1965-66

New South Wales

MABEL WYLLIE

8.5.1907 – 12.6.1995

Mabel was a founding Mother of ACW. At the time when Australian Council of Churches Secretary, Rev Harvey Perkins was looking for someone to initiate moves to create a national body for church women, he approached Mabel Wyllie and gave her the commission to 'do something'. Unbeknown to her, NSW State Unit had already made representation to sister Units in other States asking for their reaction to the idea of a National Committee for Australian Church Women. The fortunate meeting of Mabel Wyllie and Marjory Verco resulted in the eventual forming of ACW National Committee, the first executive of which was drawn from NSW members. Mabel Wyllie was appointed the President and served her term with distinction.

With degrees and a diploma from the Universities of Adelaide, Melbourne and Sydney, Mabel lectured in Social Anthropology at Australian School of Pacific Administration.

Mabel served with her husband in Methodist Church appointments in Hobart, Hamilton (Vic), Geelong and Wesley College, University of Sydney. She was a member of Overseas Mission Board and Women's Auxiliary, and was a representative to the WCC Assembly in New Delhi in 1961.



She was on WCC Central Committee 1961-68, the Committee on Cooperation of Men & Women in Church, Family and Society, and Commission on World Mission and Evangelism.

Mabel understood the importance of keeping the records of an organisation safe for future generations. She set up the beginning of the Archives of National Executive.

"My training and experience had encouraged my enthusiasm for the Ecumenical Movement – an enthusiasm shared with my husband. I heard him say many times – 'Ecumenism is not an optional extra, it is at the heart of the Gospel – that they all may be one.'

"I found the meetings of the Central Committee of WCC a great inspiration – Bible study, addresses, devotional services, business meetings, meal times, getting to know people from other Christian Churches and other countries – the Russian Orthodox, the Greek, the Armenian. I wanted more Australian women to share in this Ecumenical adventure."

Following a Central Committee meeting in Toronto Mabel visited the USA and attended a Conference of Church Women United. There she learnt about the Fellowship of the Least Coin and cooperation of Christian women of all major denominations in the States.

She was convinced that the life of women in the churches of Australia could be enriched in a similar ecumenical organisation.

1967-68

Victoria

CATHERINE RITCHIE

16.8.1909 – 15.2.2003

Cath Ritchie was a life-long advocate for the spiritual formation and theological education of women. Growing up in the Gippsland district of Arawata, she was educated at the local one-teacher primary, then Korumburra Higher Elementary and Leongatha High School. She then graduated from Melbourne University with an Arts degree.

When she was asked to consider going as a missionary to Korea she committed herself to two years residence in Rolland House, the Presbyterian Deaconess and Missionary Training College, while she completed a Diploma of Education and studied Theology. She went to Korea in 1937. At that stage, Korea was under Japanese rule, and in 1941, as Japan entered World War II, Australian missionaries were forced to return to Australia. Later in 1945 she was appointed principal of Rolland House. She was to remain there for 23 years. And at a time when women had no place at all in the courts of the church, she obtained for the young women who entered Rolland house to train, a theological education equal to that given to the young men being formed for ordination . . . alongside those young men, in the same classrooms at Ormond College, from the same illustrious professors.

Cath dealt constantly with Presbyterian Assembly officers and staff, the Senatus of the Theological Hall of Ormond College, principals and teachers of state schools, the Presbyterian Women's Missionary Union, various auxiliaries, winning the respect of all. Her efforts paved the way for the complete integration of the education of women and men called to Diaconal



ministry with that for future Ministers of the Word under the United Faculty of Theology.

Keenly ecumenical, Cath encouraged her students and graduates to forge, with her, strong links with church workers in other traditions. She was supportive of the move towards the formation of the Uniting Church in Australia achieved in 1977.

She served as National President of Australian Church Women from 1967 to 1968.

On the 22 April 1994 the Melbourne College of Divinity conferred on Deaconess Ritchie the degree of Doctor of Sacred Theology in recognition of her work as a theological teacher, and in particular of her contribution to the theological education of women across denominational divisions and state boundaries.

