THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

29th November, 1943.

Dear People of All Saints':

In this dark world in which we are now living, a world devastated by war, there is a very real danger of falling into fatalism or pessimism. We are in danger of believing that evil is on the throne, that cruelty and brute force are woven into the very texture of life, that all that is happening in these days belongs to the nature of things. This coming Christmas will be the fifth wartime Christmas, and the gospel of Christmas was never more necessary, more welcome and more credible than it is to-day. The answer to the pessimistic and the fatalistic state of mind is a universe blazing with angels and a song of peace coming from the heart of the universe, beyond this world altogether. Surely the meaning of the angels' song is that peace is the nature of things, that peace is the aim of the universe, peace on earth! War, cruelty, greed and lust are against the nature of things and must ultimately be destroyed. The shepherds in the Christmas story, simple men though they were, must have realised that their world was out of harmony with God's design, out of harmony with the will of God, as it is to-day. Peace is in the nature of things, it is part of the rule of God and all the powers of evil shall not prevail against it. The guarantee of that is the Babe in the Manger. Jesus is the Prince of Peace, the beginning of the Kingdom of God on earth.

The Season of Advent, which commenced yesterday, with its doubly urgent summons to "Awake" out of sin, out of carelessness, and indifference has never in the history of our world sounded more insistently than it does to-day. No "New Order" will be of any value whatever unless it is based on really Christian principles. The world cannot save itself by its own worldly wisdom, and the sooner we all realise it, the better. We need to pray for forgiveness and humble ourselves before God for much that is wrong in our national life. We need to confess our neglect and forgetfulness of God and our failure to acknowledge Him. We need to pray that our hearts may be kept free from hatred and bitterness, if we are in any way worthily to prepare ourselves for Christmas, remembering that there can be no Christmas without Christ.

It was a great joy to have your splendid response to the appeal for A.B.M. Reconstruction and Advance Fund (New Guinea), just as we approach St. Andrew's Day, when the Church especially remembers all missionaries and missionary work; St. Andrew being the first Christian missionary. We are grateful to you ALL for your gifts (acknowledged in detail, where so desired, elsewhere in this issue); for a missionary-hearted people is one of the surest signs of a Church's life. We were very pleased to have the honour of being the first parish church to welcome the recently appointed Secretary of A.B.M.—the Revd. John Bell, who has resigned his fine parish of Christ Church, Claremont (Diocese of Perth) to take up this important work. It was fitting that he should be with us on the occasion of the offering of our special gifts for A.B.M. We thank him for his helpful message, for the happy fellowship we had with him, and we assure him of our prayers as he goes forth to this new work to which God has called him.

Even though the old, old greeting "A Happy Christmas" may seem unreal to many, I cannot refrain from using it, for the **real meaning** of Christmas is inward and spiritual, and should never be identified **ONLY** with the outward and visible expressions of it. In spite of the turmoil of war, let us give that eternal hope of the victorious King of Kings a real place in our hearts. Let not personal sorrow nor the conflict of nations drown the anthem that tells of ultimate and eternal triumph.

We shall all be thinking of those near and dear to us from whom we are now separated, and to whom we have sent our greetings, eagerly watching for theirs in return. I expect we shall do our little "grouch" because we can't get this, or we can't get that, but, at the same time we won't forget how much we, in Australia, have for which we ought to be thankful! In the very best sense of the words, may you have a Holy, Happy Christmas.

We here, at All Saints', have taken our first step in helping on the Christian Social Order Movement of which the missionary cause is one of its platforms.
