## THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

26th April, 1937.

Dear People of All Saints',—

Rain, and a temperature suggestive of the first breath of Winter, somewhat spoiled the attendance at our Vestry Meeting. Nevertheless, there were some fifty parishioners present on April 14, when Messrs. W. P. Bannan and S. L. Rankin were unanimously re-elected People's Wardens, and Mr. E. C. King again honoured me in accepting nomination as Rector's Warden. The meeting elected to the Parish Council Messrs. F. L. Browne, J. M. Boyle, L. C. Calver, A. S. Cusiter, D. B. Hunter, H. F. Jones, E. G. Marshall, W. Sopwith, Jnr., and J. Williams. Subsequently Messrs. R. J. Gray, W. F. Stephenson and W. Webster kindly accepted my nomination. We welcome as new members of the Council, Messrs. F. L. Browne, R. J. Gray, W. Sopwith, and W. Webster; at the same time placing on record our appreciation of retiring members.

It is encouraging to know that we completed the year with a credit balance—something, our Treasurer tells us, which has not occurred at All Saints' in all his 31 years' experience; so we are most thankful. Two Easters falling within our financial year have helped towards this satisfactory result, but even without the second Easter we would have come out on the right side of the ledger. We hope we may complete this financial year in the same way, but we must bear in mind we shall have no Easter in the financial year, 1937-38, and plan accordingly if we want to achieve this objective. The foregoing is, of course, apart from the outstanding Synod Assessment, which is a debt incurred before I came to this parish, and one which, like a spectre rising out of the past, haunts me to such an extent that I often wish something could be done to rid us of it. Not until that debt is paid can parishioners of All Saints' claim the right of nomination.

Altogether we have had a very encouraging year from every point of view. I am pleased to note an increase in the number of communicants, and I am sure this could be even better. There are numbers of people who communicate only upon the Great Festivals such as Christmas and Easter, and I earnestly invite any who may have become slack in this matter, to

accept the privileges your Church so abundantly provides by making your Communion more regularly. Whilst not in any way detracting from the Spiritual value of the other services, Holy Communion is our Lord's own service, and we ought "not refuse to come thereto, being so lovingly called and bidden by God Himself."

If there be any adults who cannot come because they have not been confirmed, a special class can be formed—if the number warrants it—when the younger people commence their preparation early in August.

I would like to record my gratitude to all our church officers, to the members of our various organisations, and to all parishioners and friends who have loyally supported all efforts made during the year past for the building up of the Kingdom of God.

We intend to do without a fete this year for we do not consider the result is an adequate return for the immense amount of work put into such an effort. In lieu thereof a small box has been issued into which you are invited to put what a fete would have cost you, or what you may have spent at a fete. Between the issue of the boxes and August 15 (our Consecration Festival) there is a period of sixteen weeks, and if you and your friends will put something in your box each week, I am sure we shall exceed the result of last year's fete. Eighty-one boxes have already been taken. I would like to have at least 150 of them in use; if any parishioner is willing to help in this way please advise any of the church officers, or your District Visitor, and a box will be forthcoming. The idea is, that the proceeds of anything you make and sell amongst your friends, or of any effort you arrange for the Parish Hall Fund shall be placed in your box and returned on Sunday, August 15th. Stallholders at last year's fete and their helpers might co-operate in this matter, but whatever arrangements you make, I am confident that if all parishioners will adopt this plan with keenness and enthusiasm we need have no anxieties as to its success.

The girls and boys of our Sunday School have already commenced their Brick-Selling Campaign for the proposed Kindergarten Room. Every brick they sell will bring us nearer to the day when we may invite you to the laying of the Foundation Stone of the Memorial Kindergarten. It would be fine if we could have it erected by the end of this year. I commend the effort to you on behalf of the children.

This month of May brings Coronation Day and all that it signifies for our Empire. It is far more than a great spectacular event, and has a deep religious significance, indeed, it is essentially a religious act. It takes place in a Christian Church, venerated by English-speaking peoples throughout the world. The principal ceremonies are performed by the head of the Anglican Communion—the Archbishop of Canterbury—and the whole ceremony is incorporated in the highest act of Christian worship, the Holy Communion. Our King and Queen come to the throne in troublous and uncertain times, and we can best support them by our prayers. I invite you, therefore, to come to the Coronation Service on Sunday morning, May 9th, at 11 o'clock, when the special form of service approved by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York will be used. There will also be a Celebration of Holy Communion on Wednesday, May 12th, at 10.30 a.m., when we shall especially remember King George VI and Queen Elizabeth (actually in the very early hours of Coronation Day in England) before the Throne of the King of Kings.

