FROM THE PRESIDENT

As I consider what my personal feelings regarding this first year as president would be, I can do nothing less than give thanks to God, who by His Spirit has made me very aware of His love and power. This awareness has come to me through the fellowship and love found here in the state council. Your encouragement and support has lifted my spirits over and over again and I simply want to thank God for you all.

Much of this year's council work has been to consolidate and extend the programme ACW provides. Through Fellowship of the Least Coin (FLC), the Winifred Kiek Scholarship (WKS), and Asian Church Women's Conference (ACWC), we have opportunities right at our front door that need to be attended to and worked with. Attendances at the special day services where these areas have been given prominence have been a great source of inspiration to many and provided Australian Church Women (ACW) with the opportunities to witness about the success and progress in these areas.

Effort has also been made to further the effectiveness of the work of this council by greater participation of council members. It has been made clear that the work of ACW will only grow and develop if we who are the representatives of our churches and branches go out 'there' to inform and witness that our work is an effective one. This is one of my main areas of challenge that as president I should lead us on to a more effective

work among the women of our church communities.

We are an 'ecumenical council'. We have an established base to work on. It is my desire to see this message spread more widely.

It has been easy to work with you. This has been facilitated through the work of all executive members who have faithfully attended to their tasks. I specially wish to pay tribute to Edith Ridge (Secretary), whose constant support and guidance has been my right hand.

Edith is skilled as a secretary, and her knowledge of ACW cannot be faulted. Her graciousness in helping the 'new girl' has not gone unnoticed and I would like it written that without her, the work of this council could not have gone forward in the smooth and excellent manner that it has.

It should also be written that Dorothy Lumb (Treasurer) is an excellent steward of our monies. Dorothy has not had an easy year health-wise, but we praise the Lord that He has lifted her up to be able to continue her work with us.

The highlight for me, was to represent ACW at the Asian Church Women's Conference at Kinaseh, Jakarta, Indonesia.

Reports of this conference have been made in Newsette and the national newsletter of ACW. It has been with a great deal of delight that I have had the opportunity to represent you at many denominational meetings.

Of special significance was the request to join our Catholic sisters at their state conference at Port Macquarie. This gave me an excellent opportunity to make ACW known. Visits to special day services gave me the opportunity to affirm that the strength of ACW is in our branches.

1991/92 gives me the opportunity to further build on the base that we have. It is evident that greater interest and enthusiasm is being shown in many areas. I would like to strengthen council further by giving more specific direction to each denominational group (8 reps.). I envisage using each group as a council within the council to specifically work with their own churches, by informing, educating, serving, enthusing, and generally spreading

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the message of their involvement in ACW and encouraging more of their churches to participate in our activities.

I recommend that you all plan to be present at the national conference of ACW to be held here in Sydney at the Collaroy Conference Centre, September 9-13, 1991. We have the opportunity to use this conference as a stepping stone, and a great tool to assist us in the NSW council to go forward to greater things. May God bless us all

This year has been another busy one. We have been privileged to have as visitors to our country and to our Unit, three delightful young women. Doreen Tie from Malaysia was the 1990 Winifred Kiek Scholar. Her studies were here in Sydney and this gave us the opportunity of getting to know her and of assisting the National WKS Convenor in her work with Doreen. Doreen endeared herself to us when she visited our Council meeting and shared her life story and hopes for the future with us. We love to receive her letters since she returned home.

Rachel Mathew represented her church, the Ma Thoma Church of India at the World Council of Churches 7th. Assembly in February 1991. As a WKS Fellowship holder, she visited three State Units and NSW was privileged to be one of them. At a special meeting called to enable us to meet

Rachel, we enjoyed her company and learned much from her. It was a day of great fellowship for all who attended.

Rachel Sobana, also of India came to Australia only in March. Here she will further her nursing education as the 1991 WKS Scholar. Already she has charmed everyone who has met her. We know she will be another successful scholar.

