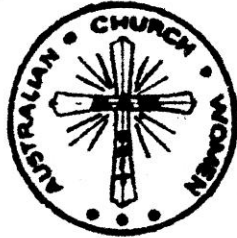

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The very well-known 3rd Chapter of Ecclesiastes sets out clearly God's planned timing for His people. REPORT OF NATIONAL CONFERENCE OF AUSTRALIAN CHURCH WOMEN
held in Melbourne - 16th to 19th August, 1983.

All State Units were fully represented by two Delegates and two Observers, plus invited representatives from various national committees of the denominations and interest groups. There were 56 women in residence at Whitley Baptist College which is a three floor circular structure with single heated rooms, comfortable dining area and meeting rooms. The Chapel, where the two main Services and Morning Devotions were held has a most quiet and serene atmosphere. From the Opening Service to the Closing, there was a meaningful Christian Fellowship and sincere goodwill among the residents. The Melbourne weather lived up to its reputation .. cold, wet and windy. We had one sunny day and the day we left to come home was also fine.

The Constitution is to be completely revised and we spent the last morning in open discussion on the proposals and amendments of the previous day. There is a move to update the aims and overall rules to a 1983 standard.

The 1984 Winifred Kiek. Scholar is an Indian Doctor, Mrs. Sushila Rao, who will be studying Drug and Alcohol rehabilitation at the Salvation Army Centre in Sydney.

We were delighted with our 1983 W.K. Scholar, Catherine Min of Korea who is studying at St. Barnabas College, Adelaide.

The N.S.W. Unit has requested the formation of a similar scholarship for an Aboriginal Christian girl who wishes to study as a Deaconess or similar profession, as the Government only supports financially secular studies, so many girls and women are thwarted in their desire to serve the Church in an official and well trained manner. This request is now being discussed by the other State Units prior to being put into the hands of the Federal Executive for investigation.

Great interest was shown in the N.S.W. Unit's Promotion Kit and new leaflets which are now being distributed to all denominations for their women's organisations. Many questions were asked as to the work and interest of our Branches and each State Unit requested a Kit. We were commended for the increase of attendances at our Special Day Services from 1,000 to 2,500 and branches from 25 to 36. Both these increases have occurred over the last 12 months and a great deal of thanks goes to Marie McCann and her enthusiastic Promotions Committee.

BIBLE SOCIETY LUNCHEON - DR. MAE REGGY

On Monday, August 8th, the members of the Lane Cove-Longueville Inter-Church Fellowship acted as hostesses for a Bible Society Luncheon at which the speaker was Dr. Mae Reggy. It was attended by over 100 people and was a very wonderful opportunity to hear this talented lady speak and sing.

She is an American Negress, brought up in New Jersey and now married to a Kenyan and has been living in Africa for seven years.

Her work involves teaching Africans to read, using new readers which are portions of the New Testament translated into one of the African languages. Her work is slow and arduous as there are so many tongues abounding in Africa. Cassettes are provided for the preachers by the Bible Society; these are hand turned or powered by solar plates. A really astounding number of Africans are accepting Christ as their Saviour through this wonderful work.

Our ladies were thrilled that a collection taken at the door raised the sum of \$450 for this worthwhile work.

ECUMENICAL ACTIVITIES

The Women's World Day of Prayer Committee held a morning tea on Monday August 22nd when Deaconess Mary Andrews showed slides of people and places connected with the World Day of Prayer overseas. Opportunity was also given for general discussion for those who organize the services on the first Friday in March each year, in over 400 centres in N.S.W.

On 27th July, many attended the Launching of the YWCA's Building Fund. The new building is situated at 5-11 Wentworth Avenue, Sydney and although not yet complete, it is a very fine building and already in use.

The activities of the 'Y' over a century of caring, continues and the public is invited to contribute financially to the project. Dame Monica Gallagher chaired the Launching Function and Mrs. Mary Pulsford, the President also spoke. Other guests on the dais included Mrs. Wran, Lord Mayor Sutherland, Archbishop Robinson, other Church representatives and Patron-in-Chief, Lady Rowland. Best wishes go to the Young Women's Christian Association in this venture!

The Annual Day of Reflection and Prayer was held on 10th September and this year it was The Salvation Army's turn to organize the programme, the Citadel at Chatswood being the venue. 'All one in union with Christ Jesus' was the theme and a beneficial time was experienced by those who attended.

A special service took place at Pitt Street Uniting Church on the evening of 16th September. In this splendid Church, celebrating 150 years of witness formerly as a Congregational Church, a unique historic event in the life of Australian Christians took place in an Ecumenical Celebration of the Eucharist. The Minister, Rev. Dorothy McMahon, introduced the Anglican Primate, Archbishop Sir John Grindrod, who was the celebrant, and they were assisted during the service by representatives of Protestant, Roman Catholic and Orthodox churches in 'The Feast of Life', a liturgy used at the recent Vancouver Assembly of the World Council of Churches. The Rev. David Gill, General Secretary Uniting Church in Australia gave the address. This was a moving experience for the many people who filled the Church. Bishop Gibran chaired the preliminary meeting when reports were given of the Assembly.
