THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
25th September, 1944.

Dear People of All Saints', —

The parents and friends of the Confirmation candidates will, of course, wish to be present at the Confirmation Service on Sunday morning, October 22, at eleven o'clock. Where it is at all possible, I would ask that the godparents of the candidates be invited also, so that they may be able to witness their godchildren assuming the responsibilities which their sponsors undertook for them in the Sacrament of Baptism. Even if the godparents are unable to be present, they would, I am sure, like to know the date and time of the service, and thus be able to remember the candidates in prayer at the actual time of the Confirmation.

The newly-confirmed will make their first Communion at the eight o'clock celebration on our Patronal Festival Sunday, October 29, being the Sunday before All Saints' Day. I am hoping we may have the customary Communion Breakfast for them.

We shall again endeavour to make the Patronal Festival a reunion of all those confirmed here during my incumbency. I know it is not so easy to do this now, with so many of the younger people scattered abroad in the Services; but there are some of them with us still, and I hope they will use the Festival as a day of remembrance and fellowship—remembrance of their own Confirmation, and Fellowship with those who, on that day, will be entering upon the full privileges of membership in God's great family—the Church.

Elsewhere in this issue you will find details of the services arranged for All Saints-tide. We expect all our people to "rally round" both morning and evening on Sunday, October 29. In the morning we shall have the Bishop of Tasmania (the Right Reverend G. F. Cranswick), who is linked with All Saints' through the fact that this is the Church of his Baptism, and by a long and close personal friendship with your rector; and in the evening we shall welcome the Bishop of Adelaide (the Right Reverend B. P. Robin), who will be paying his first visit to All Saints'. We would especially remind the parents of the children's Festival Service on Sunday morning, November 5; we expect them to show their interest in their young people and in what the Sunday School is doing for them, by being present at that service; when Dr. Paul White will be the occasional preacher. In the evening we shall have the Bishop of Armidale, who is always a very welcome visitor to All Saints', Petersham.

There is so much to be included in this issue, that this letter must be somewhat curtailed, but I do ask that the parents and friends of our young people who will shortly enter into full membership of the Church will encourage them in every way to be loyal to their Confirmation vows. They are going out into a world where they will meet many who say they can do without God and find no need for prayer or for the Church. They can be decent and good without these things, they tell us. I wish one could get such people to realise that it is possible for them to achieve that "decent" quality of life only because they are living on spiritual capital, embedded in the Christian heritage, which the Church has preserved and handed on through the centuries. It may be possible for society to live on its spiritual capital for one or two generations (as it is doing to-day), but let it continue to the third or fourth generation and ultimately it will achieve nothing but a spiritual and moral bankruptcy.

I had hoped to write concerning the establishing of a fund to provide a suitable parish War Memorial, but this must be held over until next issue.