Interest in ACW continues to grow. New information kits produced this year will enable groups enquiring about ACW to be informed and hopefully to be inspired to join us. There has been a steady quickening of interest in FLC, which has kept the convenor very busy.

One of the tasks the executive enjoyed most during the year, was writing the Fellowship Day service on the theme, 'Praise the Lord with Gladness'. We hope that all our groups will receive the same blessing in using it that we received in writing it.

Our members have many talents which they are always happy to share. Two teams of our council members worked lovingly to create the beautiful flower arrangements at the flower festivals held at the two great cathedrals of Sydney, St. Andrews and St. Marys. We were proud to see our name, Australian Church Women on these two lovely displays.

Highlights of our meetings have been: -

- * Sharing the excitement of the National Committee as it plans for the National Conference in September 1991. President Marie McCann introduced us to this with her enthusiastic talk in the June meeting. Since then, we have added a conference spot to the agenda of council meetings. The excitement will grow as we move closer to sharing in this conference.
- * The two meetings when convenors Patricia Burke (FLC) and Mina Whybourne (WKS) shared their life stories with us and told about the work of their convenorships.

- * The visit of Thelma Skiller of the World Council of Churches who talked about the WCC Assembly in its planning stages. One of the things we were encouraged to do was to make 'patches' for the Assembly. There are people in countries around the world who have taken home with them small mementoes created by some of our ACW members.
- * The beautiful devotional 'The Colours of Christmas' brought to us by Marjory Baker.
- * The report given by Marie McCann and Joan Tong on the Asian Church Women's Conference Assembly they attended in Jakarta in 1990. We were pleased to congratulate Joan on her appointment to the General Committee of ACWC and wish her well as she travels to her first meeting later in this year.

The highlight of my year was in representing our State Unit as an accredited visitor at the WCC Assembly. This was an experience I will never forget, and I thank ACW for giving me the opportunity.

Three new ventures we have undertaken are:

- * ACW Pens. This venture has proved a great success. The first run sold out very quickly. The pens being produced for sale in July will celebrate the Fellowship Day service and carry the theme on each pen.
- * A meeting of the executive with representatives of our affiliated denominations and organisations, gave us many good ideas for increasing the work of ACW. We are implementing them as the year goes on.
- * Associate Members. Every year we say good-bye to old and valued friends and welcome new members. Early in 1991 we decided to invite previous delegates to join ACW as Associate Members. In this way we hope to retain our friends as they partici-

pate in ACW at a new level.

We are grateful to the members who represent us at other organisations, to the members who host the morning teas each month, to the convenors who faithfully carry out their tasks of promotion, publicity, producing and distributing Newsette, looking after the membership lists, caring for the Winifred Kiek Scholar, helping us to be good stewards for Fellowship of the Least Coin. To Deaconess Mary Andrews we say 'thank you' for looking after the trading table during another year. We thank the Uniting Church for the use of its building and the Salvation Army for welcoming us to its lovely new headquarters.

The finances of the unit are faithfully administered by the Treasurer, Dorothy Lumb. Whatever would we do without the cheerful and capable services of Dorothy? Thank you from us all.

It was with joy that we received the announcement that our member and friend, Miss Phyl McKinnirey was chosen by her denomination to be the President-Elect. Phyl will become the second Catholic president at her installation in May 1992. We welcome her and look forward to working with her during 1991.

For all the blessings of this year we give thanks to God, and for all the days ahead we trust Him.

WINIFRED KIEK SCHOLARSHIP

The purpose of this scholarship is to provide supplementary training for a Christian woman from the Asian, Indian or Pacific areas.

Our 1990 scholar, Doreen Tie Chin Bing from Sarawak, Malaysia, was a charming attractive lass of twenty three years, who worked with intellectually handicapped children in a special school in her home city of Kuching. She wished to further her knowledge and training and this was arranged for her with the Developmental Disabilities Services Training School at Lidcombe. Subsequently she was able to visit the Spastic Centre and other similar institutions to observe and learn.

