THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

Whitsunday, 1947.

Dear People of All Saints',


There is not in literature anything more thrilling and more convincing than the narrative of the early chapters of the Acts of the Apostles. We, together with thousands of Christians throughout the world, have commemorated to-day the descent of the Holy Spirit upon those disciples assembled in Jerusalem. Remember, the first Pentecost began with **ordinary** people; not with those in authority, not with the rulers; it began with that handful of men and women, gathered together without weapons, without magisterial authority, without an institution, without a formulated creed, without any insignia of office, but simply as humble believers in Christ. These disciples had returned to Jerusalem, the arena of conflict and the scene of their recent failure, and there they were gathered in expectancy and hope; they knew great things were due to happen, and they took time to "listen in" to God. They met daily in the Upper Room for prayer, thus preparing the conditions which the Holy Spirit could use. And when these were complete, the spark was struck, and the spirit blazed forth. The conditions remain ever the same. It is a strange mystery of our free-will and our power to choose, that man can "hold God back," and man can also release God's energy. They were only a handful at the first Pentecost, but through them, mighty world-changes were wrought. Why should there not be through us, and people like us, to-day, who are also but a handful, the inauguration of a new epoch? The way of Pentecost is still the same. It begins with a group of people who will take the trouble to pray, and to offer themselves in utmost consecration to the purpose of God for His world. There is no reason, on God's side, why everything that happened on the day of Pentecost should not happen to us. The resources are available and God offers them to everyone. The Christian religion not only sets before us tremendously high ideals, but offers us the Power to attain to those ideals.

Great numbers of our fellow citizens have abandoned even the forms of religion. So many contend that religion is not "real" to them, and they have ceased to believe that religion is a **force**, a **power**. Of course, you cannot expect religion to be "real," if you do not perform those acts which help to make it real. Without what are called the "means of Grace"—that is, prayer, Bible-reading, worship, the Sacraments—all would find it difficult, and most would find it quite impossible to keep up the inner reality of religion.

I think you will agree that there is little doubt that a good deal of our modern life is based on materialism and self-seeking. So many people do not ask what makes for righteousness and God's will, when facing the problems which confront the world to-day. They think only of their own or their nation's self-interest, and how they can hold on to what they have got, or get something for nothing. Many do not realise that this attitude is just as anti-Christian as Communism, if not more so; and the only way they can be brought to see it, is by coming face to face with Christ as seen in the lives of really Christian people. We know we are faced with tremendous opportunities, and we wonder whether we can take them. So often we feel inadequate for the task. The answer which Christianity gives is this: there is one condition of being able to take any really great opportunity, and that is, that we are prepared honestly and squarely to face ourselves, to know our own strength and weakness. Until we do it, we cannot even **SEE** what the opportunity really is. When we do, God can open our eyes, and give us the will and the power to take it.

I am very grateful to the Revd. G. C. Glanville for his ministry during my absence. We were happy to have the Right Reverend G. F. Cranswick, Bishop of Tasmania, with us to-day, and thank him for his Whitsunday message. Unfortunately the day was wet, and the congregation suffered accordingly. Isn't it extraordinary the way the slightest variation in weather affects the average congregation?

Fifth Missionary Appeal.—During the month an American Tea was held at the Rectory. It was a pleasant, informal afternoon, those present enjoying a social time, and Mrs. Cameron and Miss Brown played the "old-time" airs which most of us delight in. Afternoon tea was provided by the organiser, and this, with small sales during the afternoon, added £4/1/6 to our Appeal Fund. Amounts acknowledged for May: Miss Lucas, £1; Mrs. Brennan, £1; Anon., 7/-; Mrs. Slee, £1; Miss Mottram, £1; American Tea, £4/1/6; Miss L. G. Bayley, £5; Mrs. Greswell, £1. Total: £14/8/6. Grand total to date: £25/6/-. As you will see by the foregoing we have raised a quarter of our £100, which is being devoted to the training of one of our aboriginal girls as a nurse to work amongst her own people. If we could raise an amount like we did during the month of May, through a "few" people's generosity, what couldn't we do by Advent Sunday (six months ahead) if everyone helped. As a church we must be "up and doing" for these people from whom our land was taken, and for whom very little has been done in return. Will you, then, as members of All Saints', take stock, not of "what you can spare," but of what you can give **sacrificially** (the only real giving), and send your donation in during this month and help our appeal?
