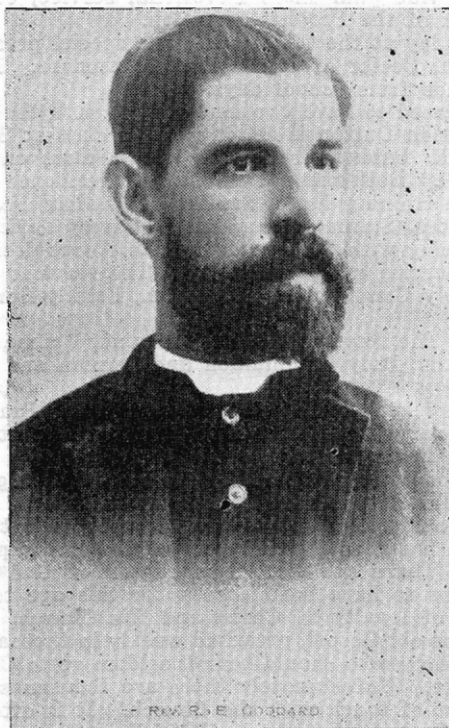

RECTOR'S LETTER

My Dear Friends,

The work of the Parish has again begun in full strength and the various organisations are functioning satisfactorily. During the Lenten Season we are holding mid-week services each Wednesday at 7 a.m. (Holy Communion) and 7.30 p.m. short Devotional service, our studies being based on the Book of the Prophet Jeremiah.

On Palm Sunday at the 7.15 service the special preacher will be the Rev. L. F. Newton, Rector of Christ Church, Enmore. Mr. Newton and I have been friends from school days.

I am very pleased to have two new helpers with the school scripture lessons. Miss Marion Dutton is helping with a class at Stanmore Infants and the Rev. E. R. Baldwin is helping with a class on Friday at Fort Street High School. Both these friends are in residence at the House of the Epiphany, the training hostel for the Australian Board of Missions, in Cambridge Street, Stanmore, and intend going to the Mission Field.

After concurring with the Parish Council it was decided not to have the Three Hour Service on Good Friday. The services on Good Friday will be 8 a.m., Holy Communion; 10.30 a.m., Family Service and 2 p.m. Devotional Hour.

Easter Day. The services will be 6.15 a.m., 7 a.m., 8.15 a.m.: Holy Communion; 11 a.m., Holy Communion and Sermon and 7.15 p.m. Evensong.

One need scarcely remind Communicants of the Prayer Book rubric "And note, that every Parishioner shall communicate at the least three times in the year, of which Easter shall be one."

May I commend to you the Billy Graham Campaign soon to commence at the Sydney Show Ground. All good men have their critics and even the Angel Gabriel could not please everybody, but we must admit that Billy Graham has been used mightily of God in the past and is being used at present. There are some men chosen of God to do a special work and he seems to have been chosen for this age to win thousands back to the path of loyalty to Christ and His Church. We realise his message is the same old Gospel, preached weekly in thousands of Churches in Australia; but those who should hear it seldom go to Church to receive the message of life. Unfortunately there are thousands who are spiritually dead and out of touch with the Church. It is often only through a man like Billy Graham that they will "follow the crowd" and receive the message of life. Then there must be the follow up. We know

eternal life is God's gift to those who confess their sins and believe in Jesus Christ as Saviour. But the Christian life is a "walk" in faith, not only a profession. As we are told "It is not unto him that saith Lord, but unto him that doeth the will of my Father which is in Heaven." Confession is made with the mouth unto salvation, but we must go on to maturity in the Christian life. May we all pray that Billy Graham's visit to Sydney will give Sydney a spiritual uplift.

TREE BARK TO POUND NOTES

Nargi is an aboriginal who it is said, can turn a piece of paper bark into a pound note.

As well as that he can will objects half a mile across rivers to appear mysteriously from his mouth.

Actually he is a fake, a rogue, a liar a troublemaker. He lives near the C.M.S. Roper River Mission, Arnhem Land, and has been practising his "magic" since before he was expelled from the Mission many years ago.

This story as told by the Mission Chaplain, the Rev. Barry Butler, is about the latest of Nargi, the "doctor-fellow's" mischief:

Willie, one of the christians at Roper, had been worried for some time that rumours were circulating to the effect that he had some poison or a murder letter stick in his possession and was up to no good.

Nargi, the old rogue knew of this and decided to play on this often-hinted suspicion of Willie's.

Perhaps Nargi was not friendly with the Mission as a whole because he had been sent off years ago or perhaps he wanted to make trouble to pay us back for the recent expulsion of his son from the Mission.

Anyway the first we heard of any trouble was when Willie came to see the Superintendent protesting there was nothing in the stories Nargi was fostering about him.

Nargi, he said, claimed to have seen a .303 cartridge full of poison near Willie's home. The wonderful thing was that Nargi saw this poison from the other side of the river—a distance of about half a mile.

More than that in the presence of a number of men, Nargi drew the poison to him with a flourish of hands and the cartridge, supposedly issued from his mouth and was displayed to a credulous crowd as Willie's "secret weapon".

The implication was that Willie was out to murder Nargi. Naturally enough Willie wanted to clear his name.

Eventually the law was called to investigate, but in the meantime Nargi and Willie had made friends. When Nargi was questioned he claimed that he had destroyed the poison and wanted to forget the whole business.

Nargi guessed the police would come and the story he told was that he and his wife had gone to Willie's house by night and had found the poison under a stone.

Under the circumstances Nargi could not be charged and he denied all this hocus pocus about drawing the cartridge across the river as merely a game. But he certainly wanted the people on the Mission to believe he had magic powers.

Later I spoke to some of the men and tried to show them that Nargi was just a cheap conjuror and a liar and a humbug into the bargain.

These people are easily frightened by this sort of thing. The incident was a minor nature really, but it served to show how credulous and superstitious many of them are. There is a real fear of the unknown and many of the Christians still ascribe any death to evil powers, regardless of the fact that sickness or death by old age.

Much of the trouble can be traced to corroborations where a man was put to death if he made a seemingly trivial mistake in the ceremony. This goes back to olden times but there is no doubt that Satan is the author of much of the fear and it is true that we wrestle against the powers of evil and spiritual wickedness in high places.
