THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

Feast of St. John, 1937.

Dear People of All Saints,—

In all sincerity, I wish you one and all, a very Happy New Year! I would make it more than a wish; I would make it a prayer that the year, on the threshold of which we now stand, may abound in all that makes for a full and efficient Christian life. A mistake, however, into which we all sometimes fall, lies in defining happiness in terms of material prosperity. We think of happiness in connection with worldly success, with pleasures that engross with business ventures that are successful and so on. That these have their place in life no one will deny; it is the abuse, and not the proper use, of things material against which the Bible warns us. It is therefore true to say that our lasting happiness is bound up not so much with what we get out of life as by what we put into it. If you put into life hatred and malice and all uncharitableness, these will return upon you and darken your whole outlook, but if, on the contrary, you put into life love and truth and tolerance, these in return will glorify your world. It is well for us all to remember that just as the landscape takes on the tint of the coloured window through which we view it, so our own moods and emotions colour our outlook.

I pass on to you the words of Pat McCormick in his book "Tune in to St. Martin's," which I think are particularly appropriate as we face the adventure of another year. He says, "Christianity, if it is real, simply must be affecting our personal lives, changing our lives. It is doing it with thousands of people day by day, and they show it, they can't help it; for as our Lord said 'a city set on a hill cannot be hid.' If you are trying to follow Christ you may make mistakes; you will of course, but your life will be getting nobler, finer and more courageous. May I try to describe what effect I consider it ought to be having on us in our daily lives? . . . It will be making us more honest and straight in our business and our home, putting in honest work, whatever that work may be, whether as employer or employee. . . . It will be giving us more courage to stand up for what is straight, pure and noble, when people say beastly things about others or conversation gets loose; or when they try to be smart by telling lies about people, we shall at least keep silence and show our disapproval if it is best not to speak. It will be making us more unselfish because we shall be thinking of helping others more than getting what we want ourselves. It will be making us humble and less critical of others because we remember our own failings. It will be making us glad to find we can be of use to others and able to help them in their difficulties; and above all it will be enabling us to sacrifice our time, our money and ourselves, not only without a moment's regret but with joy that we CAN be of use to God and His children. What is more it will be giving us a social conscience, so that we shall find ourselves inevitably looking upon social, economic, and international problems from God's point of view and not that of the world; from the point of view, that is, which makes us keen to serve our fellow men" . . .

After several most trying days, we were fortunate in having a much cooler day for Christmas, and we have every reason to be most thankful for our Festival Services. The kind of flowers we require were rather hard to come by this year (more especially as a nursery from which our supply comes was badly damaged by storm); but thanks to those who kindly brought gifts of flowers and greenery, and to the artistic arrangement by Miss Adams, the Church looked beautiful.

It was good to see so many communicants at the Early Celebrations on Christmas morning, but it would be better still if some of them would come more frequently. If this remark concerns YOU may I suggest a timely New Year Resolution—"To be more regular in Church attendance during

1938." There is really no excuse for people who don't come—you have a beautiful Church in which to worship and a good service; it is both your loss and ours if you refuse to join the Fellowship of the Church and neglect the many corporate acts of worship which are arranged week by week.

My sister joins me in all good wishes for the New Year.

"Let me but live my life from year to year
With forward face and unreluctant soul,
Not hastening to, nor turning from the goal;
Not mourning things that disappear
In the dim past, nor holding back in fear
From what the future veils; but with a whole
And happy heart that travels on with cheer.
So let the way wind up the hill or down,
Through rough or smooth, the journey will be joy
New friendships, high adventure and a crown . . .
I shall grow old, but never lose life's zest,
Because the road's last turn will be the best."

Thursday, January 6, is "Epiphany," which means "showing to"; that is, when Jesus Christ was shown to the Gentiles who came from afar carrying gifts to Him. We say there were three wise men, but the Bible doesn't say how many. I expect we get the idea from the three gifts mentioned. We remember at Epiphany that we have got to "show Him to" other people who don't know about Jesus. There are lots of people in the East even yet who haven't heard the story of Jesus Christ.

An old name for Epiphany was "Twelfth Day"—it was the last day of the twelve-days' Christmas holidays that were granted in King Alfred's time. I guess you are jolly glad to be alive in King George VI's time; fancy only having twelve days for your Christmas holidays!

Don't forget that we are trying to get hold of Church of England girls and boys who do not attend any Sunday School and bring them along to ours. If every girl and boy brought one new one this year, it would be a great thing. Always be loyal to your own Church. If you were baptised in the Church of England you belong to that Church, and we have a perfect right to expect you to attend your own Sunday School.
