo. V, Royal Prince Alfred, and Marrickville, and on occasion to the Masonic Hospital. The above items of schools and hospitals shows how imperative it is to have some kind of assistance in the parish.

VISITING

The little time that is left is devoted to visiting in the parish. I do wish that more time could be devoted to this aspect of the work. Since coming to the parish I have made some 250 visits in the ordinary course of visitation in addition to hospital visitation. With an assistant much more ground could be covered.

It has been interesting to note that some 124 meetings have been attended in the parish during the year.

PHYSICAL CULTURE CLUB

Mrs. Ditchburn has worked very hard to keep the Physical Culture Club going and has succeeded in holding the children and young people despite the difficulty over teachers. The Club paid over £80 to funds and we congratulate them on their functions and we are glad that a permanent teacher has been found and to also hear that the Club is making good progress.

SAINT MARGARET'S HOSTEL

I was asked to accept the Hon. Chaplaincy to the Women's Hostel in Cambridge Street. This hostel caters for women students who live in the country and are attending the University of Sydney, or the Teachers' Training College. It is run by the Bishops of the Province and serves a very useful purpose. I hold a fortnightly celebration of Holy Com-

munion and Bible Study which is very well attended. This is an important work and I am glad that All Saints has been able to undertake the task.

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HOUSE OF THE EPIPHANY

The Australian Board of Missions has its training centre for its Missionary Candidates also in Cambridge Street, and the Warden and students attend regularly the parish Church on Sunday mornings. In addition to that I visit the centre for a celebration once a week. This year one of the students will be helping with the school work in the parish.

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ASSISTANCE IN THE PARISH

It was hoped that a part-time student Deaconess would be available for work in the parish this year, and the Parish Council had made provision for her salary. Unfortunately one is not now available, but we have been offered a full-time Deaconess of some years experience. Our difficulty in this matter is stipend, it would take £425 per annum to support this worker. At present negotiations are under way with the neighbouring parish of Summer Hill to share her and this may make it possible. It would be a great advantage to the parish and would help us to visit our people more frequently.

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FLOOD RELIEF

The response to the Flood Relief Appeal was gratifying, a cheque for over £30 was sent to the Archbishop. We take this opportunity of thanking all donors.

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MOORE COLLEGE

There is great need for more manpower in our parishes, and the parishes ought to be looking out for young men to serve in the ranks of the sacred ministry. Moore College is playing its part in this vital part of Church life. The college this year is asking each parish in the Diocese to appoint a representative to represent the parish on the friends of Moore College. I hope that we shall have a representative and would like to see this meeting make an appointment. I would also like to see one function in the year that could be given to the support of the college. Mrs. Johnson and some of our ladies are helping with the Fete to be held at C.E.N.E.F. Centre in aid of Moore College on 27th May.

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THANKS

In closing I would like to thank my friend and colleague the Rev. A. E. Gardner for his willing and loyal help during the year, also my Warden Mr. L. Calver for his interest and co-operation and help to me at all times and for his work as Secretary to the Parish Council rendered so efficiently. To Mr. W. Sopwith our worthy Treasurer, to the Churchwardens and members of the Parish Council. I regret to say that Col. Granville finds it necessary to resign from his position as People's Warden and will not be seeking re-election. The Col. has always set a worthy example in his attendance at Church, and we thank him for his interest and help during the past five years. To the Office Bearers in all our organisations I offer my thanks, to Mr. Alan Jones who does so much by way of printing, to Mr. Ken Grant, Mr. Eric Olofsson, Mr. Ken Locke for their assistance when things go wrong on the organ blower, to Mr. Moreton for painting, to Mr. Humphries for his interest in the Church grounds, and to all who have helped with the working bees. A word of thanks is also due to our two lady cleaners who, when the roof was being prepared, went through a very trying time. To Miss Browning for her work in connection with the Junior Choir, and to Mrs. Carrol for taking over the Y.P.U. Finally, to my wife for the splendid

support she has given me in the midst of a very busy home life, interrupted frequently by the telephone and the front door. I am most grateful for all this help and thank you all sincerely and pray that God will bless and guide our deliberations now and in the year ahead.
