## THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,  
9th June, 1950.

Dear People of All Saints',

When one has been associated with a man in Church life for many years, and when he is unflinching in his attendance Sunday after Sunday and year by year, it is strange how a false sense of permanence is created. One seldom ever thinks that there may come a time when that devoted Churchman will not be with us. The sudden passing of our good friend and my very loyal Warden, Ernest Collingwood King, has, therefore, come with a great shock and with a sense of irreparable loss, particularly as he was with us at a Parish Council Meeting, and apparently in good health, but five days before God called him. His place as Rector's Warden, Church Treasurer, Synod Representative, and Parochial Nominator will not be easy to fill.

An appreciation has been written which is admittedly inadequate, but what it lacks in felicity of expression is made up in a sincerity and a deep affection in which all who were privileged to know him will share. We are the poorer for his passing, but infinitely richer for his life amongst us.

The Forty-seventh Anniversary of the Consecration of our Parish Church draws near. As the years go by we find there are fewer and fewer former All Saints' parishioners whom we can invite; but there must be some who would welcome the opportunity of joining with us in an act of Dedication, Praise and Thanksgiving, which we endeavour to make the dominant notes of this Festival. August 20th (the eleventh Sunday after Trinity) is the date; so we suggest you commence now to get in touch with any former parishioners you know.


We hope the social side of our Festival will be marked again by the annual Parish Tea and Re-union on Wednesday, August 23rd. If we may have the co-operation of ALL our people we shall make this evening the time of happy social fellowship it has been for so many years. The Women's Guild, which organises the Tea, will be glad to hear from those who may be willing to help as hostesses.

We hope the boxes now in use, plus the envelopes which will be issued with the August "Chronicle," will bring in the £200 required for our Parish Hall debt. This matter concerns ALL organisations which have the privilege of using our spacious Parish Hall; and we expect their members to respond to the appeal, either individually or collectively.

Will parents and guardians of those approaching Confirmation age please see to it that they have an opportunity of reading the letter addressed to them in this issue regarding the formation of preparation classes next month? Will they also point out the importance of Confirmation, and help the young people to a wise decision; perhaps you yourself have never been confirmed? If so, why not take the opportunity of being confirmed at the same time as your son or daughter? If you feel a natural diffidence at the thought of attending a young people's preparation class I shall be quite willing to arrange an adult class if the numbers warrant it. May I remind those who accepted the responsibilities of God-parents about 1936 or 1937 of the solemn charge given you in the Sacrament of Baptism: "Ye are to take care that this child be brought to the Bishop to be confirmed by him."

I particularly ask that you do not defer your Confirmation until next year; for there may be no Confirmation at All Saints', Petersham, in 1951.

**THE RECTOR'S LETTER**  
**TO THOSE APPROACHING CONFIRMATION AGE**

Dear Girls and Boys,

In August we shall be forming preparation classes for Confirmation, and I want to write to those who are 14 or over, and those who will reach their 14th birthday before the end of this year.

Religion (like many things in life) is something you can take for granted all right for quite a time; but, in the long run, if it is to mean anything real to you, you've just got to discover it for yourself. I think most people pick up some queer ideas about what the Christian religion is, when they are very young. It is quite possible that you've got some ideas that you'll have to leave behind. You can be quite certain that a boy (or girl) whose religion doesn't grow up with him, will, in the end, grow out of it, and then he gives it up altogether.

When you are confirmed, you stand up and make a solemn promise "in the presence of God and of this congregation"; and it's a promise which has already been made for you once before—when you were baptised. And because you were then much too young to have any idea what it was all about, your God-parents made the promise in your name, and so became responsible for seeing that you were brought up faithful to the things that were promised—and that when you were old enough, you should take over the promise for yourself. That's the promise that you make at your Confirmation.

And it's a promise about how you're going to live. I don't suppose you have thought much about that so far—as a child, one takes life very much as it comes, and doesn't bother much as to what it's all about. But that won't do as one grows up. You can't just drift along, without any idea where you're going, or even where you want to go. You have, sooner or later, to make up your mind what you think life is for, and what you're going to do about it—at least if you're going to get anywhere. And that's exactly what you do when you're preparing for Confirmation. In our preparation we try to find answers to such questions as these: (1) How much does religion matter? and what am I going to do about it? (2) How much part should God play in my life? (3) What things am I going to try to develop in myself, and what am I going to try to get rid of? and why? (4) Am I going to get all I can out of life? or put all I can into it? I don't see how a girl or boy can go through life without answering questions like these. I know lots of people don't answer them—but they have to live somehow, and the way they live is really the answer they give to them, without thinking them out.