Cath Ritchie never really retired. She continued to be active in church and community to the end of her life. Just three weeks before her death she conducted a service of Holy Communion for the residents of the aged care facility into which she had recently moved. It was also in her retirement years that she researched the history of the Presbyterian Deaconess Order, published in 1998.

1969-71

Victoria

ELIZABETH (BETTY) ASHTON

12.2.11 – 28.5.71

A graduate of the University of Melbourne, Betty was a woman of grace and charm, with a trained mind, broad sympathies and an understanding heart. She brought to her office all the rich gifts of her whole personality. Service was the keynote of her life and her influence will live on. She was a long time member of Union Church in Hong Kong, sang in the choir, and worked hard fund-raising for the Mission to Lepers. On returning to Australia Betty and Frank attended the Collins Street Independent Church, though Betty was Presbyterian.

Betty married Dr F R Ashton just prior to the Japanese occupation of Hong Kong. Shortly after their marriage, both Betty and her husband were imprisoned in Stanley Prison from 1941 to 1945. Here they both worked for the welfare of the prisoners.



She had a firm faith which was thus tested in the fires of experience. Of her grim experiences through those years, Mrs Ashton spoke little. The hardships and privations did not embitter her, rather was her spirit refined and her faith intensified.

Mrs Ashton became National President of Australian Church Women when the Executive was in Melbourne in 1969.

She was also National President of the YWCA 1969-71.

She was one of a delegation of five who attended Asian Church Women's Conference at Sukahumi, Indonesia in 1970 where her participation was much appreciated.

1971-73

Queensland

JESSIE DENNIS

11.5.1907 – 22.9.1992

Jessie led a very active life in the Presbyterian Church, being elected an Elder in 1971. She was Secretary and then President of the Presbyterian Women's Association, and was one of four Australian Delegates elected to General Assembly of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches held in Nairobi, Kenya, in 1970.

After Union, Jessie continued her work in the Uniting Church, as Vice-President of the Auxiliary to World Mission, and Home Mission Auxiliary. She was President for twenty years of the Australian Inland Mission, being a personal friend of Dr John Flynn and his successor, Rev Fred McKay.



Jessie was a member of the Queensland Unit of Women's Inter-Church Council, later named Australian Church Women, and served as Secretary, then State President.

Jessie Dennis was National President, the first woman in the Queensland Unit to hold that position, and served her term in 1971. In all, she served more than 25 years and was made a Life Member in recognition of her service and dedication to the Unit.

Jessie was fond of writing and reciting poetry; the following was found in her effects, and read at the funeral service. Jessie Dennis was a special person loved by all.

*Her body has gone to the earth, and it will become dust
But her spirit is in the air –
It will whisper to me on the wind,
I shall hear it on running waters,
It will hide in the morning music of the birds,
And in the lonely night cry of the owl.*

1973-75

South Australia

JOY SMITH

When Joy Smith filled the role of President of the Australian Church Women Working Committee she was the immediate past President of the South Australian Unit of ACW.

She had been President of the Methodist Women's Fellowships Association of SA, serving diligently at both State and General Conference levels. The high regard in which she was held was demonstrated by the fact that she was elected to the special President's Committee, the only woman accorded this honour.

At the ACW National Committee Meeting in 1974 Joy's name was put forward to attend the Asian Church Women's Conference Assembly in Bangkok in October that year. Along with three other Australian women she attended, and made an effort on her return to share reports of her experiences to State Units whenever possible.



1975-77

Western Australia

DOROTHY WACKER

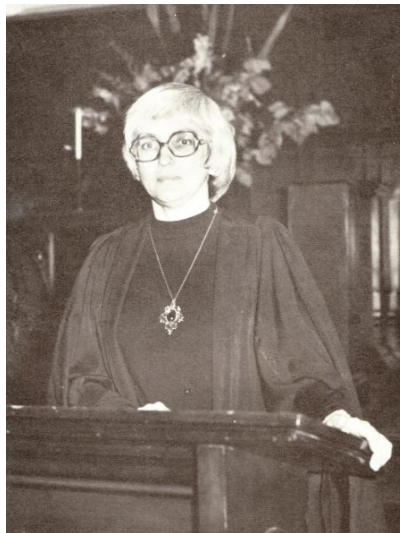
Born in 1931, Dorothy Wacker grew up in Gatton in the Darling Downs region of Queensland. She was the eldest of four children born to George and Annie Wacker.

