THE RECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

Presented at the Easter Vestry Meeting, 30th April, 1970

I have much pleasure in presenting this my fourteenth Annual Report of work done during the past financial year, ending 31st March, 1970.

The year 1970 is our Centennial Year. The foundation stone of our lovely Church was laid on 1st November, 1870, by the most Reverend Frederic Barker, D.D., Archbishop of Sydney and Metropolitan of New South Wales.

The account of the stone laying ceremony was recorded in the Sydney Morning Herald on the 19th November, 1870. There were thirteen clergy present to support the Archbishop in his very important task of laying the stone which weighed about two tons. One wished, however, that there was a statement in the newspaper record as to where they placed the stone, because we are still looking for it at the end of the first century.

The pity of it is, that none of the early Rectors were writers and did not seem to think it necessary to place on record just where the stone was laid. The first half of the Church to be built was the western end and the joining crack can be seen on both the main walls. Maybe, the first foundation stone is somewhere near the font, at least that is my opinion, although the church floor has been relaid in recent years, there was no sign of the stone.

However D.V., a new stone will be laid by His Excellency the Governor of New South Wales on Sunday, 1st November, 1970. The stone will be blessed by the Right Reverend F. O. Hulme-Moir, Coadjutor Bishop of Sydney. I do hope that many ex-parishioners will know of this ceremony and do their best to attend. The new stone will be laid somewhere near the front door where the inscription may be read by those coming into our Church.

The laying of the original foundation stone was but the commencement of a great work to be undertaken by seven successive Rectors and a team of faithful men and women in each rectorship to build the true Church, which after all is spiritual and not material.

God only dwells in His Church as men and women admit Him into their hearts and lives and are prepared to co-operate with Him in making this world a happier place in which to live.

From the earliest times man has tended to pay more attention to the material things than to the spiritual and thus the Church's job has always been difficult. In life many ignore the Church and the service of God, but very few have the courage to ask that they be not buried as a Christian. I said in my Annual Report last year that gratitude is a scarce commodity these days. The less some people put into life the more they ask in return.

I recall a story told by the late Bishop Hilliard of a woman who took her small daughter to Church. The child was more observant than the Mother thought. On the way home the Mother complained about the

service and the sermon, the little girl looked up at her Mother and said "Well you can't expect much for threepence."

There are many who call themselves "Church of England" who for the greater part of their life give nothing to the work of extending the Kingdom of God and blame everyone but themselves for the mess the world is in to-day. Some years ago when we started the "Freewill Offering Scheme" one man in the Parish was approached about joining up and he said "I am not Church of England." He refused to contribute, but three weeks later he died from a coronary occlusion and his funeral went from All Saints' Church!

When we celebrated the centenary of the first Anglican Service in Petersham in 1960 we put a carillon in the Church which week by week gives a distinct call to the people of Petersham to worship God. It was a very worthwhile memorial and has been a constant witness to the presence of the Church in this town.

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CENTENARY ENDOWMENT FUND

It has been suggested that we establish an Endowment Fund to commemorate the Centenary of our Church. The money will be invested and the interest each year will be used to pay the running expenses of the Church. Gifts of money for this fund will be welcome as soon as parishioners are able to make them. With the decline of Anglican strength in this Parish such a fund will be a boon. Maybe, some parishioners would like to give a sum of money in memory of a loved one, just whatever you feel you can afford. A memorial of this kind will help the Church in perpetuity. Our aim is to raise the sum of at least \$1000 in this way. Our Church is now well equipped with furniture and vases etc. as memorials, but an investment in the Parish Endowment will help the Church in a practical way for generations to come. I suggest that a memorial book be kept as a record of donations given in memory of loved ones. This could be added to at any time, now or in the years ahead. Often people ask what they can put in the Church as a memorial but we have reached the stage where there is nothing needed in furnishings for the Church. My wife will start the Fund with a donation of \$50 in memory of her parents, Mr. & Mrs. R. Sugden.

The Special Tea Meeting has been arranged for Friday, 14th August at 6 p.m., when later we are to have a musical programme provided by St. Andrew's Cathedral Choral Society. The Conductor being Mr. Eric Gross and the Organist Mr. Michael Heman. They are to be assisted by the Petersham Girls' High School Choir, Conductor Miss Barbara McCrae and we are hoping the Fort Street Boy's Choir will give items as well. Mr. Eric Gross, who is a lecturer in Music at Sydney University is composing a special anthem for our Centenary.

On Education Sunday, 10th August, 1969 the special speaker was Miss J. A. Richardson who is an inspector in the Education Department, her message was most interesting. In the evening we had a visit from the St. Stephan's Maori Choir, Auckland. They sang several hymns in the Church and later in the Parish Hall gave us a programme which we will not easily forget. I am grateful to the Headmaster Mr. E. Lewis M.A., for giving us this treat and hope some day it can be repeated.

