THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory, 1st July, 1946.

Dear People of All Saints',

Winter conditions, together with prevailing colds and influenza, usually mean a decrease in church attendance, especially at the early Celebrations and Evening Services. This year, being somewhat colder than usual, is no exception. It certainly does need considerably more effort to turn out for an eight o'clock Celebration, or to tear oneself away from the fire and your favourite radio station in the evening; but it would be a poor admission to have to say we are incapable of making it!

To keep alive and further any ideal or interest, you require a society of some kind. If it is Communism, you have the Communist Party; if its golf, you have a golf club; if it is the rights of plumbers, you have a plumbers' union; if it is Christianity, you have the Christian Church. Half-empty churches are supposed, very often, to be rather bad luck for the rector, and to show that, somehow, the church is a failure. What actually happens is that it is God Who is dishonoured; and that the so-called members of the Church, *not* the Church itself, are bad failures. The Christian Church is a divine society, and it was divinely instituted. It came into existence, not as a result of a few like-minded men and women saying: "Let us found a church for the advancement of Christian principles." The Church was founded by God Himself, through His Son Jesus Christ. This being so, it disposes, once and for all, of the popular idea that you can be as good a Christian outside the Church as within it. If the Church was deliberately brought into existence by Christ to be His instrument and representative in the world, then any man who disowns the Church and works against it, or remains aloof from it, is undoubtedly taking up a most un-Christian attitude. ~~He is taking up a most un-Christian attitude.~~ This is a glaring inconsistency, for, while he may be sincerely endeavouring to follow Christ's example and to put His principles into practice, in this particular matter of the Church he is flagrantly opposing Christ's own will and intentions. Surely a man cannot claim to be a very good Christian who founds his Christianity on such an act of disloyalty.

Next month we shall be observing the 43rd Anniversary of the Consecration of our Parish Church. I would be grateful if you would begin *now* to get in touch with former parishioners to invite them to attend one or more of the special services being arranged for the Consecration Festival on August 18th. We hope to have our Annual Festival Tea on the following Wednesday, August 21st, and we shall be glad to hear from parishioners willing to donate a table or a portion thereof, and also from those who would be willing to co-operate by acting as hostesses at the tea. With the co-operation of all our people the Annual Tea can be, once again, the success it has been for many years.

On our Festival Sunday—August 18th—the boxes now in use will be returned and presented. A special envelope will be issued with the August "Chronicle" for the convenience of those who have no box. There are but six weeks remaining in which to finalise our efforts for the Parish Hall Fund, and we hope that the £200 which the Wardens require for our Hall debt, will be made available. This

appeal concerns all organisations which use the parish hall, and we expect their members to respond to it either individually or corporately.

Confirmation classes will commence early in August, and I ask the co-operation of the parents of our young people in this important matter. Of course, parents cannot decide the question of Confirmation FOR their children; but they can help them considerably by their interest in their religious life, and, by their encouragement, assist them to a decision in this vital matter.

It is with regret we report that Mr. Sopwith, after nearly sixteen years' service, retired from the position of Verger of All Saints' at the end of June. We shall miss him after these years of faithful service, and we place on record our appreciation of it, while extending to him and Mrs. Sopwith our best wishes for their future. We are pleased to welcome Mr. B. T. Sayers as our Verger. Mr. Sayers is a returned serviceman, who has been connected with All Saints' for many years; we trust he will be very happy in his new and important office.

We commend to your sympathetic consideration and your practical assistance the Women's Guild Fourth Missionary Appeal, mentioned elsewhere in this issue. Forty years ago a movement started in China which was called "The Boxer Rising". A body of men known as the Boxers started riots, in order to stamp out Christianity and drive the foreigners out of China. Scores of missionaries and thousands of Chinese Christians were put to death. In London, one of the Missionary Societies held a great meeting. Speakers told of the horrors of the rising; then another speaker rose and said, "We will be revenged! We will send more missionaries!" A remarkable kind of revenge, but, because of it, there are many thousands of Christians in China to-day. Are we "big" enough Christians to apply the story to Japan, and say: "We will be revenged! We will send more missionaries"?

Fourth Missionary Appeal.—The Appeal this year is for £100 towards sending the Christian message to Japan. Do you know that 10,000 Japanese Christians were killed by the atomic bomb dropped on Nagasaki last August? The attack on the city was one of the tragedies of war in which just and unjust perished alike. Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the two cities selected for atomic bombing, were, in fact, the chief centres of Christianity in Japan. The survival of Christianity at Nagasaki provides a remarkable story. In 1549 missionaries first visited Japan to teach Christianity, but Christians were massacred in 1597 and persecution raged for 50 years, after which the gates of Japan were closed to Christianity, for another 200 years. In 1858, when missionaries were allowed into Nagasaki they were amazed to find that the Christian faith still persisted. It must be clear to all thinking people, that, now the war is over, Christianity promises to have great influence on Japan's future, hence this appeal. Donations for June: Mr. and Miss Peard £1. This brings (with promises) the sum of £35 in sight. Our objective, £100 by Advent Sunday.—E. V. Adams, Organiser.

Sydney Women's Auxiliary, A.B.M.—The Secretary writes:

"In order to remember the work of the New Guinea Mission, a Pilgrimage to Camden is being arranged by the Sydney Women's Auxiliary of the Australian Board of Missions for Saturday, August 10th, 1946, August 10th being the day on which the Pioneer Missionaries landed in Papua, 55 years ago.

"In the grounds of the old historic Church of St. John's, Camden, is the grave of the Rev. Copland King, one of the Pioneer Missionaries. It is the desire of the committee to make this time a fitting commemoration of the work which has been done in New Guinea.

"It is proposed to hold a Service in the church and at the grave, and for those wishing to have a picnic lunch in MacArthur Park, opposite the church, hot water for tea will be provided at a small cost. Further details will be published later, but the Secretary would be very glad to hear of any available seats in cars."
