THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
Feast of St. Michael and All Angels, 1941.

Dear People of All Saints',

We are looking forward to our Confirmation Service on Sunday morning, October 26th, at eleven o'clock, which is the Sunday preceding All Saints' Day. You will be glad to know that the Rite of Confirmation will be administered this year by Bishop Hilliard. I know it will be a great joy to the Bishop to come back to his old parish, and to confirm others in the Church in which he himself was confirmed.

The parents and friends of the Confirmation Candidates will naturally wish to be present at the Confirmation Service; and where it is at all possible, I should like each candidate to invite his or her godparents to that service, so that they may have the joy of witnessing their godchildren taking upon themselves the responsibilities their sponsors undertook for them at their Baptism. In cases where distance precludes the attendance of the godparents, I suggest they be informed of the date and time of the service, so that they may support each candidate by their prayers at the actual hour of Confirmation.


The newly-confirmed will make their First Communion at the early Celebration on our Patronal Festival—Sunday, November 2—and they are expected to be present at the Communion Breakfast which follows. In this issue you will find details of the services being arranged for All Saints' Day and our Festival Sunday. We hope we may have the utmost co-operation of ALL All Saints' people in the arrangements being made for the proper observance of the Festival of All Saints.

I again earnestly ask that those whom I have prepared and presented for Confirmation in years past, will accept this letter as a special invitation to attend the eight o'clock celebration on November 2, and will endeavour to make this service an Act of Remembrance of their own Confirmation and First Communion, and an Act of Fellowship with those young people who will then be entering upon their full privileges in the Church. Many of these prepared in former years are serving in the Forces, both abroad and at home, and many have moved away from this parish; but there are still many more who can come if they will.

On Sunday evening, October 26, we shall have a special service for the relatives and friends of those serving in the King's Forces—especially inviting the relatives of those whose names are on our prayer-list. There are over a hundred names of those serving in the Army, Navy and Air Force on that list, and I specially invite their loved ones at home to come together to join with us in an Act of Corporate Prayer for, and Remembrance of them and the Cause wherein they are serving.

I again commend to you the many opportunities your Church offers you for prayer—both private and corporate. May we all come in a spirit of humility and repentance for our neglect of God and His purpose. To-day's Festival (St. Michael and All Angels) assures us of the presence of the forces of good, as well as the forces of evil; and that the real victory is to believe and to hold firm to our belief in the supremacy of the unseen things, love, goodness, and truth.

The Visit of the Bishop of Central Tanganyika.—After the last war Great Britain was entrusted with the Mandated Territory of Tanganyika.

Missionary work there proved so extremely difficult that early in 1926 the C.M.S. of Australia received a cable, "Can Australia co-operate in saving

the Tanganyika Mission?" This challenge stirred the whole Church in Australia with an enthusiasm not only to "save" the Mission, but rather to develop and strengthen its activities. A new Diocese of Central Tanganyika manned by an Australian personnel and maintained from Australian resources was established.

To organise and develop the new diocese, a man of outstanding personality and organising ability was needed. The selection fell on Rev. G. A. Chambers, M.A., then Rector of Dulwich Hill. For thirteen years Bishop Chambers has given his unbounded energy, enthusiasm and devotion to the task of spreading the Gospel among three million Africans in his charge, educating them and caring for their bodily needs.

In Australia there will always be linked with the name of Bishop Chambers, Trinity Grammar School, founded by him in 1913. Dr. Chambers believed that the Church should educate its children and he recognised both the need for and the prospects of a Church School in the Western Suburbs. For fifteen years as its Warden he devoted his energies and indomitable courage to the development of the School, with great foresight acquiring for it the fine property at Summer Hill and its Junior School property at Strathfield. While on a visit to Sydney in 1937, he renewed his great work on its behalf by securing the gifts which enabled the School Council to construct a fine modern Classroom Block, Assembly Hall and Chapel at Summer Hill. The School is now one of the most prominent of the Associated Schools, equipped with fine buildings, playing fields and swimming pool, and proud of its accomplishments in Scholarship and sport.

The School is fulfilling its Founder's hopes, particularly with regard to its notable contribution to the work of the Church. Nineteen of its Old Boys have been ordained, and others are serving as Doctors or educationists in the mission field, some of them in the Bishop's own Diocese. The Council of the School and others are preparing a warm welcome home for Bishop Chambers in October.
