MARCH COUNCIL MEETING

The main feature of the March Council Meeting was the presentation of the report, Religion in Education in Government Schools by Rev. Bern Stevens, Rev. Carol Grew and Canon Alan Langdon who were among the representatives appointed by the Minister of Education to consider the place of religious education in public schools.

The Report was compiled by a Committee set up by the Minister for Education in 1975, consisting of sixteen members comprising representatives of the Department of Education, primary and secondary principals, the Teachers' Federation, the parents' organisations, universities, CAE's, a representative of the Jewish community and three representatives of the Inter-Church Consultative Commission on Religious Education in Schools.

The Committee met monthly for four years, weekly for the next six months and on three subsequent occasions in 1980. Sub-committees prepared draft documentation for consideration by the whole Committee and every member had opportunity in plenary sessions of the Committee to discuss alterations to every paragraph of the Report in the numerous drafts and also in the final edited form.

Rev. Carol Grew of the Roman Catholic Church gave a brief outline of the Report submitted to the Government. Canon Alan Langdon explained the historical perspective of the act which was introduced as early as 1836 by Governor Bourke, a system already functioning in Ireland. In 1880 the Religious Instruction in Government Schools Act was passed. At the present time although there were many criticisms of the current position identified in the submissions, 79% of parents desired Religious Education for their children.

Rev. Bern Stevens concluded by saying the report was being considered sympathetically, but understanding and support from the Churches was also needed.

MAY 31 10.30 a.m. Our Annual Service and Installation of our incoming President, Mrs. Yvonne Davis to be held in the Presbyterian Church, Canterbury Road, Lakemba.

A very representative group of about 50 women gathered at North-side Baptist Church on Sunday afternoon, February 21, to hear this gifted speaker. Dr. Adair is President of Church Women United, U.S.A. and she was visiting Australia at the invitation of the Uniting Church.

The President, Mrs. Glad West, warmly welcomed Dr. Adair to the meeting. Two lovely musical items brought by ~~Brisg~~ Ruth Smith and ~~Brag~~ Flo Whittaker added a feeling of joy and friendship. Later those present were able to meet our special guest informally during afternoon tea, as well as enjoy fellowship with each other.

Dr. Adair spoke of the need for ecumenical groups to speak up for the rights of women. At the fortieth anniversary gatherings of Church Women United, U.S.A., concern was expressed regarding the effects of inflation on families and particularly women. Single parent families are especially disadvantaged. Women have more responsibility on less income.

There is an increasing concern for a renewed sense of values. Everywhere women are seeking more participation in church affairs and are keen to gather in groups for Bible study. Women are seeking to play a bigger role, e.g. 52% of theology classes are women. Women are living longer and the golden years of 50-65 are often wasted. Many women reach their peak of potential at 65!

The plight of women in prison was expressed. More women are becoming offenders and serving sentences and 47% of these women have young children. Research has shown that women will visit men in prison but not the reverse. There are no facilities for children as visitors. In every prison for men there is a chapel, but in women's prisons there are no chapels or chaplains. Yet outside the majority of churches are supported by women.

We were honoured and privileged to have Dr. Adair spend time out of her busy schedule and we pray God's blessing on her as she seeks to spread the cause of Christ and humanity wherever she goes.