As a child she, like her siblings, was an excellent student across a range of subjects. Newspaper accounts mention her winning prizes in mapmaking and in music. In music she continued her success in adolescence, gaining 100% in the Trinity College examination.

In 1944 as top eligible student in the state she gained a bursary from the Rechabites Order to enable her to continue her studies. The following year she received a bursary from the Gatton School of Arts.

After leaving school she trained as a teacher, specializing in the teaching of deaf children, and worked at Queensland School for the Deaf in Dutton Park.

By 1953 Dorothy was experiencing a call to ordained ministry in the Congregational Church. At this time the Congregational Church was the only one in Australia to ordain women, and Dorothy was the first to be ordained in Queensland. During her training for ministry she studied both at the University of Queensland (the only woman enrolled in the divinity course) and at the Queensland



Congregational Theological College. She was ordained in 1959 and spent the next twenty years in Christian ministry, first as minister to various churches in Brisbane, then as Director of Christian Education in that state. In 1970 she came to Perth, where she served in Applecross. At the time of the inception of the Uniting Church in 1977 she was President Elect of the Congregational Union of Australia.

She served as National President of Australian Church Women from 1975 to 1977. She is remembered as an inspiring preacher and leader, able to connect with people from a variety of backgrounds through her strong Christian faith and sensitive and caring nature. She was also noted for her strong commitment to ecumenism at both national and international level.

From Western Australia she went to Pilgrim Church in Adelaide, and subsequently (1981) made the difficult decision to leave formal church ministry to focus on the wider field of women's spirituality. She is considered as a pioneer in this field within Australia, and is deeply respected as a teacher, researcher and mentor. She currently (2015) resides in Canberra.

1977-79

New South Wales

WIN DOUGHERTY

14.7.1919 – 26.12.1994

Win Dougherty was appointed as a delegate to Australian Church Women (NSW Unit) by the Methodist Church, through the Federation of Methodist Women, NSW.

She was elected State Secretary of ACW and served in that position from 1967 to 1970.

When it came the turn of the Methodist Federation to nominate a State President for ACW, the Federation chose Win Dougherty, who was installed in that position in 1973 at Chatswood Central Church. She served for one year.

In 1977 she was appointed to the position of National President of ACW and led a team of NSW women for two years. She chaired the National Conference in Sydney in 1979.

It was at this Conference that a delegation from Church Women United (USA) came on a "Causeway Visit". Win later returned this visit leading a team of Australian women to the United States.



In 1977 the NSW Unit made Win Dougherty a Life Member.

During 1978 she was the Australian representative to the Asian Church Women's Conference in Japan. Win served both as a Methodist and a Uniting Church delegate to ACW with great distinction. Her knowledge of and interest in ACW was profound. She was a tireless worker for all organisations in which she served. NSW members of ACW are grateful for all the association we have had with this great lady.

1979-81

Tasmania

RACHEL COCKS

1919 - 1995

Rachel attended Hobart schools before undertaking Nursing Education at Royal Hobart Hospital from 1938-1944. This included Certificates for General Nursing 1942, Child Health Care & Obstetric Nursing 1943, and Tuberculosis Nursing 1960.

She worked as a District Nurse West Coast Tasmania 1944-1946, followed by a term as Medical Missionary Nurse with London Missionary Society Gemo Island Hospital and Gulf District, Papua 1946-1960. Rachel then became a Charge Sister and Assistant Matron Royal Hobart Hospital 1960-1971.

In 1970 she married the Rev Norman Cocks.



Rachel's involvement with Australian Church Women included Secretary Tasmanian State Unit 1970, National Representative Asian Church Women's Conference 1974-1978, and National Representative ACWC and Member of Executive 1978-1982 National President Australian Church Women 1979 -1981.

