## THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory.

29th December, 1943.

Dear People of All Saints',

For some four years now the British Broadcasting Corporation has conducted a short daily session under the title of "Lift up your Hearts." These talks are very short, in fact, the whole session lasts but five minutes, and it is estimated that about five million people listen in to it at 7.55 each morning. The speakers remained anonymous until the publication of the talks, which, under the above title, have now reached their fifth series.

I pass on to you one of these talks at the end of this letter, because it fits in so appropriately with the thought I have chosen as a motto for the untrodden pathway of the New Year—the thought of Hope. The poem on our front page ends with the line, "And Hope ring in the new-born year," and that appeals to me, since Mr. Hopeful is the best of all good companions. Someone has said "Hope is the child of faith and the antidote to fear." To lose hope is to lose all the zest of living, and although it is true that hopes are sometimes disappointed, that is no argument against hoping. There is, of course, a lazy, useless kind of hope, that more or less expects good things to happen without doing a thing to make it possible for them to happen, but this is not Christian hope, which imparts strength and courage, which brings serenity, cheerfulness and good humour, and which inspires to greater and more sustained effort. What a contrast between the pathos of Job's confession "My days are spent without hope" and the buoyancy and virility in the Psalmist's "I will hope continually"!

Very largely our hearts have been set on material means of salvation, and we have thought that by the arts of science and psychology, by building up bank balances, by every kind of knowledge which exalts man and forgets God, we shall create the Kingdom of Heaven on earth. And now that man's inventions have turned in his hand and smitten him, now that treaties are despised and human faith corrupted, we are beginning to see how futile are the things wherein we have trusted. The majority of people have trusted in schemes and plans of man's making. Such schemes have been like white-washed walls. They looked well-finished, but they could not stand against the storm, they could not keep back the deluge. "Where is now man's faith in his power to run the world without God?"—that is the question which needs answering. If we, at the beginning of this new year, have the courage to admit we were on the wrong road, we, too, can yet see our hopes of a better world fulfilled. Every man who stands with Christ is helping to make world things new; every man who ignores Him or resists Him helps to keep them old and bad. If we really do desire a world wherein there dwelleth brotherhood, justice, and a righteous peace, then let us believe in these things with all our heart, mind and strength. God waits for us; and when our faith is strong enough, and our willingness to be used by Him great enough, then we shall see the vindication of our faith and the fulfilment of our hopes.

Once again we are thankful to be able to record very good Christmas services, and we would thank **ALL** who contributed to their success, not forgetting the decorators who did an excellent job, notwithstanding the absence of palms, unprocurable this year through petrol rationing. I was very glad to have the assistance of my former colleague—the Revd. A. E. Gardner—at the three celebrations on Christmas Day.

It is with regret I announce that Mr. R. H. Lewis (who has been serving here as Catechist since May last) has found it necessary to resign that position. At the moment I do not propose to appoint a successor; though when the new school term commences it may be

necessary to secure additional assistance for the classes Mr. Lewis has been taking; failing that it will mean a reduction in the number of classes taught per week.

Before we shall be able to put another "Chronicle" in your hands, we shall have a visit from the Bishop of Melanesia (the Right Revd. W. H. Baddeley, D.S.O., M.C.), who will preach here at the Evening Service on February 6th. As this will be the Bishop's first visit to All Saints', I hope you will all be present to welcome him. Will you do your utmost to make this service known throughout the parish?

In all sincerity and in "abounding hope" we wish you one and all the true happiness which comes from service to God and man, and which alone can put real meaning into the old old wish

"A Happy New Year!"

#### ABOUNDING IN HOPE.

If you have been listening all this week, you must have got our text by heart, but I will repeat it for the benefit of those who have not. St. Paul's blessing on the Christians in Rome runs as follows: "Now the God of Hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing that ye may abound in hope through the power of the Holy Ghost." (Romans xv. 13). To-day let us think about the words "abound in hope." They express the keynote of this prayer, the good thing that St. Paul had specially in mind as what his friends needed. No doubt he prays the same gift for us.

To abound in hope means to have some over and above the necessary minimum, to have some to spare. When we say that a man has abounding wealth, we mean that he has a lot to give away, and so I suppose St. Paul means that Christian people should have so much hope that they can spread it abroad. But can hope be spread or given away? I am sure it can, and anyone who has had any experience of hard or dangerous conditions will agree with me. In a shelter or a fire station or a first-aid post or a ship, when the bombs are falling or when the outlook is grim, there are some people who are never down-hearted and who are a fund of hope and courage on which others can draw. One such man or woman is worth his weight in gold when things are looking black. The Christian is the man who, beyond all others, ought to abound in hope—to have so much hope that others catch the infection and go on more bravely because he is by their side. I am afraid we are not all living up to this ideal. I have even known Christians who are specially melancholy and depressed by the war, and who seem to think that it is their duty to spread depression to others. St. Paul would have had some sharp things to say about such Christians. He told people to rejoice in the Lord, however dark the world might be, and to hope always—to abound in hope.

The Christian believer hopes for the world because he believes in God. The man who has not this foundation may well fear sometimes that the forces of evil will win, but not the man whose soul is stayed on God. He cannot believe that cruelty, falsehood, treachery and tyranny will stay the course. They have the seeds of death in them, because they are contrary to the will of God. Only good, justice, courage and love have the promise of permanence and victory. The Christian will not be completely cast down by any defeat, because he knows the last victory will always be God's.

The Christian hopes for other people because he believes that they are all meant to be God's children. One might often despair of the human

race but for this faith. I suppose one of the chief causes for depression among sensitive people is the thought of the mountains of hatred which are being piled up by the wickedness of tyrants and aggressors. Our hearts are sickened at the prospect of a world the prey to such spiritual forces. But we forget the power of the Spirit. God has never given up hope about men, and we must not. To-day let hope glow in us with a pure flame which may kindle hope in others. May we abound in hope through the power of the Holy Ghost.
