## THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,  
31st March, 1941.

Dear People of All Saints',

This letter should reach you early in Holy Week (which commences on Palm Sunday, April 6) and once more I would most earnestly plead that you will, insofar as you possibly can, endeavour to keep that week free from all social engagements, so that you may be able to take advantage of the many opportunities your Church provides for prayer and meditation.

Particularly does this refer to **Good Friday—the most sacred day in the Christian year.** The Cross of Christ is not only a fact of history, not merely an event which took place long, long ago in a far-distant land; but it is a perpetual challenge to men right down the ages. That a Christian people should use Good Friday for an Agricultural Show at a time when we are called by our King to pray to God for our cause (which we rightly believe to be a just one) seems to me as inconsistent as it is irreverent; and we should never cease to protest against the desecration of this Sacred Day. Ample provision is made by your Church for you to spend Good Friday quietly and thoughtfully in corporate Acts of Penitence and Thankfulness. Surely at a time like this, with our Nation and Empire fighting for its very existence, struggling to keep the things which make life worth living, asking God to guide us and lead us to victory; to use merely as a day of pleasure the Day on which His Son, Jesus Christ, went to the Cross and died a most shameful death, in order that He might win men to God and His ways (by showing to them how wholly worthy of their full trust and devotion God eternally is) is so thoroughly contradictory to what we, as Christian people, profess, that we can be in no doubt whatever where our loyalty lies. It seems to me that if we desire victory we have to be worthy of it.

The best preparation for our Easter Communion is a conscientious observance of Holy Week and Good Friday, so that we may really enter into fellowship with our Risen Lord and share the power of His Resurrection.


Even though there are many and urgent calls made upon us at this time, I trust that we shall be willing to make further sacrifices so that our Lenten gifts for the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society may not be less than last year; particularly in view of the increased demands made upon the Church in Australia to make up what cannot now come from England in war-time. Please return your Lenten Box or Envelope, together with your Easter offerings on Easter Day—April 13. If you expect to be away for Easter, would you help us by handing in your box before leaving?

The Services for Holy Week, Good Friday and Easter Day are set out elsewhere in this issue; I would just remind you that the three celebrations on Easter Day are at seven, at quarter past eight, and at the eleven o'clock Service.

Gifts of white flowers for the Easter Festival will be very acceptable, and should be left at the Church on Saturday morning, April 12th.

Believing that Christ's Kingdom is the one reality that is deeper and more abiding than all the deep discords and evils of our time, we can still wish you all a holy, happy Easter.

## MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL.

**The Choir.**—Stainer's "Crucifixion" will be sung on Good Friday at 8 p.m., when the soloists will be **Mr. Arthur Broadhurst** (Bass), and **Mr. Ronald Dowd** (Tenor). The solemn and beautiful music of Stainer's well-known Meditation upon the Sacred Passion of the Redeemer, should not only attract many, but will carry into their hearts and minds the eternal appeal and the arresting challenge of the First Good Friday.

**Easter Vestry Meeting.**—The Annual Vestry Meeting will be held on Wednesday, April 23rd, at 8 p.m. We should, and we hope we may, have a representative attendance at this important meeting.

**Anzac-tide, 1941.**—On Anzac Day, which is also the Feast of St. Mark, there will be a Celebration of Holy Communion at 10.30 a.m.

The Hon. Secretary of the Petersham-Marrickville Sub-Branch of the R.S.S.I.L.A., extends to us all an invitation to be present at the Anzac Commemoration Service to be held in the Petersham Park at 3 o'clock on Sunday afternoon, April 20th.

**Good Friday—Procession of Witness.**—Procession of Witness from Sydney Domain to St. Andrew's Cathedral, 4.20 p.m. (Assemble in Domain at 4 p.m.) Parishes to be grouped in Rural Deaneries. (This Parish is in the Rural Deanery of Petersham.) Choirs and Clergy to robe at the Domain.

Special organisations are invited to assemble in groups and march together (Mothers' Union, G.F.S., Scouts, C.E.B.S., C.E.M.S., Missionary Societies and Fellowships, etc.). Banners to be carried, regalia to be worn.

It is hoped that All Saints' will again be well represented.

**C.M.S.**—A meeting of friends of the Church Missionary Society was held on Tuesday, March 25, in the Guild Room, the Rector presiding. The Rev. H. M. Arrowsmith (Acting General Secretary) gave a most enlightening and inspiring address on the widespread work of the Society, relating instance after instance of the fact that "Omnipotence hath servants everywhere," and encouraging his hearers to do more and more to further Christ's Kingdom. Miss Stevens was one of the fortunate ones who attended this service, and she re-lived it for us, and her slides helped us to feel that we had been there, too. March 27, was our Annual Meeting. The Rector presided: Apologies for absence were received from the Misses Eve, Miss Watson, and the Secretary, Mrs. Reilly. The meeting expressed its very sincere sympathy with Mrs. Reilly, who had suffered a bereavement. Mrs. Ashwood tendered her resignation owing to ill-health. She will be much missed, as she has been a loyal member for many years. The President, Vice-Presidents and Secretary were unanimously re-elected. Miss Watson, our esteemed Treasurer for many years, who was the victim of a severe accident during the year, resigned from office. We would like to place on record Miss Watson's untiring devotion to duty during the many years that she has held the office of Treasurer. Miss Lucas, who filled the breach during Miss Watson's illness, was unanimously elected Treasurer. The Group Leaders were re-elected, Miss Watkins taking leadership of Mrs. Lindsay's Group; the latter, having left the district, will be much missed from our fellowship. A special Social Group was formed, with Mrs. Sinclair as leader. The Guild is pleased that Mrs. Morris is again able to act as convener of the Flower Group. During the evening the sums of £10 and £5 respectively were allotted to the Parish Hall Fund and the Curate Fund, making the Guild's donation to the Hall Fund £60, and to the Curate Fund £10 for the year. The Treasurer's statement showed that the Guild had raised £95 odd during the year. The Rector thanked all members for their loyalty and devotion to their Church and Guild. Afterwards the members partook of supper, and had a happy time together. The next meeting of the Guild will be on April 10 (Maundy Thursday), when members will attend service in Church, and there will be a short business meeting after. April 24—Rally.

Valuable as the financial aspect of their work undoubtedly is, we are grateful to them for rendering an even greater service in keeping in touch with people, in welcoming newcomers to the parish, in reporting cases of illness or trouble, and generally assisting the clergy by a work which cannot be assessed in terms of money. Walter Lawrence Maundrell was a devoted husband and father, a public-spirited citizen, and a true friend. He was respected and honoured in this parish and district, where he served the municipality so faithfully and well for 21 years, during which period he had the honour of being three times Mayor of Petersham. Probably not even those nearest and dearest to him knew the full extent of those quiet acts of helpfulness he loved to do for his fellow-men; particularly for those who found life hard and difficult.

We also extend our deep sympathy to Mr. and Mrs. T. E. J. Cruse of Undercliffe, in the loss of their only child, Fayvelle, after a short illness. This dear little girl's parents were married at All Saints', and she herself was baptised here on the 7th November, 1937.

To the relatives of the late Horace W. Anderson, of Victoria Street, Lewisham, we would express our sincerest sympathy. May that comfort and consolation which can only come from God, be given to all who are sad.

**Parish Hall Fund.**—It has again been decided to use the box method of attacking our Parish Hall debt—a method which we have found successful for some few years past, in lieu of a fete. In this effort we need the co-operation of all parishioners, irrespective of age. In fact, the young people, who derive much benefit from a spacious parish hall, will, we hope, be prepared to DO something to help pay for it.
