THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

26th March, 1949.

Dear People of All Saints',

This letter will reach you during Passiontide, when our thoughts turn to the various personalities who played their part in the drama of The Cross. Our minds, of course, are first drawn irresistibly towards Him who is the chief figure in the great act which influenced all ages afterwards, and will mould and shape the destiny of ages still to come. It is well to remember that the effect of the impact of the personality of Jesus on lives to-day is just as revolutionary as it was in the first days of Christianity.

Once again we draw your attention to Good Friday and ask you to continue to protest against anything which mars the solemnity of the day on which our Lord was crucified on Calvary's Hill for us and for all mankind. Will you take your place on the side of those who, by word and deed, are endeavouring to keep **the most sacred day in the year** as a Holy Day and not a day devoted to pleasure and material gain. The Church makes ample provision for you and all her people to spend Good Friday quietly and thoughtfully. We especially commend to you the Three Hours' Service.

Holy Week (which commences on Palm Sunday, April 10), should be kept free from all social engagements, so that you may, so far as you possibly can, spend at least a portion of each day in meditation and worship. You will find details of Holy Week and Easter services in this issue. There will be no meetings of clubs and societies during Holy Week; members are invited to attend the daily services, particularly on the day of their regular meeting. We would again remind our young people that the proper observance of this Sacred Season concerns **them** as well as their elders.

Lenten boxes and envelopes should be returned on Easter Day. This year we hope to increase our Lenten gifts for the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society, so that we may do our part in helping to offset increasing costs, and also enable both societies to grasp the many opportunities for development which to-day challenge them on all sides. If you plan to be absent from the parish on Easter Day, you could help by sending or bringing your Lenten and Easter gifts before leaving.

The real proof for any historic fact lies not merely in what is written or said about that fact, but in the quality of lives lived **IN** that fact. People sometimes tell lies, and even persist in them; but no one will die for what he **knows** to be untrue! The finest proof for the fact of the Risen Christ lies in the life of His followers. Two pictures come to mind: "They all forsook Him and fled"; and the picture within a few days; the same band face the same crowds in the same streets and confront them with an apparently impossible truth, "Him hath God raised up." No longer are they afraid. Almost overnight they have become changed men through "the power of the Resurrection," which may be and can be ours. Indeed, it is only as we "know Him and the **POWER** of His Resurrection" that we can hope to solve the almost overwhelming problems of our day; a day wherein the Christian Faith and the Christian Church (which means you and me) have to face the antagonism of fierce nationalism, atheistic communism and stark paganism. Easter Day is the assurance that through pain and sorrow, through failure and death, through loss and defeat, God can bring the good cause to victory for those who trust Him.

Gifts of white flowers for the Easter Festival will be most acceptable, and should be left at the Church or Rectory no later than Saturday morning, April 16th.

With every good wish for a Holy, Happy Easter.

Harvest Festival Gifts.—The Rector wishes to pass on to you the following letter of thanks and appreciation received from Matron Claydon, of The Home of Peace:—"Will you please convey to your parishioners my sincere thanks for their generosity in once again donating to us their Harvest Festival Gifts. It is good to know that your people, while expressing thanks to God for His goodness to them, remember such a hospital as ours, so that they have a share in maintaining this Christian service. As a Church of England hospital we do need this work to be more widely known—a hospital which cares for the dying irrespective of age, nationality or creed. All the gifts sent in were much appreciated—some of the fruit has been made into jam, preserves, etc., so that we will be assured of a supply of fruit during the year. The groceries are always specially welcome, particularly so in these days of rising costs, and mean a big saving in our household bills." (The Clerical Secretary of The Home sends a receipt for £1/8/-, which was given for the Harvest Festival in lieu of gifts in kind.—Ed.)

The Annual Vestry Meeting.—You are again reminded of the Vestry Meeting which will be held in the Parish Hall on Wednesday evening, **April 27th**, at 8 p.m. We hope we may have a representative attendance at this important meeting of our Church.

Church Missionary Society.—The twelfth of April is the actual date of the founding of the Church Missionary Society, one hundred and fifty years ago. Two services to mark the occasion will be held in St. Andrew's Cathedral; Holy Communion at 12 noon, when the Federal Secretary, Rev. J. R. Hewett, will preach; and the 150th Anniversary Service, at 7.30 p.m., when Dr. Paul White will take as his subject, "One Hundred and Fifty Years On!" (We shall, of course, have our own service on this Tuesday in Holy Week; but there may be some who will be able to represent All Saints', Petersham, at one or other of the above services in the Cathedral.)

Women's Guild.—The quarterly Rally was held on March 10, when Deaconess Bransgrove gave an informative and challenging talk based upon her experiences in Tanganyika and her present work at the G.F.S. Hostel, where she is Warden. On 24th March we held our Annual Meeting with a good attendance of members. Existing office-bearers were re-elected with the addition of Miss Hayes as Vice-President. We also welcome two new members, Mrs. Baker and Mrs. Corderoy. Our programme for April is:—Thursday, 14th, Maundy Thursday, service 7.45, and business meeting afterwards to make further arrangements regarding luncheon on 4th May. The meeting for 28th April has been transferred to Wednesday 27th, at 8 p.m. so that members may attend the Vestry Meeting. The Archbishop of Sydney will be the speaker at the Annual Luncheon on Wednesday, May 4th, at 12.30 p.m., when we shall launch our appeal for £100 for C.M.S. (Diocese of Tanganyika) as a memorial to our late President, Miss E. V. Adams. Tickets for the Luncheon are now available and may be obtained from Guild members.—V. LUCAS, Secretary.

Cyclone Disaster.—The following commendation from our Archbishop appears in a recent issue of "The Church Standard":—"I write to commend the appeal which the Bishop of Rockhampton has made in your paper to repair the serious damage to churches, rectories and halls, to the orphanage, and St. Faith's School for Girls in his diocese, through the recent cyclone. The parishes are struggling for material existence, and the diocese has no resources with which to help them.
