

PHASE 1 - To introduce the concept of faith community nurses to Christian nurses in Western Australia through ecumenical seminars in metropolitan & regional areas.

PHASE 2 - To conduct a five-day educational course in the theology & practice of faith community nursing within Western Australia to prepare nurses for the new role in the community. This course is planned for March 2002.

At the evening sessions, an explanation of FLC was given aided by a transparency of the logo and the question "What does the Faith Community nurse (FCN) do?" was answered.

The FCN's ministry focuses on 1) nurturing healthy relationships thus promoting health & well being and 2) community health. Faith communities allow people to be connected, to serve & to be served. They provide a common history & destiny for life's journey. They are safe places for growth of spirituality, for blessings, for prayer & to bring all before God's throne of Grace.

"The Parish Nurses are indeed a manifest realisation of our parish vision.....reaching out to all in the name of Christ."


"The concept is magnificent! It provides holistic care....."

FROM OUR NATIONAL PRESIDENT

My dear Friends,

Greetings to all members in Units across the length and breadth of our big country from your new President and Committee. I had a holiday after the Conference in Adelaide, visiting some friends in 4 States - including one I had not seen since 1963! It was great to catch up and I count friendships across the country and around the world a real blessing and gift from God.

I trust the Advent Season was not too hectic and that the Christmas-Epiphany Seasons have been times of happiness and refreshment for all of you.

Those at Conference will remember I offered a 'Presidential visit' to two/three Units in February/ March and I was pleased to receive invitations from Tasmania, NSW and Victoria and we consulted on an itinerary. I spoke at Conference of the break-down of community in the Old Testament story - brother vs brother, nation vs nation, internal division within the nation called to be the people of God. The New Testament tells of the life of community that Jesus lived with his followers, of John's vision of a universal city where there will be no temple, sun or moon because God is the light of the community.

As we travel on our journey in community with one another, following Jesus, our goal is to make a commitment to
BE COMMUNITY

where we live
in our church families
within our ecumenical relationships
and in our ACW units.

A bowl of multi-coloured roses was the focal point on the Altar and during the Prayers of Intercession, white roses were added to the bowl by the 3 readers participating in that part of the Service.

Major Olive Dell, FLC Convenor, gave an overview of the Fellowship of the Least Coin before the gifts from those present were received, representing the prayers of many women across Western Australia.

In 2001, \$373 000.00 was allocated for worldwide FLC projects. Thanks be to God.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE 2001

ASIAN CHURCH WOMEN'S CONFERENCE CAMEO SPOTS

The President of ACWC, Mrs Nancy Lin, brought greetings to the Conference. She left Taiwan during a severe thunderstorm which flooded the whole island. Mrs Lin has been working on a translation of 'Word and Prayer', is an adviser to Women's Fellowships and speaks at many meetings.

The Executive Secretary of ICFLC, Dr Esther Byu from Thailand, spoke of her life since the 1999 Conference.

ACWC Executive Secretary, Revd Iluminada Acuna-Domingo, spoke about the way women of the Philippines are treated.

From SRI LANKA, Mrs Padma Ebenezer told of the terrorist attacks and suffering of the people through the drought in Sri Lanka. She thanked God for life and good health.

Ms Yasuko, Executive Treasurer, a traditional Japanese woman, told of how she has been liberated by being on ACWC and went on to speak about the high rate of suicide in Japan.

Ms Uma David from India talked about the burden of the dowry system in her country. Girls are unwanted so female infanticide is the highest cause of death in babies. Christians are being persecuted and more and more Hindu subjects are being introduced in schools.

Handpainted scarves, with the Desert Pea emblem on them, were given to each member of the ACWC Executive present. Mrs Lin expressed thanks to ACW members for their kind hospitality.

Congratulations to members of the 1999 – 2001 National Executive on a successful Conference Program. Devotions, Bible Studies and Cameo Spots from the visitors were highlights for the many attendees.

The reports from the National Executive, the State Units and the National Denominational Organisations were well received and gave insights into the work and activities of Christian women in Australia.

Fellowship is always rich and varied at conferences - at mealtimes, on outings and in Worship, giving opportunity to meet old friends and make new ones. I regret I was unable to enjoy such fellowship at the 2001 Conference due to the demise of Ansett Airlines but I look forward to receiving reports and articles for inclusion in ACW NEWS during the next two years.

4. Prayer Partnership with the women of Pakistan is greatly valued and appreciated, particularly as hardships due to the war of terrorism continue.
