

RECTOR'S LETTER

My Dear Friends,

This year has opened with the same old tensions and crises which point to the fact that Man's heart and human history are tragically divided by evil, in the spiritual and the material realm. The Devil works effectively in both realms, and he is a real strategist, who leaves his mark on human life and history. He leads the revolt against God. This is the problem that confronts mankind, a giant problem, that of disorder, that man has sought down the ages to solve. The ancient Greeks with their philosophy, the modern scientist with his discoveries, the way of power as expressed by a Napoleon, an Alexander or a Hitler, and the modern theory of Maxist, Communism as a world Crusade, all have been in vain. Only God can solve the problem of man's disorder.

The Head of Princeton Theological Seminary, Dr. John Mackay, in his Croll Lectures has put it this way, the Divine solution which he calls "God's unveiled Secret." The Gospel of Our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. For it is in Christ that God has disclosed His will for the world. His will is that we should be a community, not founded on the Maxist theory of a classless society, but a fellowship of love, a fellowship not founded by the ingenuity of sinful man, but upon the Divine Love of God as revealed in Christ, and therefore by the intervention of God. The answer to the problem of the world's disorder is in the person of Christ. Communion with a living Lord is the secret of a true community. It is a spiritual order and its watch words are as Dr. Mackay puts it, "by grace, through faith, unto peace." It is interesting to note that Dr. Mackay sees the Church as the "New Divine Order," as he calls it, it is the transcendental community because it comprises the complete number of God's elect, it is also an historical community because it determines the life of mankind in time and space, the Bride of Christ, and the Body of Christ. There are seven things which make the Church one, one Body, one Spirit, one hope, one Lord, one Faith, one Baptism, one God and Father of all.

How is the unity of the Church to be achieved? Here Dr. Mackay has a forthright statement which should really make us sit up and take notice. He says "by gifted men, by an effective ministry, and by Christians everywhere growing up into Christian maturity." That means, my friends, that we have to face up to what the good Doctor calls four imperatives, and every Christian should seek earnestly to act on them. They are, "Walk in the light," "Copy God," "Learn Christ," and "be filled with the Spirit." The call today is to action, to put on the "whole armour of God, and to use that most effective part of that armour all prayer." The social and individual aspects of the Christian Faith are very well summed up in these words, words which I trust we will all take to heart, "We become related to Christ singly, but we cannot live in Christ solitarily." Dr. Mackay says that "today is the great era of the Christian layman." That I believe is profoundly true, the whole Church is called to action, not merely the officers, but the N.C.O.'s and the troops. During this season of Lent may we discover afresh our relationship to Christ and through that relationship, our relationship to our fellowmen. Let us take courage and witness for God, for our Master said, "If I be lifted up, I will draw all men unto Me."

The Harvest Festival was very successful from the point of view of gifts and we are very grateful to all who sent goods, they were sent to the Home of Peace, Matron was most appreciative of the gift. The services were well attended. While I am on the subject of attendance, I do feel that we at All Saints' could still do better. It has been most encouraging to see an improvement, but it could be better. Will all who read this please endeavour to interest someone else in their church.

At the last Parish Council Meeting we had placed before us a budget for the financial year 1955-56, the estimate was very carefully prepared by the Financial Sub-Committee, and taking everything into consideration we need approximately £2,000 to run the church and pay our way. The budget

was accepted by the Parish Council and will come into operation as from the 1st April, 1955. We need to increase our giving, get more subscribers to the Duplex Envelope System, and we do need more volunteers for the very important task of District Visiting.

The Parish Council also decided on the form which the Memorial to the late Rev. C. E. Adams should take. A Rector's Stall and Prayer Desk is to be placed in the Sanctuary, this will be a fitting memorial to one who laboured so long and faithfully in this parish. It will cost approximately £130 and we will need another £15 to cover the faculty fees, and inscription. We have at present in hand £100—if anyone has not given towards this memorial yet and would like to do so we shall be glad to receive their donation.

The services during Holy Week will be announced in this month's "Chronicle" and I trust that everyone will do their best to come and share with us the spiritual uplift of these services.

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RISE OF COLOURED PEOPLES

The rise of coloured peoples will be a major feature of the second half of the twentieth century, predicts the Rev. Keith Cole in a recent report.

Mr. Cole, who is a C.M.S. Missionary and Principal of St. Paul's Divinity School, Limuru, Kenya, said that the rise of the coloured peoples, who represent more than two-thirds of the world's population, would have a tremendous impact on western civilisation.

This impact, he said, would compel the church to review her older conception of "foreign missions." This is clearly seen by the younger churches.

Mr. Cole said that it is imperative that the church face up to the question of its disunity.

He added: "The church in tribulation is inescapably thrown into unity as the dead wood of formalism and disunity is cut away to reveal the true living Church of Christ within. We have seen this in Kenya in the witness of the persecuted Church."

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MUCH BUILDING IN TANGANYIKA

African Christians do a great deal of voluntary work on church buildings in the Diocese of Central Tanganyika.

At Shunga, in the far west of Tanganyika, voluntary labour is at the present time producing a new brick church. All the bricks in the church have been made by Shunga parishioners and the building work is in their hands.

Other buildings at present being erected in the Diocese include a new nurses' home at the C.M.S. Myumi Hospital. The home will accommodate

48 nursing trainees.

A new doctor's house is also being built there.

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HOSPITALITY FOR ASIAN STUDENTS

Australian church leaders, in a joint statement, have stressed the need for church people to invite visiting Asian students into their homes.

The church leaders, who include the Primate of Australia, Dr. H. W. K. Mowll, say that, with events moving quickly, opportunities of Christian witness must be grasped while we are able.

They add: "More than 3,000 Asian students are at present in Australia. What kind of ideas will they take to their country in this age of ideological conflict? Will it be a Christian way that they advocate?"

"The answer to that depends actually on the persons they meet, the friends they make here, and where they live. Are YOU prepared to sacrifice that these young future leaders of Asia might share in our heritage?"

The Church of England has been operating a Hostel for Asian students at Drummoyne, Sydney, for some time.

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EXCELLENT EXAM. RESULTS AT C.M.S. SCHOOLS

Two girls in Uganda, who were educated at a C.M.S. School, were recently the first girls of the Bagishu tribe to complete a full secondary course and to pass the Cambridge School Certificate.

The girls, Florence Mashaba and Faith Kutosi, are now studying at the Makerere University College, Uganda.

At the C.M.S. Mvumi Girls' School, Tanganyika, all candidates in the standard eight final examinations passed. One first class pass was obtained, 16 second class and four third class.

When the Mvumi School closed at the end of term recently, 15 students left to begin work at higher standard schools and colleges. Missionaries at Mvumi have specially asked for prayer for these girls.
