THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

28th March, 1938.

Dear People of All Saints',—

Shortly after you receive this letter, our thoughts will be directed to Holy Week, and the Commemoration of the Great Sacrifice. Will you do your utmost to keep Holy Week (which commences on Palm Sunday, April 10) quite free from social engagements, in order that you may come together for prayer and meditation upon the fact that the Cross is the centre of our religion. The Cross shows what love can do and be; it wins where no force, no display of power could ever do. Force is not a Divine method; it never has been, nor ever will be. God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself by love alone.

We are, at this time, all very conscious of the prevalent feeling of uncertainty, the prevalent sense of insecurity which is all about us. We see forces in combination for mastery which may lead to the destruction of our civilization. We read of horrible things being done in Spain which make us wonder whether we are living in a "civilized" world; and there is a depressing sense of apprehension surrounding our daily life. Canon Barry in his recent book, "What has Christianity to say?" quotes a letter to the London "Times" in which this sentence occurs: "The Minister of Labour was reported in your columns last week as saying that 'the greatest possible service is being done to the nation at this critical time by those who insist upon the necessity of listening to God.'" . . . Nothing is more true. It is the refusal to listen, that accounts for the pessimism that oppresses so many, the sense of futility, the emptiness of so much of our modern living, the hurrying from one pleasure to another, which all combine to demonstrate that for many many people life has no real meaning. Your Church provides many opportunities for you to

listen to God throughout the year, but especially helpful and valuable are the opportunities of Holy Week and Good Friday.

Men are endeavouring to take Good Friday from us and use this most sacred day in the whole year for purposes which we cannot do other than deplore, and against which we should never cease to protest, both by word and deed: His Grace the Archbishop asks our co-operation in the Procession of Witness on Good Friday afternoon, to which reference is made elsewhere in this issue.

Our Prayer Book directs that every member of the Church of England shall communicate on Easter Day, and also directs that we shall not come to partake of the Sacrament unprepared. Holy Communion is not just a performance to be gone through; it is a fellowship between your Saviour and yourself, an expression of companionship and friendship. We can best prepare for our Easter Communion by a sincere observance of Holy Week and Good Friday, so that we may really enter into Communion with our Risen Lord and know something of the Power of His Resurrection—a Power which must not be limited to the hope of a future world only, but which ought to have a very vital effect upon our lives here and now. Those first disciples were changed men not because of what might happen to them in a future life, but because they really believed that God had raised Jesus their Saviour and Friend to be still their living Helper and Companion.


I refer you to page 8 of this Chronicle for full details of the times and particulars of the various services being arranged for Holy Week and Easter Day.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL.

Reunion of Confirmees.—His Grace the Archbishop invites those who were confirmed in 1937 to a Service of Reunion in the Cathedral on the Tuesday evening in Holy Week—April 12th. Those who were confirmed in 1934, 1935, and 1936 are invited to a similar service on the Monday evening in Holy Week—April 11th. Cards of invitation are being issued; if you have not received yours, please apply to the Rector.

Easter Vestry Meeting.—The annual Vestry Meeting will be held on Wednesday, May 4th, at 8 p.m. We hope we may have a representative attendance at this important meeting.

District Visitors.—The self-sacrificing work of this loyal band of Churchwomen merits special mention at the close of another financial year, during which they have established a record by collecting £233/0/3 for General Church funds, and £45/6/8 for the Curate fund, making a total of £278/6/11. We are grateful to those parishioners who, by the regularity of their gifts, made this possible. Greater even than the financial aspect of their work—

useful as it undoubtedly is—is the service rendered by our Visitors in keeping in touch with people, welcoming new parishioners, reporting cases of illness or trouble (of which otherwise the clergy might not be aware) and generally rendering assistance which can never be evaluated in terms of money.

Parish Hall Fund, 1938.—At the last meeting of the Parish Council it was decided to again dispense with a fete, and to rely upon the Boxes which were so successful last year in raising funds for our Parish Hall Fund. This year we hope we shall be even more successful, and I am sure we can be, if everyone will take a box and put in it at least the equivalent of what a fete would have cost you, or what you would have spent on such an effort. Boxes will be available on Easter Day, and we aim at realising at least £200 between that day and August 21st (the day of our Consecration Festival)—a period of eighteen weeks. We rely on the enthusiasm and co-operation of ALL parishioners in this matter.

