The 1980 Winifred Kiek Scholars

The Rev. WINIFRED KIEK, B.A., B.D., is honoured as a pioneer in fields of particular interest to Church Women.

She was the first woman to become an ordained minister in Australia and her work for the World Council of Churches concerning women in the Churches has had far-reaching effect.



Miss Dien Sumiyatiningsih of Indonesia has a Bachelor of Theology Degree (1972) and is presently working towards her Master of Divinity, majoring in Sociology of Religion.

Dien is a member of the Javanese Christian Church in Margoyudan, Solo/

Surakarta, where she leads youth and women's groups. Dien's major concern is to help women find a meaningful role within the Indonesian community, especially within the Church. Whilst in Australia, Dien will undertake a 9 months course in Clinical Pastoral Education at the Cancer Institute, Melbourne, under the supervision of the Rev. John Paver. The course is aimed at developing skills in ministering to people in crisis.

Before and during her course Dien will visit N.S.W., Tasmania and Queensland, with members of Australian Church Women as her hosts.

Dien feels her whole experience in Australia, especially concerning the needs of people from all walks of life, will be a tremendous benefit to her in her future work in Indonesia.



The Rev. Mary Au is the Priest-in-Charge of the Kindly Light Church (Anglican) Kowloon, Hong Kong, where she has been successful in building up the congregation in this resettlement area.

Mary is also the Chaplain and Religious Education teacher at the Bishop Hall Jubilee School.

At the moment Mary is studying some theology and gaining experience in counselling and pastoral work in New Zealand.