I invite you to join the preparation classes. If, after careful thought and prayer you decide to do so (and no one but YOU can make this decision), please hand to me before July 31 your full name and address, your age last birthday, and the date of your Baptism. Classes commence on Tuesday, August 1, for boys, and on Thursday, August 3, for girls; both classes being held at the Rectory, commencing at 7.15 p.m. It is most important that you should attend regularly.

## Ernest Collingwood King

### An Appreciation

Towards the end of 1931 a new Rector was appointed to All Saints', Petersham. It wasn't a particularly good time to be making a change; we were in the grip of a financial depression at that time, and, to come from a parish where he knew everyone, to another where he knew no one, was something of an ordeal. Therefore, the new Rector came with a certain amount of hesitancy, if not of trepidation; and, because a Rector's Warden is a person of more than ordinary importance to a Rector, he wondered what manner of man he would find, and whether he would be able to "get on" with him. However, he had not been here very long before he knew he had found a true friend, and that it would be most difficult to "get on" without him! For the Rector's Warden was Ernest Collingwood King, who for 19 years continued in that office, in addition to holding it for some 10 years previously; so that of his 45 years' association with this Church, he served as Rector's Warden for close on 30 years. His long record of devotion to, and faithful service for All Saints', Petersham, is one that very few could equal, and fewer still, surpass.

Ernest King was a loyal servant of Christ and His Church; a most devoted husband and father; a true, understanding and very lovable friend; beloved in his home (surely the testing place of a man's character); honoured and respected in the commercial life of this city; in short, he was a very great Christian gentleman, with all the lovely attributes that belong to both those fine words—"Christian" and "gentleman." For so many years—good financial years and bad ones—he has guided us as the capable and efficient Treasurer of our Church, that we had come to rely implicitly upon his wise counsel in matters financial. But it is not only because of his wisdom in the necessary material things of church life that we shall remember him. There are other and greater things which create a lasting memory—he was a man of prayer, one who loved his Church and her services, and from year to year there were very few Sundays when he was absent from them. He was a man of high principle—nothing could deflect him from a path, or a course of action which he believed to be right. There are many things we admired in him; one in particular was his fearlessness. If a thing was wrong, he spoke out against it, quite regardless of the standing or importance of the offender.

God has given us many lovely gifts to help us through this pilgrimage we call Life; but one of the loveliest is the gift of Friendship. No man can ever feel utterly lonely or forsaken if he has a friend. No man could ever wish for, or could ever have a truer or more understanding friend than Ernest King—no Rector could ever have a more loyal colleague. During the past 19 years of happy fellowship there was built up a deep understanding and a bond of real affection between Rector and Warden. There was so much in his life for which we may thank God—his unselfishness, his thoughtfulness, his loyalty, his devotion to duty. It is all summed up in the words of St. Luke, the "beloved physician," who says of St. Barnabas (whom the Church commemorates on June 11th) "he was a good man," a man whose very name means "the Son of Consolation," which is really an old Hebrew way of saying he was a "tower of strength."

The passing of Ernest King is a challenge to the younger people—a challenge to take from his hands the torch he carried so bravely and untiringly and kept burning so brightly.

Not many people read Thackeray nowadays, but in one of his books he has one of the loveliest descriptions the writer knows of the Passing of a Good Man:

“At the usual evening hour the chapel bell began to toll, and Thomas Newcome's hands outside the bed feebly beat time. And just as the last bell struck, a peculiarly sweet smile shone over his face, and he lifted up his head a little, and quietly said ‘Adsum,’ and fell back. It was the word we used at school, when names were called; and lo, he, whose heart was as that of a little child, had answered his name, and stood in the presence of the Master . . .”

Our dear friend and beloved Churchwarden has answered his name; and we may confidently leave his brave spirit in the hands of Him Who called him.

“God removes His workmen; but His work goes on.”