During the year we again had the Annual Tea which commemorated the 66th Consecration Festival of our Church. This was held on Friday, 15th August, when the special speaker was Mr. David Hunter, M.L.A., who told us of his trip overseas. He represented N.S.W. at the Commonwealth Parliamentary Conference and his message was most appreciated.

CHURCH MEMORIALS

During the year two memorials were added to the furnishings of the Church. We are grateful to the family of the late Mrs. Augusta Ruby Craigie for donating a beautiful oak music cabinet in her memory. We also appreciate the gift of an electric clock in the Church by Mrs. Scott in memory of her husband, Norman Arthur Scott, who passed away in August, 1968. We also desire to express our sincere appreciation for a donation of a microphone for the pulpit during the year. The donor wishes to remain anonymous but we are most grateful for this kind gift.

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RECORD FETE RESULT

The annual Fete held in November was an all time record in the sum of \$3825. With the passing away of many of our older supporters and workers and others leaving the Parish for other districts, one is apt to wonder what the Fete will be like each year. But 1969 was a wonderful surprise. As usual over 1000 attended, but the solid work of the stall-holders to raise so much money is outstanding. In the best of parishes, workers are in the minority in the City areas, which are changing through the immigration policy of our Government. One is amazed at the success of our Fete in 1969. Fortunately this year we did not have the usual amount of repairs to our buildings and this has helped to swell our credit balance in the balance sheet. To all who worked and gave in any way I wish to express my sincere thanks.

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PERSONAL

Mr. Keith Dingle retired during the year as Bible Class Leader, he had held that position for 10½ years and performed a faithful service amongst the post-confirmation age group. Mr. and Mrs. Dingle have left Petersham and now live at Campsie. Mr. John Nance has kindly taken over the Bible Class and we wish him well.

Mr. W. H. Hall, who was on the Parish Council until he left the district and has since retired from the Magistrate's Bench at Redfern. Mr. & Mrs. Hall are soon to leave on a world tour and we wish them every happiness.

Mr. Bruce Livingstone who has been in New Guinea for the past three years has now returned home, we are pleased to have our friend back again in the Parish and wish him well.

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CONFIRMATION SERVICE

This year's Confirmation Service was held on Tuesday, 21st October and was conducted by Bishop A. J. Dain. There were twenty eight candidates, sixteen males and twelve females. It was a very happy service and we pray that the candidates will be loyal to their vows. Bishop Dain's message was most challenging. If any desire to be Confirmed in 1970 I would be glad to hear from them.

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CAR DRIVE

One of the pleasant events of the year was a Car Drive to the Hawkesbury River on Saturday, 18th October. This trip to Brooklyn was much enjoyed and a financial success, about 50 people went on the trip and the Y.C.I. netted \$35 which was later used to buy the vegetables for their stall at the Fete.

HANDEL'S MESSIAH

This was rendered again in December by the Royal Philharmonic Society, about 100 persons took part in the Choir and Orchestra. Those who attended were full of praise for the beautiful music.

The usual "Carols by Candlelight" service was held on 21st December and was well attended and enjoyed by all. This is one of the most popular services of the year.

Although most of the clubs have their own Christmas Parties I want to thank those who organised the Parish Christmas Party. It was well planned and there was something for all ages. I am grateful to Mr. F. Hearn for organising it, to Mr. Harry Thompson and his band for the usual, bright music and to Mr. B. Sayers who acted as M.C.

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SICKNESS

A number of our Parishioners have been laid aside with sickness, some in hospital. Mr. Bert Shaw had a period in hospital and is slowly regaining his strength. We miss him very much, when as Parish Councillor and "man of many parts" he has not been able to be on "deck". However we hope he will soon be fully restored to health and strength.

Mrs. J. Nance is another who has been in hospital and is slow in recuperating. We hope to hear better things of her in the near future.

Mrs. Reid was knocked down by a Motor Scooter and had some time in hospital. We are pleased she is home again and on the road to recovery.

Mrs. Ayrton, another regular Church worshipper, who was suddenly taken ill and spent sometime in Lewisham Hospital, has since been transferred to Buckhurst Private Hospital in Ashfield. We wish her a speedy recovery.

Mrs. Quinliven had the misfortune to trip on her way to work and has been laid up for some weeks, we are pleased to say she is much better and hopes to soon be able to resume her work.

Mrs. Perrit, also a parishioner of our Church is still in Eversleigh Hospital, we hope and pray that she too will soon be well again.

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OBITUARY

During the year we have lost a number of people who are greatly missed from our ranks. Mrs. Bertha May Dillon passed away after a short illness on 17th August. She was a very kind soul and worked hard with Mrs. Humphreys on the "White Elephant" Stall on the day of the Fete. Until she moved to Dulwich Hill was a regular worshipper at All Saints'. Mrs. Margaret Brodie, wife of one of our Parish Councillors passed away very suddenly. She belonged to and supported the Presbyterian Church but in the absence of her minister I was asked to take her funeral at Burwood. We offer our deepest sympathy to Mr. Brodie in his great loss.

