THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

23rd September, 1950.

Dear People of All Saints',

Parents and friends of the Confirmation candidates are specially invited to be present on Sunday morning, October 29th, when the Sacred Rite of Confirmation will be administered in our Parish Church. Wherever it is possible, the Godparents of the candidates should also be present to witness their Godchildren, taking upon themselves the responsibilities their sponsors undertook for them in the Sacrament of Baptism. If, by reason of distance or any other cause, the Godparents cannot attend the service, I hope they may be advised of the date and time, that they may uphold their Godchildren and the other candidates in prayer at the actual hour of their Confirmation.

Parents! May I remind you that it is not an easy thing these young people of yours are doing at their Confirmation. Nothing really worthwhile is ever easy. They will need all the help and encouragement you can possibly give them, as they go forth to bear their witness for Christ in an apathetic, indifferent, and even a hostile world. They have been taught that they cannot hope to be true to their vows and uphold the Christian standard of life in their own strength. Therefore, they need your daily prayers, and the encouragement you can give them by helping them to be regular in their church attendance, especially in making their Communions. The greatest encouragement of all is the example of parents who **will come with them**. They have been taught also that they are not only individuals, fighting a lone battle, but members of a Church, a Body, a Society, with all the added strength that membership in a corporate Body can bring. The Church is something like a big Expeditionary Force, carrying out a vast invasion of a continent. A huge army of men and women, held together by one common purpose, under complete unity of command, guided by all the experience and research that are at men's disposal, with all the supplies and equipment readily available—we are carrying out a full-scale landing on the beaches of the devil-occupied world. The devil has his strategy: and God has His. Of course, a man who goes off by himself as a freelance, and lands somewhere else down the coast, and fights a brave hand-to-hand fight on his own, may do a bit of good; but it's nothing like what he might contribute if he took his place in the main army—and where would the battle be if we all decided to be freelances? That is one reason why the battle to-day sometimes flags, and the victory seems to be going to the enemy. The secret of our victory will be unity and co-operation, and the full use of the resources which God provides for the campaign.

In these days everybody seems to hate the idea of being **forced** to do things. But throughout the life of the nation we **insist** on care being taken of the bodies of the children. We say they **must** be educated. We will not let their minds go to ruin. What about their spirits? Man is not just a body and a mind, but a soul. If this forcible care is good for children, why not for adults?

The newly-confirmed will make their First Communion at the Eight O'clock Celebration on **Sunday, November 6**, which is our Patronal Festival. After that service they will attend the Communion Breakfast—a fellowship meal arranged to welcome these young people into full membership in God's great family—the Church.

We shall endeavour, as usual, to make our Patronal Festival a Reunion of those confirmed here during my incumbency. Many have moved away; many have become slack and indifferent. Each one concerned is asked to come to the Communion Service on November 5, making it a time of special remembrance and fellowship—remembrance of your own Confirmation and a re-dedication of yourself in the service of Christ and His Church; fellowship with your younger friends who will be, on that day, receiving Holy Communion for the first time.

As our Patronal Festival will be observed on the first Sunday in November (before another "Chronicle" can be placed in your hands), notice of the services arranged for All Saints'-tide is included in this issue.

All All Saints' people will want to be in their Church at All Saints'-tide!

A tentative date for the Sunday School Picnic is Saturday, November 18th.
