

THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
Petersham.

30th June, 1941.

Dear People of All Saints',

Once again I bring before our young people, their parents and godparents, the important decision we ask them to make regarding Confirmation. Of course, parents and godparents cannot make this decision **FOR** their young people; but they can, and I hope will, by their interest in youth and youth's problems, assist very considerably at this extremely vital stage in their development. I would remind all parents and godparents that the solemn charge given them at the conclusion of the Baptism Service, still stands: "Ye are to take care that this child be brought to the Bishop to be confirmed by him . . ." Will all those who desire to be prepared for Confirmation please fill in the special form and return it to me not later than July 31st? There are doubtless numbers of adults in our parish who have never been confirmed. Why not take the opportunity now afforded you? If you are diffident about attending a young people's preparation class, I will be most happy to form an adult class if the numbers warrant it.

"Time marches on"—and we are drawing near to our Consecration Festival. You can help by getting in touch with former parishioners now, and asking them to keep August 17 free, so that they may join with us in the Services being arranged to mark the 39th Anniversary of the Consecration of All Saints'. This will again be observed as a "Back-to-All Saints" Sunday, and we hope to have the Annual Tea Meeting and Re-union of parishioners, past and present, on Wednesday, August 20. Full details of our plans for the Festival will appear in next month's "Chronicle."

On our Festival Sunday—August 17—the boxes now in use (in lieu of a fete) will be returned and presented. Holders of these boxes are reminded that there now remain but six weeks in which to conclude their efforts for the Parish Hall Fund. For those who have no box, there will be issued (in the August "Chronicle") a special envelope in which you are asked to place your gifts.


So soon as winter conditions come with their accompanying colds and influenza, we notice a decrease in Church attendance, particularly at the early Celebrations. Whilst admitting that there are some elderly people for whom it might be definitely dangerous to venture out these cold mornings, there are numbers of healthy, hardy young Australians who could be present at the early service if they would make the necessary effort. Some of those who commenced their Communicant life with the expressed intention of not allowing their Communion to be less frequent than once per month, have failed to do so. Are **YOU** one of them?

The apathy and indifference of people in this anxious, war-torn world continues to baffle and perplex me. Many have requested that we shall pray for their relatives serving in the Forces, and we willingly remember them, by name, each Sunday, and also on Wednesday evenings. Why is it, that so few of those who wish this remembrance of their loved ones in prayer, attend our Services? Prayer does not work mechanically, and God expects us to share in such prayers rather than pass on the responsibility to others, even though those others be clergymen. We get lots of excuses, but seldom a reason from people who are neglecting their Church. Years ago, when the Church was saying it must be "Christ or Chaos," men laughed. It was, they said, another "stunt" to get people to go to Church. They do not laugh to-day, especially in places where enemy bombs are being rained upon them. They know the Church was right.

The Archbishop of York in a recent broadcast, under the title, "God Reigns; God Loves; God Acts," says:—

... "It remains true that the Church of Christ is the chief inspirer of service and progress in the world. The historical Church, when judged by the standard of its own vocation, falls under the condemnation common to all human associations; yet when judged by the standard accepted for those associations, it proves its divine origin and quality by its unceasing capacity to produce saints and heroes. If we ask by whom the day-to-day drudgery of philanthropy and social service is performed, we shall find that the share of Christian people, unknown and commonly unrewarded, is very large. For within the historically organised Church is always the life of the true, the real Church, which is the life of Christ Himself; it is the presence of this within the historical Church which qualifies that historical Church to be called the Church at all. Those who really share in the life of the Church know that it is a glorious life and that the Church of Christ, in spite of the faults of its members which have marred its historical expression of that life, is a fountain of spiritual joy and power."
