## THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,  
26th August, 1950.

Dear People of All Saints',

In view of the weather man's prediction of rain until the end of August, we approached our Festival this year with a certain amount of anxiety. Fortunately, we came through comparatively dry! The Sunday was fine and although rain poured down on the Wednesday morning, it cleared about mid-day, and the attendance at the Tea was larger than ever. For this, and for many other reasons, we record our deep sense of gratitude for another happy and successful Consecration Festival and we are indeed grateful to **ALL** who assisted in making it so, particularly to our Choirmaster and the members of our Choir, whose good work contributed greatly to the inspiration of our services. We were pleased to have with us the Rector of Christ Church St. Laurence (the Rev. John Hope), and The Dean of Sydney at the morning and evening services respectively, and we thank them for their timely and appropriate messages. We also thank the Rev. K. N. Grisdale, who came to assist at the early celebration through the courtesy of his Rector, Archdeacon Bidwell. Many thanks also to our good friends who brought gifts of arum lilies, and to Miss Olofsson and Miss Hayes, who arranged them so artistically.

The Churchwardens join me in thanking very sincerely **ALL** parishioners and friends for their generous response to the Special Appeal, which, to date, amounts to £179/1/10. There are 13 boxes outstanding and doubtless there are some envelopes yet to be returned; we shall be grateful if you will bring or send them in as soon as possible.

For many years the Women's Guild has maintained a very high standard for our Parish Festival Tea, and this year was no exception. The Hall presented a most attractive appearance when all was in readiness for the Tea, the flowers (kindly given by Mr. and Mrs. Bullman) being arranged by Mrs. Morris in her usual skilful and artistic manner.

Although this year an additional table had been provided, the seating capacity was taxed to the utmost. After Tea, Mr. Eagar and Mr. Schofield were associated in an enjoyable musical recital in Church, preceding Evensong, after which a short, but attractive concert programme was presented, which included the ever-welcome, mystifying "Weirde," Miss Audrey Longworth, Mr. Albert Schofield, Miss Muriel Harris, and Mr. Cecil Davey. We are grateful to them all, especially to the two last-named, who came at short notice to fill the gaps with which any concert programme has to contend during the winter months. At the conclusion of the evening, the Treasurer expressed the Wardens' thanks to all who responded to the Special Appeal, and, in reporting its progress, made a few salient points regarding Church finances generally. Another happy Festival concluded after the Rector had spoken appreciatively of the efforts of **ALL**, who by their willing co-operation and generous gifts had contributed to the success of the Festival.

The financial success of the Tea and Social Reunion, valuable though it is, is not its only, or even its real value, which, to my mind, lies in bringing us together, and stressing the ideal of the Church as a family, sharing a common interest. One of the reasons why our Lord founded the Church was to link His followers together in the world. Men are made like that, you know; we don't do things much by ourselves—certainly not the big, forceful things that absorb our common interests. The things that really interest us we like doing with others who share our interest—and we do them all the more keenly for that. And Christ knew that though Christianity might well touch the individual life very deeply, men would be far stronger in the faith if they found themselves linked with other Christians than if they were left to struggle on by themselves. It really is

very difficult to go on long as a lone Christian without losing faith. There can be no doubt, either, that a thousand Christians really united in one body are a far stronger force in the world than a thousand individuals living Christian lives on their own. The lasting value of our Festival will be the measure of the inspiration and encouragement we received, to go forward to attempt greater things for Christ and His Church. The Church is the Body of Christ, and this "Body" is intended to help men in the world to-day in exactly the same ways as His human body did in the towns and villages of Palestine. The Church is the fundamental means by which God sends His followers the things they need. In these days when there are forces in our midst endeavouring to destroy the Church and all that it means in the life of the community, we do need a Power which is above, and beyond and greater than ourselves.

## NATURALIZED IN THE UNNATURAL

Seek first the Kingdom of God! We have seen that the Kingdom of God is written into our true nature and that to live according to it is to find ourselves. But we have been so accustomed to false ways of life that we think them our true nature. We hold to our unnaturalness, and suspect God's true nature. . . . In a South American city a new market was built, clean and sanitary, with tiled floors and walls. But the people holding the stalls in the dirty old market would not move into the new. One woman stall-holder explained her attitude thus: "That market is so clean it makes me sick. It is just like a hospital."

That is the tragedy of our humanity. We see that our ways won't work, and yet we hesitate to take God's way. The great hearted mayor of a city in India, who had cleaned up vast portions of the slums and in their stead had built lovely, neat cottages and apartments, said to me: "Sometimes I walk around the remaining wretched sections of the city, at night, and say to myself, 'If the people would only let me, I could do anything for them.' But they won't let me. They are naturalized in their filth, and cling to it, though it kills them off like flies." How Christlike that great, lonely figure, sighing over people who would not accept the life he offered! Christ must be doing that to-day! He sees us with our unworkable ways of life, running into roads with dead ends, ending in frustration and futility, losing our means of living, and our lives themselves, and He says again: "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God . . . and all these things shall be added unto you". But we are seeking other things first, and all these things are being subtracted from us.