1981-83

Victoria

ELIZABETH ALFRED

10.1.1914 – 2.2.2015

Mary Elizabeth Alfred was born in Yarrawonga, one of seven children of Jessie and William Alfred. Educated in Bairnsdale and Bendigo, she was awarded a scholarship to Girton CEGGS. In 1924 she joined Brownies which led to a life-long involvement in the Guiding movement. At the age of 17 Elizabeth felt the call to ministry and, not long after that, left the public service to test her vocation. After professional training at Deaconess House, and classes at Ridley and Trinity Colleges with men, she was ordained as a Deaconess on St Thomas Day 1944.

Elizabeth worked at Brighton Children's Home, St Mark's Fitzroy, the Mission of St James and St John, Kedesh home for Unmarried Mothers, Fairhaven STD Hospital, and St Agnes' Girls Home Glenroy. Christ Church South Yarra and St James' Dandenong followed, the latter being a vibrant and exciting parish with a diverse community.



In 1957-58 she travelled to Britain, working as a tutor at an ecumenical College in Selly Oak. On her return to Australia she taught at Girton CEGGS, and then became Principal of Deaconess House in 1961. The Girls' Friendly Society, Mothers' Union Councils and Chaplaincy at Fairfield and the Royal Women's Hospital all benefited from Elizabeth's contribution.

In ACW Elizabeth became President of the Victorian Unit in 1971-1972 and again in 1980-1981. From 1981-1983 she was National President of ACW.

She later joined the Soroptimists and the Lyceum Club. With a renewed interest in Guides she served on their State Council, representing them at ACW.

Elizabeth supported the Ordination of women to the Anglican Priesthood, and was a member of General Synod which, in 1985, finally voted for this to happen. She travelled straight from Sydney to Hobart to attend the ACW Conference, arriving during a session. "I entered the room, the women looked at me and I shouted 'We won! We won!'" There was much loud cheering and clapping. Elizabeth was ordained Deacon in 1986, and Priest in December 1992.

She loved travel and led Pilgrimages to the Holy Land. Retiring to Carrum Downs Settlement, she became involved in the life of the community, assisting with services both there and at St James' Dandenong, until 1995. On 10 January 2014, the Reverend Elizabeth Alfred presided at the Eucharist at St James' Dandenong, on her 100th birthday – a little frail in body, but strong in voice. She died on 2 February 2015, and as she says in her autobiography *Called to Serve* – "I've had a wonderful life!"

1983-85

Queensland

LENA MEADOWS

3.3.1910 – 26.3.2004

Lena was a member of the Coorparoo Presbyterian Church. She was a member of the Presbyterian Women's Missionary Union and the Presbyterian Women's Association. She was also a member of a National Committee of PWA. Lena spent time travelling Queensland country areas, speaking at rallies and conferences and leading Bible study groups.

Lena was very involved in Aged Care within the Presbyterian Church, especially the Hopetoun Aged Care Centre in Corinda. She was also chairperson of the Aged Care Committee, Queensland Assembly of the Presbyterian Church. Lena was involved in the building and maintenance of the Presbyterian camp property at North Tamborine.



Lena joined Australian Church Women in 1973, and was Fellowship of the Least Coin Convener 1974-90. From 1983-85 Lena was National President of ACW. She was an observer to Queensland Council of Churches for several years.

Lena had a great love for her family, for her church, for the Fellowship of the Least Coin movement and wearing large hats, especially large black ones. She had a very strong faith, was a leader, excellent chairperson, and was greatly respected by all with whom she worked. She and her husband would take their holidays when the biennial Australian Church Women's Conferences were held, and share time together as they travelled.

1985-87

South Australia

DOROTHY HAENSEL

Dorothy grew up in the Presbyterian Church - a daughter of the manse. From 1955-1971 she was a member of the United Church of North Australia - although the United Church was Congregational - Methodist - Presbyterian, because the only other churches in Darwin at that time were the Anglican, Greek Orthodox, Roman Catholic and Salvation Army, the membership of the United Church included the rest! Baptist, Church of Christ, Lutheran, Plymouth Brethren to name a few that come to mind.