**Y.P.U.**—The members of the Y.P.U., under the leadership of Miss Adams, are busily working for a small sale in aid of the Medical Gift Appeal for Missions, to be held in June. A missionary play, "A Birthday Dream," will be part of the programme arranged by the members on that occasion.

At the first meeting in May a very interesting debate was held on the subject, "That the imposition of the proposed speed limit is justified." The discussion opened up the whole problem of modern transport, the cares of the motorist and woes of pedestrians, with many sidelights on traffic control. The debate was opened by Mr. F. L. Browne as Premier, and Mr. A. J. Walters led the Opposition. The division resulted in the adoption of the scheme, although the consensus of opinion seemed to be that the problem was more one of mental adjustment and personal care rather than stricter police administration.

The 102nd issue of the Manuscript Journal was released on May 16th.

All the new writers were represented, and the influence of the newer members was seen in articles of a different type and fresh style. Contributions dealt with the Spanish war, Church attendance, the Y.C.I. Baseball game, Memories of the Great War, and the usual batch of personal quips and pars of Institute matters.

Thirty-five members attended the annual Bucks' picnic, held at Hollywood on Saturday afternoon, May 17th. A fleet of cars transported the boys to the grounds, where a sports programme was held, which included cricket, races, tug-of-wars, and football. **Trinity Grammar School** celebrated Founders' Day on Saturday, April 6th, at Summer Hill. The occasion had more than the usual interest because the founder of the school, the Rt. Rev. G. A. Chambers, D.D. (Bishop of Central Tanganyika) was the principal speaker. About five hundred friends of the school assembled for the commemoration, and the Most Rev. the Archbishop presided.

Special references were made by the speakers to the proposals of the School Council to erect at Summer Hill a new classroom block, and hopes were expressed that the buildings would be ready before next Founders' Day, when the school would be celebrating its 25th year since foundation.

**Broadcast by Bishop of Tanganyika.**—The final broadcast by the Bishop of Central Tanganyika will be given on **Sunday, May 16th, at 4 p.m., from Station 2CH.** This will be one of the last opportunities of hearing the Bishop tell the wonderful story of Tanganyika. Churchpeople are asked to listen-in, and invite others to do so, thus giving the Bishop the fellowship of their sympathy as he speaks.

Tanganyika is the Australian Church's sphere of influence in East Africa. It is good for us to know of the latest developments in that vast field of opportunity which God has brought within our reach.

**St. Andrew's Cathedral Centenary Celebrations.**—We refer you to the April Chronicle and the notices in the church porch regarding the programme for the Centenary, May 16th to 22nd.

The Celebrations Committee has decided to arrange for a special performance for children of the Pageant of early Church History. This performance will be on Saturday, May 22nd, at 2.30 p.m., and will be in addition to the three performances arranged for 20th, 21st, and 22nd May in the evening.

This special performance is primarily for the children of our **Sunday Schools** and their teachers, and children at our **Church Schools**. Special prices are being charged for admission, namely children 9d. and adults 2/-. The issue of adults tickets is limited to one for every ten children's tickets purchased. Children who desire tickets should advise the Rector as soon as possible.

**Diocesan Festival.**—Tuesday, May 18th.—All Saints' will again have its own table at the Festival Tea, and we hope that many parishioners will gather round it. The Festival is a great opportunity for re-union with old friends. The Rector has a few tickets left for the second sitting of tea at 6.45 p.m. The speakers at the public meeting will be The Most Rev. The Archbishop of Melbourne and the Right Rev. The Bishop of Central Tanganyika.

**British and Foreign Bible Society.**—The Rev. G. W. Sheppard, of China (acting Commonwealth Secretary of the Society), will address a United Meeting in All Saints' Parish Hall, on Monday, May 10th, at 8 p.m. It is hoped that All Saints' will be well represented at this meeting.

**Religious Instruction in Schools.**—Miss Neill, after many years of faithful service in this sphere, resigned at the end of last school year, owing to indifferent health. We cannot speak too highly of her work, nor say how much we regret that she has found it necessary to relinquish her post. So far, no one has been appointed in her place by the Diocesan Board of Education, and the prospects of another teacher would seem to be remote. Miss Atkinson has kindly taken over the two classes of Stanmore Infants, and Miss Neill herself has volunteered to take one period on Thursday mornings at Stanmore Boys' Primary. The Rector is very grateful for this assistance.

**Personal.**—We extend our sympathy to Mr. A. S. Cusiter in his recent unfortunate accident. We are glad to say he is making slow but sure progress towards recovery, and we trust he may soon be with us again.

Congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. V. A. Cleary upon the birth of a son on April 19th, thus elevating our good churchwarden, Mr. E. C. King and Mrs. King to that state of dignity synonymous with grandparentage.