Doreen was able to attend and speak at several ACW meetings during her stay in Sydney, and also visited Canberra, our national capital, where she had the opportunity of meeting members. She then visited Melbourne, meeting ACW members and also visiting a special school and an Adult Training

Centre for the intellectually handicapped; then to Tasmania and Adelaide where Doreen met with Margaret Knauerhause (Winifred Kiek's daughter) and to Perth with further meetings and visits and eventually Doreen flew back to Kuching on December 11, commencing work the next day! Doreen has written us that she has been able to implement some of the ideas she acquired in Australia and has found her principal and colleagues are very happy to accept these. She is very busy and would value our prayers as she prepares her programmes for the children in her care. She was most grateful to Australian Church Women and particularly Lucelle King, our national WKS convenor, for arranging such a comprehensive and helpful programme for her.

Sister Rachel Sobana, our 1991 scholar, from Southern India, arrived in March. She is a very petite attractive young woman of twenty-five years. Rachel is to observe and gain knowledge in nursing administration. She will be attending our national conference in September.

Our 1978 WKS scholar, Sr. Barkat Kishan Das was made a deaconess in Karachi Cathedral, Pakistan on Jan, 13, 1991, and she is now working with Deaconess Shirley Harris (of the Church Missionary Society) in Karachi in caring for the children's home.

We pray for Malini Weerasinghe (Mrs Devananda) in Sri Lanka that God will bless and protect her and all our WKS scholars, especially those working in the troubled areas of the world.

NSW ECUMENICAL COUNCIL

In last year's report of the work of the Council, the good news was the foreshadowing of the joining of the Roman Catholics as full members of the NSW Ecumenical Council. Bishop Bede Heather, of the Parramatta Diocese, told how this could be done; by contacting the Bishop of each NSW Diocese, as the Bishop is autonomous in his own See. This has now been accomplished as far as the Parramatta Diocese is concerned. An ecumenical service to celebrate this was held in St Johns Cathedral at Parramatta. This service was preceded by an interesting and informative talk by Michael Tate, minister for Justice. (Reported in Newsette).

At last year's half-yearly meeting we were given insight into an ecumenical experiment in Milton Keynes in England. The speaker was Rev. Cethin Abraham-Williams, who, although he has such an unusual sounding name, turned out to be a normal-looking and speaking Baptist minister. In Milton Keynes, the ministers, (with the approval of the heads of the denominations) exchange pulpits on a regular basis.

At the annual meeting for 1990 at Epping, we listened to Bishop Max Thomas, Warden of St. Paul's College at Sydney University. He is a member of the International Commission for Anglican-Orthodox Theological dialogue and they meet in different countries. They appear to be still talking about whether the Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father, (the orthodox position) or from the Father and the Son (filioque). They decided perhaps it would be more profitable to talk less about relationships and more about function.

At the ecumenical service the preacher was a woman Ms Colleen O'Reilly. Mr. Ed Walker (husband of Elizabeth who was ACW's treasurer for a time), was re-elected as president of the NSW Ecumenical Council.

Deaconess Mary Andrews has continued to organise the trading table, and an amount of \$319 has been raised for NCW funds during the past year.

ECUMENICAL DECADE OF CHURCHES SOLIDARITY WITH WOMEN

I have been a member of this committee since its formation in 1988. Our project for 1991 is Women in Isolation. The committee is exploring ways of offering friendship and assistance to our sisters in remote areas of our state and to those whose isolation is no less real because they live in a big city.

Many of our members were participants at the recent Assembly of the World Council of Churches. The plenary document 'The Churches in Solidarity with Women' is being studied with the object of showing us ways we can implement its findings and introduce it to our churches.

We meet in the board room of the Australian Council of Churches, 7th Floor, 379 Kent St, Sydney at 1.00 p.m. on the 2nd Thursday of each month. New members are invited. You are assured of a very warm welcome at this committee. How about it, members of the denominations not represented? You will be among friends I promise you.
