From your Minister's Desk



Dear Friends,

You will find in this issue of the 'Chronicle' the announcement that All Saints is to have a new Rector. The Rev. Bruce Woolcott is to be Inducted in December and so a new time of ministry will begin in the parish.

Quite naturally questions like 'What will the new man be like?'; 'Will he be as good as Mr. & Mrs. So & So who was here . . . ?' will spring to mind and almost inevitably someone will say 'Ah! All Saints could never be like it was in the days of Mr. . . . !'.

Of course these kind of things will be said and felt by people (maybe by you who read these words right now!) — but the important thing to remember is that each man who comes as Rector of a parish has his own particular kind of ministry to bring. He comes as an individual with his own personality and just as we don't expect people to be the same as others in other areas, so we ought not to expect a new Rector to be the same as any man who was Rector of All Saints at any time in the past.

Looking backward to what has been in the past can be both discouraging and unhelpful. Certainly we are not meant to cut ourselves off completely from the past but to be looking back to it all the time can hinder progress and mar the present!

In the Church there are always 'present' things to be done — present situations to meet — present service to be given and unless everyone joins in and shares in support little will happen.

John Wesley the great founder of Methodism and the man who saw so many wonderful things happen in Britain as he exercised his ministry was fond of saying two things (not necessarily together or at the same time on any occasion)—'the best is yet to be' and 'the best of all is, God is with us!'

'The best is yet to be' — that is looking forward with expectation and hope. It is certainly the right and Christian way . . . 'God is with us' — that is the assurance certainty and confidence in which we rest.

'The best is yet to be' . . . 'God is with us!' — they are good watchwords to take into the future aren't they? . . . I certainly hope that you will have them much in mind as Mr. Woolcott takes up his ministry.

**ALL SAINTS: TARGET FOR MISGUIDED YOUTH**

Since the September 'Chronicle' was issued, All Saints has been the target of a series of "break-ins". Three times in the past month, at considerable risk to life and limb, some person or persons have wrecked the circular window at the northern and eastern corner of the church and created havoc with books, hymn numbers and any other loose material. The last break-in, discovered Saturday morning, was by far the worst.

Besides making a lot of work, the intruders made off with the brass altar cross, a brass collection plate and other minor items. Some of these items have been recovered, but the brass altar cross is still missing.

The police are working on the matter. In the meantime, the wardens will be much obliged if people who are passing the church would detour round the buildings and keep an eye open for damage and people loitering.
