THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

28th February, 1944.

Dear People of All Saints',

In these days of comparative shortage, one approaches a Harvest Festival with a certain amount of anxiety; but, as a matter of fact, the response was excellent, the gifts quite as numerous as ever, and the standard of our Harvest offerings was well maintained both in quantity and in quality. The Church was beautifully decorated for the Festival. Although Mrs. Morris is, unfortunately, still not well enough to take her customary place in beautifying the Church for Harvest, she had kindly obtained and prepared the wheat and corn (sent by her country friends) and we are indebted to her and to ALL our parishioners and friends who by their generous response co-operated in making the day one of real Thanksgiving for those good things, which, without a Harvest Festival service, we might quite easily take as a matter of course with no thought of the Giver. We do not forget the response of the girls and boys of our Sunday School (Senior, Primary and Kindergarten Departments) who offered their gifts at a special Children's Service, adding very considerably to those previously sent in. We are also grateful to Mr. McKinley, once again, for a practical piece of service in kindly using his car to transport our Harvest Gifts to the Home of Peace. Elsewhere in this issue you will find the Matron's letter of thanks and appreciation.

Lenten boxes and envelopes were made available on the Sunday before Ash Wednesday, both in Church and Sunday School. As you know, our Lenten self-denial offerings are always devoted to the Extension of Christ's Kingdom through the two great missionary societies of our Church—the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society. I am hoping that our Lenten gifts, which are always good, may be even better this year. If you have not yet received your Lenten box or envelope, please ask for one when you come to Church. If you do not attend Church, I am sure your District Visitor will be happy to supply you with either.

Last month I mentioned the fact that peace must be won after the war. We might well use this Lenten season in preparing ourselves to make our contribution to this most difficult task. After the last war ended and the long tiring strain relaxed, there was a mad rush for pleasure. Shall we see that again? When the measure of discipline that war enforces is eased, shall we go back to the slackness and softness that were sapping our national strength in pre-war days? Then what about the wider world problems—of starving populations to be fed, of nations to be re-educated, of appalling international hatreds to be allayed in a world where devilish forces have raged at will. No, things are not going to be easy after the war, and it's better to face the facts. That doesn't mean giving up hope. It does mean recognising where hope lies. The old methods of human planning without God won't get us anywhere. Hope lies in one thing, and in one thing only—in a great spiritual revival; in the dawn of a new age of the Spirit, in which men will begin to look to God for wisdom and guidance, and will be willing to recognise their own inadequacy and selfishness and sin, and to give themselves to His direction and power. If we really care about a better Australia, a better world, we cannot just leave it to others to put things right. If we all start doing that, we shall get nowhere. We must all come in on it ourselves and do our bit. That means facing and making a choice. You can live for yourself. That's easy and comfortable, but it's also contemptible and futile, and in the end disappointing. The only other way is to throw self overboard, and give yourself to God for His use in re-making the world. Lent challenges us to do this—it is difficult and dangerous, but it's intensely worthwhile. It

means striving after a character that is reliable, humble, unselfish, and courageous, with "sticking" power when knocks and disappointments come. Our only hope of attaining such character is by the steady inflow from a Power higher than ourselves, which means making time each day for being in God's presence, asking Him to direct your thoughts, reading and thinking upon His Word, especially as it is revealed in the life of Jesus Christ. Add to this public worship and Holy Communion and the important matter of the stewardship of your money and possessions, holding them as trust from God to be used as He shows, and you will realise that your life is worth living because you have a part in God's plan for working out His purpose for the world.

As the next issue of the "Chronicle" will be but one week before Easter Day, an outline of services being arranged for Holy Week and the Easter Festival is included in this issue.
