THE RECTOR'S LETTER

My dear Friends,

Easter is now over and what wonderful services we had. In spite of wet weather the number of communicants was only four less than last year. The Church was beautifully decorated for the occasion. May I thank all who provided flowers and greenery or money for same, and the ladies who spent so much time decorating the Church. The services on Good Friday were very well attended and I feel the idea of a service of devotion from 2 to 3 p.m. was appreciated.

The lawns surrounding All Saints' looked very nice for Easter, thanks to Mr. Evans of York Crescent and Mr. Ken Grant, who both put in much time cutting the grass. Mr. Evans kindly used his rotary mower which made short work of the more stubborn types of grass.

The one sad event this Easter was the passing of Mrs. Jean Oldfield, one of our district visitors, on the Saturday. The funeral service was conducted by me in All Saints' Church on Wednesday, 1st April, at 9.30 a.m. Mrs. Oldfield was very brave and showed wonderful Christian faith to the end. She knew she had an incurable complaint and was quite resigned to the fact that she was soon to receive her Home Call. The number of friends present and the number of floral tributes were a testimony to the esteem in which Mrs. Oldfield was held. She will be greatly missed at All Saints'.

The Billy Graham Crusade is to shortly begin at the Sydney Show Ground. We have one hundred and twenty-five tickets for 14th April. We have engaged two buses which will leave All Saints' Church at 6.20 p.m. Tickets on the bus are 4/- return. Those who asked me for tickets for the Mission are now requested to obtain them from me as soon as possible. I pray the Mission will be mightily blessed of God and many will be led to a richer spiritual experience in Christ as a consequence.

In connection with the Campaign a house to house visit is being made throughout the Metropolitan area by the Church representatives. It is arranged in each town by the Ministers' Fraternal and has the blessing of all the Protestant Churches. It will help every Church find out where their people are. There is no need for anyone to be touchy about being asked what Church they belong to. All information is pooled and given to the right source. Even if a Baptist or Methodist calls upon you I will ultimately receive your card if you belong to the Church of England in this parish.

NEW ARCHBISHOP OF SYDNEY

Bishop Gough, our new Archbishop, is 53 years of age, is married and has one daughter. He was educated at Weymouth College and went from there to Trinity College, Cambridge, and the London College of Divinity. At Cambridge he graduated in Arts in 1927, with honours in History and Geography, and received his Master's Degree four years later.

In 1928 he was ordained Deacon and in 1929 Priest. His Consecration as Bishop took place in 1948. Bishop Gough has had a wide pastoral experience and believes that the life of the Church is the Parish and Pastoral work. It was with this in mind that he instituted a series of conferences called "It begins in the Parish."

His first Curacy was at the Church of St. Mary, Islington, in the Diocese of London, in 1928. This was followed by a Curacy at St. Paul's Bath, from 1931 to 1934. He became Vicar of St. Matthew's, Bayswater, London, in 1939. Vicar of Islington in 1946 and in 1948 was made Prebendary of St. Paul's Cathedral, Archdeacon of West Ham and Consecrated Suffragan Bishop of Barking.

He served throughout the war as Chaplain to the Forces, was mentioned in despatches, received the Territorial Decoration and was awarded the O.B.E.

In 1952 Bishop Gough was "Golden" Lecturer of the Haberdashers' Company—high honour—and was chosen as President of the Educational Association Conference in 1956. As President of the Cambridge Inter-collegiate Christian Union, he had a strong influence on University life.

In parish work it could be noted that at Bayswater he dealt vigorously and ably with a tough task, and as Vicar of Islington was responsible for the rebuilding scheme of the parish church, which is now complete. In recent years, as Suffragan Bishop of Barking and Archdeacon of West Ham, he has been responsible for much of the "Greater London Development" including the Dockland Settlement, to which he appointed the Rev. David Sheppard as Warden.

Mrs. Gough has actively supported the Bishop in all his work and is a gracious and charming woman. We shall welcome them both, with Miss Gough, when they come to us in May.

CONDITIONS BETTER AT UMBAKUMBA

Since the New Year, C.M.S. has been able to supply one meal a day to all pre-school children, nursing and expectant mothers and old women at C.M.S. Unbakumba mission on Groote Eylandt in the Gulf of Carpentaria.

The meal generally consists of "blue boiler" peas and fish, with apples and custard as a dessert and supplements their natural diet.

C.M.S. missionary, Sister E. Brooker, in charge of the hospital there said the better food was having immediate results on the population.

"We make wholemeal dampers for my special charges and the old women," she said.

Some of her "special charges" are five small children whom she has been feeding three meals a day, seven days a week.

"Their mothers are slow bringing them for meals and the children are slow to eat.

"They have not made life easy, but are now showing an improvement and are easier to manage" she said.

STANDARD UP AT TAWAU

The overall standard of the C.M.S. staffed St. Patrick's School at Tawau in North Borneo, was definitely being raised, said the Rev. K. Perry, pastor in charge of Tawau.

In the Government Primary Standard 6 exams at the end of last year, there was an 85 per cent pass, compared with a 50 per cent pass in 1957, he said.

This year over 100 new pupils have enrolled, bringing the school population to 330.

In 1957 there were just on 90 pupils enrolled at the school.

Mr. Perry said the colony's education policy was beginning to "tighten up" and new restrictions were gradually getting all classes at the correct age levels.

"This is a great help to us, since some Chinese families are loath to send their children to English schools to begin at Primary 1.

"They went to send them to Chinese primary schools first, up to Primary 4, and then come to English schools.

This would be good if English was taught properly in Chinese schools, but it is far from being anywhere near good enough for pupils to come into English schools at the proper age class level," he said.
