### ALL SAINTS' CENTENARY ENDOWMENT FUND

One hundred years ago in 1870 the foundation stone of our Church was laid. In the years since faithful people have built this beautiful edifice, rich in tradition, saturated with prayer, to draw from it the love of God, hope of life and so that their children might be led into the ways of truth and goodness.

For one hundred years they have come for prayer, for baptism, for confirmation, for marriage and to learn Christ's teachings. It is our privilege to have inherited all the goodness they wrought by their faith and vision.

May we, in the name of God, pass on to those who follow some tangible evidence of this memorable occasion and of our own faith. We should not be less worthy than those who bestowed so much upon us.

To inaugurate our Centenary celebrations a special Commemoration Service will be held on All Saints' Day 1st November, 1970 at 3 p.m. His Excellency Sir Roden Cutler, V.C., K.C.M.G., C.B.E. Governor of N.S.W. and Lady Cutler will be in attendance. The Guest Preacher will be the Rt. Rev. F. O. Hulme-Moir, E.D., Th.L., Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Sydney.

The establishment of an Endowment Fund to Commemorate the Centenary will help to ensure the teachings of Christ in this Parish in the years to come.

The Rector, Rev. T. E. Champion and Parish Council invite you to contribute to the Endowment Fund which is now open. Every gift that is the result of self-denial is precious in His Sight who "accepteth according to that a man hath and not according to that he hath not" and "loveth a cheerful giver".

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### PARISH TEA

The Annual Parish Tea was held on Friday, 14th August, beginning at 6.15 p.m. The attendance was good but not as good as it was only a few years ago. The variety of food available was truly astonishing and it was much more than those present could accommodate. The Y.C.I. tables were outstandingly empty and this is perhaps just another indication that this body has outlived its usefulness.

The attendance at the Choral Concert in the Church was most gratifying. It appears that all who attended the tea stayed for the music.

We have reprinted from the Sydney Morning Herald a critique of the concert. Your correspondent was impressed by the ability of Mr. Gross to conduct three choirs at once but somewhat disappointed by the Cantata for a Centenary. Much of it sounded familiar. Perhaps it was described wrongly and had only been arranged for us and not written.

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### CHORAL CONCERT

Locally created music held a controlling interest in the choral and organ concert at All Saints' Church of England in Petersham after the Parish Tea on August 14th.

Most of it was entrusted to the St. Andrew's Cathedral Choral Society, with some help from the youthfully shining voices of the Petersham Girls' High School Choir and the St. Andrew's Cathedral Boys' Choir—the latter two groups joining for singing confident enough to suggest a love match rather than a shotgun wedding.

Eric Gross conducted two of his own works. "The Shepherd of Bethlehem" once again proved to be eminently well-crafted, mild, gentle music, more in sympathy with the comforts of the past than the heresies of the present, and ideal for amateurs.

Much the same goes for the extracts from his new "Cantata For A Centenary" which included an optimistic chorale and parts for organ (played by Alan Moffat) and a sort of caged carillon (played by Laurence Bartlett, who also directed the choir in his own setting of Psalm 8, in idiom English pastoral with a dash of syncopation).

On an organ with noisy pedals and a sound of limited range, Michael Hemans worked wonders with pieces of Bach, Milhaud (a pretty Pastoral dated from 1941) and—perhaps in honour of his birth centenary—Louis Vierne.


