THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
30th December, 1950.

Dear People of All Saints,'

Opinion is divided regarding the very cool, even cold, Christmas Day; but it suited the writer very nicely!

The Church was tastefully decorated by Mrs. Morris, assisted by Miss Hayes, to whom (with those who supplied extra flowers), we are very grateful. Although there were not quite so many Communicants as last year, we may thankfully record that we had very good Services throughout Advent and Christmas-tide, to which the Choir contributed in its usual acceptable manner. We were indebted to the Chaplain of the Mission to Seamen, Rev. G. C. Bennett, for his assistance at the early celebrations on Christmas Day. Which reminds me to say, I received a Christmas letter from the Rev. A. E. Gardner from Athens, in which he sends greetings to "any of the All Saints' folk who remember me."

I have suggested above that we take Proverbs one, thirty-three, as our motto for the New Year. "Whoso hearkeneth unto Me shall dwell safely" . . . the "Me" in this clause is the voice of wisdom, which, for the writer, is the voice of God. At the outset, he concedes that this voice has to compete with many other voices, and he presents us with a picturesque contrast between wisdom and folly. "Whoso hearkeneth to the voice of God's wisdom shall be quiet from the fear of evil." You will notice that it does not promise us exemption from evil. The Christian religion never did promise a man that if he lived according to the law of the Lord, or accepted the challenge of Christ, his life would be untouched by evil. On the contrary, both the Old and New Testaments give us abundant examples of people who were hard pressed because they were obedient children of God. No; there is no promise that we shall be exempt from evil; the promise is, that we shall be quiet from the **FEAR** of evil. Perhaps the most crippling and disabling factor in the lives of men is not the actual evil or calamity itself, but our anticipation and fear of it. Much of our active life is spent in safeguarding ourselves against possible misfortunes, sicknesses, poverty, and the like. The Russian writer, Chekhov, has a story called the "Man in the Leather Case"—it is a parable for nations and individuals on this theme. The central figure is Belikov, who in hot or cold weather went about in goloshes, a padded coat, and always carried an umbrella. Asked why he thus burdened himself, he would reply: "You never know: something might happen." Not evil, but the fear of it, affects men like the palsy; it is the most crippling and disabling thing in human life. Recognition of this fact brings out the majestic sweep of this divine promise: "Whoso hearkeneth unto Me shall dwell safely and shall be quiet from the fear of evil." Nothing is sufficient for our times but faith in the living God.

I am deeply grateful to you all for the generous gift made me at the Christmas Party; particularly when I remember the increased cost of living and the extra expenditure in which we are all involved at that time of the year. Whilst I appreciate and value the material assistance the cheque affords, I am even more deeply touched by the regard and goodwill which prompted the gift, which is expressed in so practical a manner.

My fiancée and I are indeed grateful for the many congratulations we have received. We look forward to our work together amongst so many good, loyal friends; and pray that God may spare us all to enjoy a happy re-union about November, 1951.

Meanwhile, I hand over confidently to the Rev. W. T. Price, and again express the earnest hope that you will support and co-operate with him and Mrs. Price in every possible way. The measure of your success together will be very largely the measure of your loyalty to Christ and His Church, particularly that corner of it known as All Saints, Petersham. I am glad to say Mrs. Gill will continue to be at the Rectory, and she has kindly consented to look after the letting of the Hall (in our verger-less state!) until later in the year, when she plans to have a holiday in Queensland, as I hope she may.

The original meaning of "Good-bye" is "God be with you," and it is in that sense I use it; praying that 1951 may be for each and every one of you,

District Visitors.—Mrs. Auhl has kindly consented to take over the district formerly visited by Mrs. Aitken. We regret that Miss Peard is giving up, owing to removal from the parish. A conscientious and faithful visitor for so many years, and a former Secretary of the Association, we are going to miss her, not only as a District Visitor, but as a very regular worshipper. We wish Mr. and Miss Peard and Miss Hole every happiness in their new home at Arncliffe. We regret also that Mrs. Lock has resigned, and thank her for her assistance. There is still no regular Visitor for Shaw Street, which Miss Hayes, assisted by Mrs. McLean, has undertaken for some months. This means that unless someone will offer for this important work, we shall commence the year three short, which will be a serious matter for a work which has been for many years so great an asset to the Rector and Wardens. We hope she may soon be able to take up the work again, and that others will volunteer to fill in the gaps.

We resume on Tuesday, January 23rd, opening with a Quiz Night arranged by Mr. H. F. Judging by the spontaneous and sustained applause, the news has the unanimous approval of the Parish!

Opportunity was taken to say a few words of farewell to Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Cooke, who will be greatly missed from All Saints', particularly from the Choir, where both gave years of very helpful service. Colonel C. H. Granville, who succeeds Mr. Cooke as Church Treasurer, was welcomed, and another happy Christmas Party concluded with Auld Lang Syne and the National Anthem.

C.S.O.M.—Members will have learned, with much regret, that the Council reluctantly has decided to wind up the affairs of the Christian Social Order Movement. This decision was made through lack of funds and the inability to appoint an assistant to the Director, and an increased office staff. It is largely through the ability, energy and devotion of the Director that the Movement has been kept going for seven years. A farewell gathering will be held in the Chapter House on Monday, February 19th, at 8 p.m.

The Children's Library was sponsored by our Group of C.S.O.M. and has been largely supported and maintained by its members. The question arises as to the future of the Library; maybe it could be of more value elsewhere. No decision has been made; but meanwhile the Library will re-open on the first Tuesday in February. Miss Brown is willing to continue as Librarian, with what assistance she may be able to secure. It will need someone willing to be trained in the "Dewey" system, upon which the Library is organised, and which we desire shall be maintained, if the Library remains here.—C.E.A.