Moving to Adelaide in 1971, she joined the local Congregational Church which was part of a United Parish with three Methodist congregations. She also had association with the Presbyterian Church through the Australian Inland Mission Support group (now Frontier Services). Dorothy was involved on the Interim Fellowships committee leading up to the formation of the Uniting Church in 1977.

Currently a member of the Mansfield (Vic) Uniting Church, Dorothy is an active Lay Preacher and is authorised to preside at the Sacraments.

Her interests include travelling - mainly to visit scattered family; reading and craft - patchwork and knitting.



Dorothy was introduced to ACW by Lillian Wells (NSW) when she visited Darwin in about 1968. Her aunt, Grace Faichney (Vic), was on the interim committee that worked to establish ACW in 1965, and Dorothy's mother was probably a member of the Queensland Unit between 1969-1972. She certainly attended meetings.

Dorothy joined the SA Unit in 1974, going straight on to Executive as WKS Convener - so was never a denominational representative. She did a five year term as WKS Convener, and for part of that time was also FLC Convener - for about two years. There was no Special Days Convener so she was also responsible for Fellowship Day Services, and for the time also World Community Day.

She became Vice-President in 1980, as Incoming President for the biennium 1981-83 and then again VP as Past President in 1984. From 1985-87 Dorothy was National President, and from 1987-1991 a Trustee for WKS Trust. She was made a Life member SA Unit. She attended a number of National Conferences, the first in 1975 and also two ACWC Assemblies.

Dorothy served as ACWC Assembly Secretary 1987-1990. Bonmee Julkiree (Thailand) was appointed Assembly Secretary at the 1986 ACWC Assembly, but then resigned after a few months, and as the next one in the vote Dorothy was appointed.

1987-89

Western Australia

2001-03

LEE EDWARDS

Lee was born in Kalgoorlie, but the family moved to Tuart Hill when she was two. After attending the local school she then went to Girdlestone Girls High where she completed a commercial course. Lee started work at 15, and had 6 months as a governess, before starting nursing. She was happily settled in this profession when her minister at Perth Wesley challenged her to become a deaconess. She candidated in late 1954, studying for 2 years at Barker Theological College. Work as a deaconess took Lee to Midland, and to a City Mission in Melbourne. In WA she was at Mullewa, before a post as assistant to the Director of Home Mission in Perth, which included part time in a new congregation at Belmont. Serving as assistant at Bunbury, Fremantle and Mt Hawthorn followed.

Following her marriage to Ray Edwards in 1968 she had to resign from the Order of Deaconesses. They lived at Burekup and then Bunbury, both being involved in the local circuit. Lee was received back into the Deaconess Order at the first WA Uniting Church Synod in 1977. She completed a Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1980, and also Licentiate of Theology studies.



From 1979 Lee served for six years at Harvey-Waroona, where she was ordained as a Minister, and at Yarloop. Her next call was Gosnells Parish, and while there Ray died in 1985. She then had a three year term in Rotherham Circuit, South Yorkshire before her return to Victoria Park, to unite four congregations into one. Lee retired at the end of 1996.

Within ACW Lee has served two terms as National President of Australian Church Women. At State level she has held various leadership positions over many years.

Uniting Church Adult Fellowship also benefitted from Lee's leadership as National President. During her three year term she travelled widely in Australia, and to conferences in Samoa, Papua New Guinea and Malaysia.

Lee has been involved in Guiding, as a Guide, Ranger, Guide leader, and WA Chaplain. She has also belonged to Soroptimists and to Business and Professional Women. She still enjoys the Trefoil Guild meetings and friendships.

Travel within Australia and many other countries has been a great love for Lee, and she has valued every opportunity to see God's wonderful world and people.

Her retirement years have included family time, many friends, taking occasional Services at Perth Wesley and other churches, reading, TV programs, membership of the Wellspring Community, movies, and being free to say no on occasion. She continually thanks God for a long worthwhile life with challenge and enrichment.

