THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

26th August, 1946.

Dear People of All Saints',

Thanksgiving is the dominant thought in mind as we record, once again, a happy and successful Consecration Festival; and we are most grateful to all who helped to make it so, particularly the members of our choir who did consistently good work throughout the day. We were glad to have Captain J. S. Cowland of the Church Army with us as the occasional preacher at Matins, and we thank him both for his timely message and his assistance at the early celebration. Since All Saints' was consecrated by a former Bishop of Newcastle (in the absence of the Archbishop of Sydney) it was fitting that we should have a visitor from that diocese for the Anniversary of the Consecration.


You will be interested to know that the Special Appeal has, so far, realised £173/9/7, which is, strangely enough, practically identical with the amount acknowledged at the corresponding period last year! There are still a number of boxes outstanding and no doubt there are more Special Envelopes to be returned; so we have every hope that we shall reach last year's total, if not exceed it. We shall be grateful for the return of all outstanding boxes and envelopes so soon as possible. The Wardens join me in thanking most sincerely ALL parishioners and friends who, by their generous response have enabled us to meet the liabilities of our Parish Hall debt for the tenth year in succession without recourse to an annual fete.

So often our Parish Festival Tea has attracted rain at some portion of the day or night, but this year we had perfect weather, and all agree that the annual parish tea was again a happy time of fellowship and reunion, for which we are indebted to the enthusiasm, ingenuity and hard work of the women of the parish (under the leadership of Miss Adams) and the kindly assistance of so many who helped them by their gifts. We were very pleased to have our Archbishop with us at the Tea, together with the Revd. Allen and Mrs. Brook and the Revd. E. T. Montgomery, who represented the neighbouring churches. You will see the Archbishop's note of appreciation elsewhere in this issue. We, on our part, appreciate his readiness, in the midst of an exceptionally busy life, to join with us in this fellowship meal. After tea, Mr. A. B. Kerrigan gave a short, but very enjoyable organ recital, and at the conclusion of Evensong an attractive concert programme was presented in the Parish Hall, when the Misses Marjory Wood, Bessie Cook and Mr. William Diamond entertained us with their music; Mr. Russ Garling with his ventriloquism and monologues; and the ever-welcome "Weirdo" proved to be just as mystifying as ever! Our thanks are due to Miss Sutherland, who came at short notice to act as accompaniste in the place of Mrs. Clifton Smith, who was prevented by illness from rendering this service. After the Treasurer had reported the progress of the special appeal and had expressed the Wardens' thanks to all who responded to it, opportunity was taken to present Mr. William Sopwith with a cheque for £50 in recognition of his long and faithful service as Verger of this parish. Mr. E. C. King, making the presentation on behalf of the Rector, Wardens, Council and people of All Saints', voiced our appreciation of our former Verger's sixteen years' loyal service, and expressed our good wishes to Mr. and Mrs. Sopwith for the future. Mr. Sopwith, though obviously (to use his own words) "knocked all of a heap," had no cause to warn us of his inexperience as a public speaker; for he made an uncommonly good response to this gesture of good-will which the parish is pleased to show him.

We regret to report the departure of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Tanner from Sydney, owing to the former's indifferent health. Both Mr. and Mrs. Tanner have been valuable choir-members for many years, and Mr. Tanner has also rendered fine service as a member of our Parish Council and as honorary Treasurer of the Y.C.I. We shall miss them both from our Church life, and we sincerely hope and pray that their removal to the North Coast will greatly benefit Mr. Tanner in health.

I conclude as I began, with thoughts of our Consecration Festival of 1946; but if these services are to be of any value, they must surely mean not only thanksgiving for the past, but consecration of ourselves to the tasks of the present and the responsibilities of the future. After all, the real strength of a church rests in the consecration of its members to Jesus Christ. We have seen again and again how people working together under the stress of war have accomplished the most difficult tasks. In times of immense discouragement and danger the Christian Church has brought forth its heroes, and mighty works have been done in the name of Christ. In such times consecration has proved itself the courage of religion. It is difficult to escape the conviction that we have not all the consecration of our fathers. The stress of life may be greater than it was in their time; our days may be more crowded; life may take more from our strength; but even so, one feels that we have not their devotion. It may be hard to determine such a comparison, but we need not be concerned merely with making comparisons; the great question for us is whether or not we have truly given ourselves to God. Are we really doing our best for the Church of God, the Business which our Lord claimed as His deep concern? You who are young, are you doing your share of the work? Do not say that the work of the Church must rest upon older shoulders; Jesus was only twelve years old when He spoke of His concern for His Father's Business (St. Luke ii, 49), but already His life was consecrated. Is yours?
