THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

26th October, 1947.

Dear People of All Saints',

In 1945, and again in 1946, our Archbishop was prevented (through unexpected absence from Sydney, and through illness) from being with us for Confirmation. We were very pleased, therefore, to welcome His Grace to All Saints' for the 1947 Confirmation Service.

The simplicity and beauty of "The Order of Confirmation" are always impressive, and this year they were no less so, and the Choir's devotional rendering of Foster's appropriate anthem, "O for a Closer Walk with God," added beauty to an already beautiful service. The Archbishop based his address to the candidates on the words from Isaiah 43, verse 1: "Fear not: for I have redeemed thee, I have called thee by thy name; thou art mine." Altogether, it was a service which we feel the Confirmees will always be able to look back upon with joy and thanksgiving.

In addition to the fifteen candidates from this Parish, we welcomed two (with their Rector, the Rev. O. S. Fleck), from St. Luke's, Concord, who, owing to illness, missed Confirmation in their own parish. The number of candidates was much smaller this year than formerly; but, after all, it is **quality** that matters, not quantity. The testing time for these young people commences now; but the **real test** will be apparent, not so much now, when they are keen and enthusiastic, but this time next year. When we look through our Confirmation Register to see how many of the 1947 candidates are still regular Communicants, and have remained loyal to their Confirmation vows, we can begin to assess the value they place upon their Confirmation. I commend them to you, hoping you will not only remember them in your prayers, but, that where it is possible, you will get to know them and help them in every possible way to be true to the promises they have made to-day.

This Christian way of life to which we are called is no easy thing—it is a constant struggle which challenges the best that is in us. The youth of the church to-day will have to struggle with the spirit forces of evil. But God does not expect us to fight in our own strength. Discipleship begins by trusting Christ for life and strength. In the Holy Communion Service, He not only provides an eternal reminder of His love, but also gives a means of grace, a chain of friendship by which our characters can be linked up with, and strengthened and refreshed by Him; and in this service we not only pledge our loyalty to the Best Friend of all mankind, but we pledge our lives anew in His service.

We are approaching the end of the church year, November 30th being the first Sunday in Advent. On that Sunday evening we complete our Fifth Missionary Appeal, when we hope we shall be able to hand Captain Cowland at least a hundred pounds towards the training of an aboriginal girl as a fully qualified nursing Sister to work amongst her own people. The Church Army trained Sister Muriel Stanley, who is now doing fine work at Yarrabah (the A.B.M. Station near Cairns, North Queensland), and we feel sure that All Saints' people will maintain, if not exceed, the previous years' special gifts for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. The Y.C.I. 37th Commemoration Service is listed for the same Sunday evening, when all members and their friends are invited to attend.

We hope again to have a day of continuous prayer for the Missionary work of the Church, which is customary at St. Andrew's-tide. Usually, this is observed on the eve of St. Andrew's Day, but as that Festival has

this year been transferred to December 2nd, and as Monday might be an inconvenient time for some who like to join in this day of Intercession, we propose to observe it on St. Andrew's Day, **December 2nd**, commencing with a Celebration of Holy Communion at 7.30 a.m., and concluding with Evensong at 5.30 p.m. If you would like to join in this Day of Prayer, will you please put your name down for the period you will be available, so that the continuity of prayer may be preserved throughout the day?

THE RECENTLY CONFIRMED AND HOLY COMMUNION

You will remember that, during the period of instruction, the importance of, and the necessity for **REGULAR** attendance at Holy Communion was particularly stressed. Read again the second Exhortation in the Communion office, which is based on St. Luke XIV. 16-25.

A certain specified Sunday has been allotted you in the hope that in observing this particular Sunday, all the Confirmees will become regular Communicants.

Of course, this does not mean you may come **ONLY** on the Sunday assigned you. You are welcome to come as frequently as you wish; and you should always be present at the Great Festivals of the church's year. **YOU SHOULD NEVER ALLOW YOUR ATTENDANCE AT HOLY COMMUNION TO BECOME LESS FREQUENT THAN ONCE A MONTH.** You may remember the "Dangers of Drifting"!

You were confirmed on the Twenty-first Sunday after Trinity. Read the very appropriate Epistle appointed for that Sunday (Ephesians VI. 10): "Be strong." You may often feel weak and tempted to give way—to go "with the crowd." St. Paul understood—he had felt like that himself many a time, when he was tempted and in danger, and so he reminds his readers (and us) that they are not alone, for they have all the power of God with them; as soldiers of Jesus Christ they have the finest armour in the world with which to fight against evil. The Breast-plate of Righteousness; the Shield of Faith; the Sword of the Spirit—which is the Word of God—the Helmet of Salvation. With such strong weapons they will be victorious over sin and evil, just as the Roman army, clad in its matchless armour, vanquished the barbarian hordes, who came against them armed with darts, spears and arrows.

Women's Guild: The quarterly Rally in connection with the Guild, was held in the Chapel, on Thursday, October 9, and was well attended. Miss Margaret Young, warden of the House of Epiphany, was the guest speaker. She gave a most interesting talk on "India," instancing the loyalty and devotion of many Indian women and girls, and also revealing many phases of Indian life, especially the "caste system," about which many people have somewhat hazy ideas. For the enlightenment of this talk, we are very grateful. At the conclusion of the service in the Chapel, an adjournment was made to the Parish Hall, where afternoon tea was served

by Miss D. P. Brown and her group of helpers. Occasion was taken to present Mrs. C. Reilly with a reading lamp, from the members of the Guild, and her many friends in the parish, on her departure to live in Melbourne. Mrs. Reilly was a former secretary of the Guild, and has at all times been a most loyal member. She is going to be dreadfully missed, but we wish her every happiness in her new home. Thursday, October 23, a Business Meeting was held to make final arrangements for the Market Evening that the Guild is arranging, mainly for the "Food for Britain Fund," and partly for the Guild Quota for the Parish Hall Fund. This takes place on Thursday, November 6, in the Parish Hall and will be opened by Mr. D. B. Hunter, M.L.A., at 8 p.m. Judging by the enthusiasm at the meeting, the success of the function is assured. All organisations are co-operating, and you will have Work, Cake, Jam and Grocery, Sweets, Hoop-la and Refreshment Stalls to choose from. Added to this, the Physical Culture Class is providing the programme and you know how entertaining these girls, under their instructress, Miss L. Brown, are.