Mr. Victor Bryce, another regular worshipper in our Church passed away suddenly on 28th August. Mr. Bryce had not been in good health for some years. We offer his sister, Mrs. Quine, our deepest sympathy. Mrs. Ada Matilda Palmer, a member of the Senior Parishioners Club passed away 9th September after a short illness.

Miss Iris Joynton, who had made her home at the Rectory for nearly two years and was known to many as she had lived in Shaw Street, Petersham for many years, passed away on 26th September. Miss Dorothy

Bayley, a sister of one of our respected District Visitors, was called home suddenly on 9th November. Mr. Charles Whiting, a very respected member of the Parish Council, passed away very suddenly on 17th November. Mr. Whiting was one of our great workers and we miss him very much.

Miss Elsie Farley, who for many years was a District Visitor, passed away in a Rest Home on the North side of the Harbour, on 11th January. Mrs. Harriet Arkinstall lived many years in Hopetoun Street and a regular worshipper at our Church when health permitted her, passed away early in April this year at the Home of Peace.

Mr. Jack Edward Gorman passed away suddenly on 13th April, 1970 on his way to work. He was a Parish Councillor and President of the Indoor Bowls Club. His health had not been good for sometime but it came as a shock to us all when we heard he had been called Home. He was in Church on the Sunday morning, doing his usual job of putting up the hymn numbers etc. To his wife and son we offer our deepest sympathy in their sad loss. To the relatives of all who lost loved ones during the year we offer our sincere sympathy.

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BON VOYAGE !

In May Mr. Alan Jones and his Mother are going to America to visit Jan. They both need the break and I hope they have a good holiday. Mr. Alan Jones publishes the "Chronicle" every month and prepares the "Weekly Notices" for the services. He is also the Sunday School Superintendent and organiser of the "Car Drives". They will be away for about four months and will be greatly missed. I am grateful to Mr. F. Hearn and Mr. G. Gorman for taking over the "Chronicle" while Alan is away, and to Mr. R. Boots for doing the "Weekly Notices."

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ANNUAL STATISTICS

During the year we had 48 Baptisms (70), 37 Marriages (34), 80 Funerals (50), 4137 Acts of Communion (3807).

(The numbers for last year are in parenthesis).

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THE FAITHFUL BAND

In conclusion I take this opportunity of thanking all who have helped with the work of the Parish during the year. Their names may not always be mentioned but my thanks to them is still just as sincere.

I am grateful to the Rev. A. H. Gallop, B.A. for holding the fort for me for five weeks when I had pneumonia and bronchitis, and during my holiday at Katoomba. The Rev. J. Hebblewhite, Warden of St. Margaret's Hostel who helped by taking the services one Sunday when I was unable to take them myself. My sincere thanks to these two people for their help.

I would like to record my appreciation of the work of the Lay-Readers, the Church Wardens, the Parish Councillors, the Sidesman, Mr. A. Jones, Sunday School Superintendent, Sunday School Teachers, Mrs. Carroll and her helpers in the Kindergarten. The Extension Group Leader, now Mr. J. Nance, District Visitors, Mrs. Bosward who organises the distribution of the Weekly Envelopes, and those who deliver them, the Organists Miss K. O'Neill and Miss Bevele Dovell, the Choristers and Carillonists.

Thanks to Miss Street who has cared for the linen and polished the

brass for many years, but now finds she can no longer do this service, would someone like to take her place? To those who give flowers and to those who arrange them. To Mrs. Humphreys for keeping the Weekly Freewill Register. To Mr. Alan Jones for his work in editing the "Chronicle" and Weekly notices. To Mr. B. Shaw for all the artistic signs and notices and to Mr. Shaw and Mr. Jones, Publicity Officers, for news in Local Newspapers. Messrs. H. Brodie, W. Williams, L. Carroll, H. J. Shaw and G. Barron for providing transport to Church for elderly parishioners and to Mrs. Clark for her work around the Church grounds.

For assistance in the Public Schools I thank Mrs. B. Sayers for taking a class at Lewisham, Miss Speight for a class at West Street Infants, Mrs. J. Carroll at Stanmore Infants and the Rev. E. T. Montgomery for his help with the school classes.

I want to say thank you to the members of the Guild, Y.M. and Friends Club, Senior Parishioners, Y.C.I., Sunday School Mothers Club, St. Luke's Centre, Fellowship and Indoor Bowls Club for the part they have played.

If I have missed anyone please accept my apology and at the same time my sincere thanks for everything that has been done to help the work of the Church here at All Saints', Petersham.

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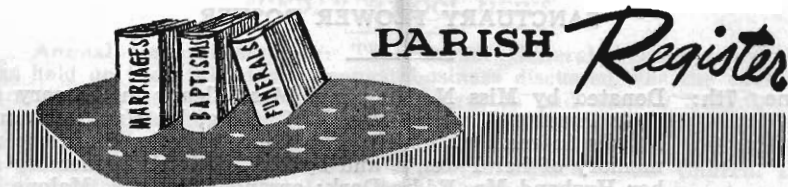