Kindergarten.—Specifications have just come to hand, and we hope to be able to state soon the approximate cost of erection of the Kindergarten Room. The balance in hand for this fund is £304.

Quarterly Offertory.—The March Quarterly Offertory amounted to £18/9/4.—somewhat less than usual. Picture Evening.—Through the courtesy of Mr. Robinson, of Haberfield, who has travelled extensively through the Australian States, we are to have a Picture Evening in the Parish Hall on **Tuesday, May 10**. A good miscellaneous programme will be presented which will afford you an excellent opportunity to "See your own country first!"

Tickets are now available and may be obtained from members of the various Church organisations, amongst whom the proceeds of the evening will be divided, towards their quotas to the Parish Hall Fund.

Through the medium of these picture evenings Mr. Robinson has raised some thousands of pounds for various Churches, and as he is good enough to include All Saints' amongst them, we feel it is "up to us" to show our appreciation by providing a splendid audience. Women's Guild.—The meeting on Thursday, 10th March, was devoted to a Bible Study led by the Rector. The subject of the study was, "The Background of the Gospels," and proved of exceptional interest and gave all present much food for thought. The subject was treated from its political and religious aspects. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded the Rector at the close of the meeting for his help through these studies of giving members a better understanding of the Scriptures

The Annual Meeting of the Guild was held on Thursday, 24th March. The Rector presided. Both the secretary's and treasurer's reports told of work successfully accomplished during the year. The secretary particularly stressed the happy fellowship existing in the Guild, and the hearty co-operation of the members in everything that was undertaken to help on the work of the parish and the diocese. The treasurer reported that after disbursements amounting to £85, the Guild will start 1938 with a balance of £6 odd. Votes of thanks were accorded the retiring officers. The officers for the previous year were re-elected unanimously. During the evening a donation of £2 was voted towards the Curate Fund. Mrs. Morton has kindly undertaken to further the sale of Mothers' Day badges, which the Benevolent Society

issues in aid of its funds. The badges are 6d. each. The meetings for the month are: April 14—Maundy Thursday—Evensong; **TUESDAY**, April 26—**Pedlars' Fair**. Will members please note the date of the latter. A very unique evening is promised. Proceeds in aid of the Guild's Hall quota.

Y.P.U.—On Sunday, 27th March, at Evensong, fourteen of our young people were admitted as members of this society. The membership of All Saints' branch now stands at twenty-six, and we would be pleased to welcome more members to our ranks, from the ages of eight to sixteen years. Members are busily working for their evening on Monday, 2nd May, when they will present a Pageant of All Lands, a Missionary Play, and Tableaux, depicting missionary work, in aid of their quota for Missions. Please don't forget the date, and come and encourage our young folk in their efforts for the furtherance of God's Kingdom in all the earth.

Girls Club.—The club meetings are being well maintained. We have been pleased to welcome several new members during the last month. Monday, March 7, was our Manuscript Journal Evening. The Editorial did us all good, as constructive criticism is always "good for the soul." The articles sent in were very diversified, naturally, and were enjoyed by us all. At the close of the meeting Mrs. E. C. King entertained us at supper. Monday, March 14, was our Bible Study Evening, when the Rector by request repeated the study given to the Womens Guild on "The Background of the Gospels." We had a very interesting and helpful time. The meetings for the month are: Monday, April 4—Sewing Night; Monday, April 18—No Meeting (Easter Monday).

Good Friday Procession of Witness.—We feel sure the people of All Saints' will do their part in co-operating to make this Act of Witness even more impressive than it was last year. It has been so arranged that it will be possible for you to attend your parish Church Services which you will doubtless desire to do. We will assemble in the Domain at 4 p.m. and will march to the Cathedral at 4.30 p.m., where a short service will be held, concluding not later than half past five.

All Saints' Sunday School.—The work of the school has gone along steadily during the past month, during which we were pleased to enrol a number of new scholars, and also to welcome Miss D. Muldoon as a member of the staff. Our Hon. Treasurer reports that the expenses of the picnic were entirely covered by the donations received; we are indeed very grateful to all who assisted in financing this event.—R. Atkinson, Hon. Sec.
