THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

26th September, 1938.

Dear People of All Saints'—

October is the month wherein we bring prominently before you the Children and Young People of the Parish. There will be the Children's Festival on Sunday, October 23, the Children's Tea on Wednesday, October 26, and above all, the beautiful and Sacred Rite of Confirmation will be administered by Bishop Pilcher on Sunday morning, October 30.

In this parish a great deal of work is being done through the four large day schools over and above the regular work in the Sunday School that we naturally feel we have a right to expect that all parents will have sufficient interest in their children and in what the Church is doing for them, to make every effort to attend one or more of the services arranged for Sunday, October 23. Do not let it be said, as it was on one occasion by a senior member of our Staff, when we were more than usually disappointed at the lack of parental interest, that he feared a large percentage of the children attending All Saints' were orphans!

When our Lord set a child "in the midst," He did what no other religious leader had done before—He taught the vital importance of childhood. He held up the child as at once a model to ourselves and a challenge to our service. A congregation that is not a conservatory in which the young plants may grow according to the nature God has given them is a blind and foolish community. A wise Church will recognise that "prevention is better than cure," and that her chief duty must be the building of a strong spiritual life in the young people as the surest method of reducing the numbers in this city who get into difficulties and find themselves appearing at the Children's Court. The importance of continuous, conscientious and skilled religious education of the children cannot be over-emphasised, but we **must have** the backing and co-operation of the parents in the task of helping their children to development into worthy citizens of God's Kingdom and of our country. May we count on **YOURS?**

We take this opportunity of specially inviting the parents and friends of the Confirmation candidates to be present on Sunday morning, October 30. Each candidate should invite his or her godparents to the Confirmation service, so that they may hear the Confirmees "acknowledging themselves bound to believe and to do all those things which their godfathers and godmothers undertook for them." The newly confirmed will make their First Communion at the early Celebration on Sunday, November 6, which is being observed as our Patronal Festival, and for which special services are being arranged. They are also expected to be present at the Communion Breakfast after their First Communion. On page eight you will find full details of the services and music for our Festival Sundays. We expect all loyal All Saints' people to co-operate in what is being arranged to fittingly mark the Festival of All Saints.

Many of those whom I have prepared and presented for Confirmation in former years have accepted my invitation to be present at the First Communion of the recently confirmed, and I am confident they will do so again this year. It is an encouraging gesture on their part, standing as an **Act of Remembrance** of their own Confirmation and as an **Act of Fellowship** with those who will then be entering into full membership of the Church.

These days in which we live are full of foreboding and perplexity. We are prone to become pessimistic, and wonder whether there can ever be any cessation of friction between the peoples of the earth; will the day ever dawn when man shall greet his brother man in comradeship. Thinking things out, we discover that peace is not an end in itself, nor is it found by directly searching for it. Peace is really a means to an end—and that end is God's purpose for mankind, which is the building of His Kingdom. In thinking of God's purpose we often make the mistake of supposing we need to grasp the **whole** scheme of things entire and complete, before we can even begin to work effectively anywhere. But we **need** not because we **cannot**. No human mind possibly can. God alone can hold it all in His infinite grasp. When we become downhearted and tell ourselves that there's nothing we can do that would alter the world or make the slightest difference to the course of events, it is then that we should listen again to Christ's challenging call, breaking through our spirit of futility,—"**Follow Me.**" Our lack of response to that challenge may delay God's purpose, but it cannot frustrate it.
