

Special Services will be held on Ash Wednesday, 12th February, to mark the beginning of the Lenten season. Mid-week Services will also be conducted by the Rector every Wednesday throughout Lent, with a celebration of Holy Communion at 7 a.m. and a Devotional Service at 7.30 p.m.

DEDICATION OF MEMORIALS

Most parishioners will have seen by now the memorial gates that have been erected in our grounds at the corner of Stanmore Road and Church Street in memory of the late Mr. J. W. Humphreys and Mr. J. B. Ditchburn. The new brickwork which has been laid adjoining the gates is recessed from the street alignment to enable use of the gates by vehicles entering the grounds from Stanmore Road.

150 NEW PATIENTS

150 new patients are admitted to the Callan Park Mental Hospital each week. About half of these belong to the Church of England. The Home Mission Society's Chaplain endeavours to see all new admissions, talking with the patients, seeking to understand their problems, and offering such spiritual counsel as he feels will help them. In addition, he is engaged in group therapy working in co-operation with the medical staff of the Hospital.

This is exacting work, yet could be of inestimable value in helping people to develop an inner peace which can best come through a personal knowledge of God. Will you pray for the Chaplain, the Rev. G. H. Feltham, in this work.

EXODUS

Continuing the series of articles on the books of the Bible, written by the Rev. Donald Cameron of Moore College.

To a Jew reading his Bible, perhaps there is no book with a profounder message than the book of Exodus, meaning literally, "the going out." For in it, he sees the beginning of his nation, the ransoming of his forefathers from slavery in Egypt, and the beginning of the mighty acts of God which found their finality with the settling of the Hebrews in the rich land of Canaan. To the Jews, this book was the first revelation of the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob as a saving God, one who looked upon the suffering and slavery of His people and in response to their prayers intervened on their behalf to bring about their deliverance and to effect their freedom.

Exodus tells the story of the oppression of the Jews under one of the Pharaohs of Egypt, who, having embarked on a vast building programme, required slave labour in great numbers and found it in the Semites living on the Nile delta. As the Jews increased in number, a merciless campaign to restrict the growth of this foreign minority was commenced. The deliverance of the Jewish baby named Moses and his upbringing as an adopted son of an Egyptian princess is a familiar story to us all.

Moses's entry into a brawl with the Egyptian overseer in defence of a fellow-countryman, his flight into the desert to become a wandering shepherd all lead to his crucial encounter with God and his mission, unwillingly taken, to lead, as God's representative, the Jews out of Egypt to repossess the land promised to Abraham. The narrative of the plagues, the Jews' final escape and their long wandering in the wilderness, alternating between rebellion and obedience to God, comprise the remainder of the narrative section of the book.

Amongst the vivid descriptions of the Jews' desert movements are interspersed long sections of what was later called "the law", commandments and ordinances of God, setting before the Jews a way of life acceptable to Him, and guaranteeing them social and personal harmony, a way of life to bring peace between man and man, between man and God.

The second book of the Bible thus speaks of redemption and law, freedom from slavery and a way of life given by God. On these two acts of God the subsequent history of the Jews is based.

"SOME ARE FALLEN ASLEEP"

This heading, coming from I Corinthians 15, was the text of an address which the Rector gave at a recent 8 a.m. Service of Holy Communion, and is printed in "The Chronicle" in response to requests made by parishioners who attended that Service.

The theme for to-day is the need of Grace, and by that word, we mean unmerited favour. Not one of us can progress spiritually in this life unless we see ourselves first as Christ sees us, that is, as sinners in need of a Saviour.

The natural person has a false confidence. He compares himself with his imperfect neighbours and tells himself he is as good as those around him. The spiritually minded person who is enlightened, compares himself with the perfect pattern Jesus Christ and realises how much he misses the mark.

It is very easy in this life to deceive ourselves, and millions are doing it. Though Christianity is a religion of love, a bit of fear still does us good. I often notice that people who are ill and think they are likely to die, give God and the Church a bigger place in their life. Sometimes one observes that as their health improves, they forget the Church until they have another relapse.

Their character or true self is shown up by such an action. It was the same during the war years; some attended Church and prayed hard when they had a son, husband, or loved one overseas, but as soon as the loved one returned home, they conveniently forgot God. Their religion was very shallow.

The true test of a person's religion is best seen in the days of prosperity when everything seems to be going well, rather than when sorrow or death hang over us. It is easy to cringe and growl and plead God's mercy when we are in great need—that is natural. But when life is very promising and full, and we make time for God and His Church, we are really living on a higher spiritual plane.

The words of our text "Some are fallen asleep" refer to some of the witnesses of Christ's resurrection. At the time when St. Paul was writing not all who had seen Christ after His resurrection were still alive.

Death to the body must come to all, sooner or later, but if the Risen Christ is real to us, death is transformed and will not take us by surprise. It will be a promotion to glory.

I believe that the conscience, if at all active, will be more active in the hour of death than at any time during life. It is said, "As we live, so we die." Some die like animals without a soul—no more conscious of the great hereafter than I am of the South Pole. Others are very conscious of a most pleasant experience, some hearing voices, others seeing visions, but all feeling that they are on the verge of a great and pleasant experience.

What we are at heart, rather than what people think we are, is always manifested in the last great hour on earth. Living faith is always apparent, despite physical infirmity, when we approach the portal gate. Remember God is willing to do His best for us, but if we are weak and shallow in character and neglect Him in **this life, it will be revealed** sooner or later when the great test comes.

We all need God's grace or help but if we try to bluff our way through life and neglect His overtures, we will pay dearly for our neglect **at the end.**

It is true to say, "Some are fallen asleep" spiritually, even now. They are spiritually dead and for them Christ died in vain. God is love to those who recognise His love. But to those who **reject His love, He must be a Judge demanding an exact penalty.**