1989-91

New South Wales

MARIE McCANN OAM

Born 1925 in Melbourne, Marie McCann was educated at Presentation College to Matriculation, a BA at the University of Melbourne and M.Theol, BD at the University of Sydney. Marie is the mother of five children, and a grandmother.

Marie's many church activities include National Catholic Girls Movement, Parish of Chatswood, convener and organiser Meals on Wheels, President Parish Ball Committee, Secretary Chatswood Catechists for five schools and 29 catechists. President Loreto Parents and Friends Committee, Member Catholic Women's League. Organist East Roseville Church and Star of the Sea Milson's Point. Committee Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults Association – to welcome newcomers who wish to join the church.

In 1977 Marie became a Catholic representative to ACW NSW State Unit and held office as *Newsette* distributor, Secretary, State President in 1979, and Convener for Special Days. From 1989-91 Marie was National President.



For over 30 years she has been actively involved in ACW in many ways. She has given her time, abilities and gifts generously, and has been a great influence and encouragement to many along the way.

Marie attended the 1982 ACWC Assembly in Bali, and was a delegate to the 1990 ACWC meeting in Bombay. She toured China with nine theologically trained Asian women, and was a speaker on the position of Australian Children and their concerns in Sri Lanka, Colombo. She also attended the FLC Silver Jubilee in Manila Philippines, and the 2006 ACWC Assembly in Kuala Lumpur.

Marie was made a NSW State Life Member in 1997 in recognition of her leadership and friendship in Christian Service.

Part of Marie's motivation is revealed in her comment: "ACW transforms Christ's 'Love' into tolerance, listening to other Christians, and using the bond, which comes from knowing someone and their aims, to unite with diversity. Then we have union and peace amongst Christians."

1991-92

Tasmania

LORRAINE DAVIS

Born in 1939, Lorraine Davis was educated in Tasmania at Cooe Primary School and Broadland House Church of England Girls' Grammar, before studying at the Victorian College of Pharmacy.

During her College years Lorraine was a Sunday School teacher at Oakleigh. During four years in Auckland she was a youth group leader and in the young wives group. In Burnie she was in Anglican Women's Guild and Anglican Women's Fellowship.

When she lived in the Aboriginal Community of Yirrkala Lorraine was in the Yulna church ladies group, and helped with religious education in the school. She also attended the Uniting Church in the mining town of Nhulunbuy and was involved with women's bible study there.



Transferring to the Ballarat area, she joined the Church of Christ and helped with religious education at Haddon school for a number of years, as well as the usual involvement with ladies group, though not leading.

Anglican Women's Fellowship elected Lorraine as their representative to ACW to be Anglican President-elect for the Tasmanian State Unit in 1987 for 2 years.

In 1991 when Tasmania became National Executive Lorraine became National President. She was unable to complete her term as her husband joined Mission Aviation Fellowship and they were sent to the Northern Territory in 1993. Shirley Brooks, the Vice-President, completed the term for Tasmania.

Lorraine attended the 1993 National Conference in Tasmania and brought the Rev. Liyapidiny Marika, the first aboriginal woman to be ordained in the Uniting Church, from Yirrkala church.

Lorraine and her husband were transferred to Mission Aviation Fellowship in Ballarat in 1998 and joined Haddon Church of Christ. At the 2005 ACW conference in Sydney she met up with the Victorian representatives who invited her to attend Council meetings in Melbourne. She now represents Churches of Christ in Victoria and was Victoria Unit President for one year in 2011, has served 2 years as Newsletter editor, and a representative at National Council of Women Victoria.

1993

Tasmania

SHIRLEY BROOKS

1932 - 2015

Born at Scottsdale in north eastern Tasmania, Shirley attended school until the age of 14. She then trained as a corsetiere in retail trade. Shirley married to Don in 1954 and had two children. She was a very proud grandmother of all her grandchildren

Shirley was a fourth generation Salvation Army member who worked tirelessly in the city Corps in Launceston. She held many positions over the years including Assistant Home League Secretary (women's ministries) and Home League Secretary.

Shirley became a member of the Launceston Branch of ACW in 1975 and shortly afterwards represented the Branch at the State Unit where she held many executive positions.
