

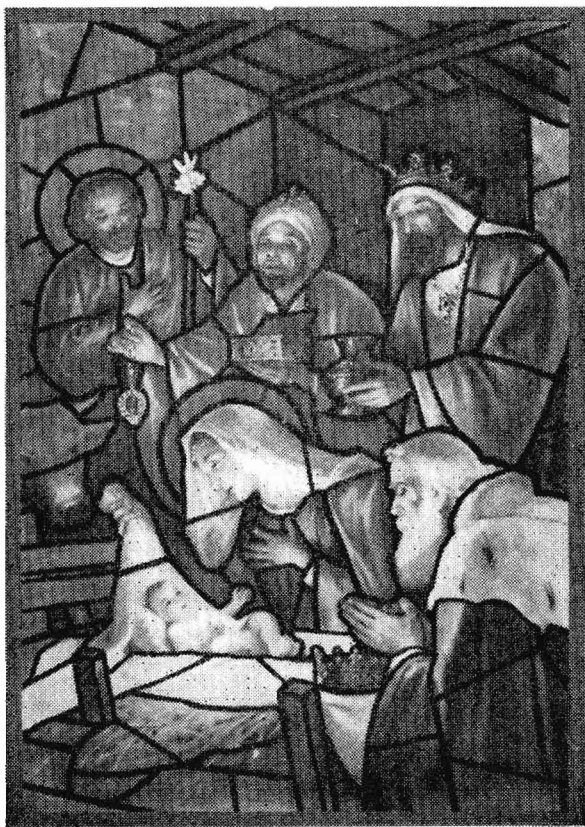

## BOOKS OF THE BIBLE

## JEREMIAH AND LAMENTATIONS

## 1. The Man

There are few books in the Bible which are as deeply linked with the life of the author as the Book of Jeremiah. Throughout the book, Jeremiah's own personal tragedies and losses recur again and again, the pressure of conviction that God had given him a message to his time, to which men would not listen, weighed continuously upon him.

From the facts that can be pieced together, it would seem that Jeremiah was born about 600 B.C., into a priestly family in the Judean village of Anathoth. His mission as a prophet began in 626 B.C. when he underwent the spiritual experience generally referred to as his "call" and vividly described in the first chapter of his book. At that time the Jews as a nation were rapidly facing extinction as a political identity. The kingdom, divided by civil strife since the days of Solomon into two halves, the northern kingdom Israel, and the southern Judah, had already seen the defeat of Israel and its disappearance as a nation. At the time of Jeremiah's call, Judah was sandwiched in between the spheres of influence of the two great world powers, Egypt and Babylon, to whom she was at different times under tribute. Internally, the kingdom was at the lowest of moral and spiritual ebbs.

Chapter 7, vv 1:15, contains the outline of a "sermon" preached by Jeremiah in the temple of Jerusalem. There is revealed the picture of a society given over to greed, violence, immorality, and idolatry, yet returning always to the temple of God and offering worship from corrupted hearts and stained hands.

The centre of Jeremiah's message was "mend your ways and your doings" — a phrase repeated many times. He told his contemporaries that their alleged faith in God was futile, and that God would be no defender of Israel in the days of catastrophe if their protestation of faith were not accompanied by righteousness of life. Opposition to Jeremiah hardened almost from the beginning. He was a "man of strife and contention to the whole earth" (Ch. 15, v. 10). His "pain was perpetual and wound incurable" (v. 18). After the first Babylonian assault and the deportation of many of the nation's leaders, further rebellion was being planned, and Jeremiah protested the folly of this course of action. He was denounced as a traitor, a false prophet and a preacher of lies. His writings were publicly burnt, he was left in an empty well to starve, delivered only by the intervention of a friend, and in the final catastrophe saw the last devastating assault on Jerusalem, its capture and destruction.

After the defeat of Judah and the capture of Jerusalem all that remained of the nation's leaders and skilled workers were deported to Babylon, only a tiny remnant being left to exercise some authority over the nation, now reduced to a primitive agricultural community. Among those left was Jeremiah, by now a man of advanced years. But he was not allowed to spend his old age in peace. A group of pro-Egyptian Jews, seeking freedom, escaped to Egypt, and took Jeremiah with them. where, in exile and captivity, he died, his message still disregarded.

Jeremiah's life was one of almost unrelieved suffering. His mission for God was to him the cause of his humiliation, shame and rejection. The initial promise that God made to him, as he was commissioned for his task, is found, in Chap. 1, v 17-19.

"Do not be dismayed by them. And I, behold, I make you this day a fortified city, an iron pillar, and bronze walls, against the whole land, against the kings of Judah, its princes, its priests, and the people

of the land. They will fight against you; but they shall not prevail against you, for I am with you, says the LORD, to deliver you."

Such is the promise that God makes to all His people who are called to walk in the footsteps of Jeremiah. Jeremiah's triumph lay not in success, as that word is commonly understood, but in his faithfulness to the work and message given to him by God. And his triumph was not achieved by his own power, but by God's support and strength in Jeremiah's heart and will.
