Dear Friends,

I begin by commending to you CELEBRATION '85 with Dr. Leighton Ford. CELEBRATION '85 began with St. Andrew's Cathedral Choir School wishing to celebrate their 100th Anniversary. The committee decided that they wanted to do something that would be of help to the many thousands of people who work in the city business area. This idea grew to encompass other churches of various denominations.

Gatherings will be held in St. Andrew's Cathedral, in Sydney Square and the Entertainment Centre. Some of them are in the evening, some during the day, some on week days, others on Saturdays and Sundays.

You ought not to miss CELEBRATION '85.

We often ask, "What can we do for God?" or "What can we do to help our fellow man?" We would all like to see ourselves as serving both God and man. Here is one opportunity of doing just that.

Ask your friend or neighbour do they know anything about the visit of Dr. Leighton Ford to Sydney. (He is a brother-in-law of Dr. Billy Graham and a member of his team). Say to your friend that you would like to hear him speak but you would prefer to go with someone—would they come with you? What a great opportunity with meetings in different places on different days and at different times.

This is one way you can help your neighbour.

Some might say, "Oh, I would be embarrassed to talk about religion to my friend or neighbour?"

You're not talking about religion. Dr. Leighton Ford will do that, and the truth is that your friend will want to know not just about religion, but about Jesus Christ and the difference He makes in the life of a person.

Serving God is not just you coming to church regularly, or you putting your money in the envelope each week, or even supporting the annual fete or the monthly newspaper pick-up.

Some people see fit to do these things, but God wants us to do our own thing for Him. God has given each of us different abilities and interests. We ought to see how they can be used to serve God and man.

The church that wants everyone to do exactly the same thing is a church out of step with reality.

The person who believes he or she has to follow what everyone else is doing at church is stifling the Holy Spirit who dwells within every believer. Christ came to make us free—free from a dull conformity, and free to use our interests and talents in His service.

From the beginning of creation men and women have served God with the various gifts He has given them. The sheer variety of the gifts comes because of the great variety of needs man has. When we fail to use our gift then someone out in the community is not receiving the help he needs. This is something worth meditating upon, praying about and seeking to do something about.

**NEW ZEALAND ARCHBISHOP NAMED  
GOVERNOR-GENERAL**

The Anglican Primate of New Zealand has been named by the Queen as Governor-General of New Zealand.

Archbishop Paul Reeves, 52, who is of Maori descent, is the first clergyman ever to hold such an office. He will resign his ecclesiastical offices as of September 30 in preparation for his new duties, and his resignation has been accepted by the Anglican bishops of New Zealand.

The archbishop will succeed Sir David Stuart Beattie, a barrister and former judge of the New Zealand Supreme Court. The appointment was made by the Queen on the recommendation of the New Zealand Government.

**JULY:** They put me in a suitcase today. I guess we are off on vacation. I wish I could stay home; I know I'll be closed up in this thing for at least two weeks.

**SEPTEMBER:** Back home at last and in my old familiar place. I have a lot of company. Two women's magazines and four comic books are stacked on top of me. I wish I could be read as much as they are.

**OCTOBER:** They read me a little bit today. One of them

is very sick. Right now I am sitting in the centre of the coffee table. I think the pastor is coming for a visit.

NOVEMBER:: Back in my old place. Somebody asked today if I were a scrapbook.

DECEMBER: The family is busy getting ready for the holidays. I guess I'll be covered up under wrapping paper and packages again—just as I am every Christmas.



### CHURCH HISTORY (Continued)

Saturday, 29th May, 1915, saw the somewhat delayed completion of the Jubilee project when His Grace the Archbishop dedicated the memorial wall and gates in the presence of Reverends Canon Martin, R. Noake, A. J. Priest, H. Crotty, R. Rook and H. G. Howe.

The Dedication Service commenced with a Hymn, "All People that on Earth do dwell", during which the Choir, Clergy and Archbishop proceeded to the main Entrance Gates where the Churchwardens presented the petition for dedication to the Archbishop in response to which His Grace dedicated the Gates with appropriate prayers and read the following inscription which was unveiled by Mrs. H. Wippell:

"To the Glory of God and in loving memory of  
Frederick Walter Wippell these gates were erected  
by his Widow and Family, 1915."

Singing the hymn, "O God our help in ages past", the procession continued to the "Children's Gate" where the Churchwardens unveiled and read the inscription on the Gateway and the Archbishop dedicated the memorial. The inscription reads thus:

"To the Glory of God this wall was erected by the Parishioners to commemorate the Jubilee of the First Service held in this Parish in 1860, this Gateway being the gifts of the School Children in the year of the Jubilee 1910."

After the Service of Dedication, Short Evensong was held in the Church, the Archbishop giving a most helpful and inspiring address on the words of St. Paul, "Walk worthy of the vocation wherewith ye are called". The service was attended by a large number of former and present parishioners, including Mrs. Wippell and members of her family.

For many years during the Incumbency of Canon Goddard, All Saints' conducted a "Day School" on a site adjoining the Town Hall in Crystal Street, Petersham, which provided for boy and girl pupils from kindergarten to school leaving age. Miss

Green, Principal for many years, possessed a wonderful personality and the school was generally known in this period as "Miss Green's School". The school concerts, referred to as "Miss Green's Concerts", were a feature not only of the Parish but of the whole district. Miss Green's sister, Mrs. Shuttleworth, and the latter's daughter, were on the teaching staff. Those who were pupils at the school in those days will also remember other teachers, Mrs. Murcott (Art), Mrs. Edith Glanville (Elocution), Miss Worsley and Miss A. Chandler.
