COURAGE ON THE STREETS OF IRAN

Facing up to the Future.

"Not many people would expect to see Bibles still being sold in the streets of Iran, but a few truly dedicated people have brushed their fears aside and set themselves up on the pavement alongside others distributing their own kinds of literature. It takes a lot of courage to do this in the new Islamic climate in Iran. Many of the traditional outlets for the Scriptures have been closed -- for example, the programme for new literates in the schools has been stopped. However, the Bible Society has been allowed to continue publishing the Scriptures as before, and the depot in Tehran has had any interference. In the new contribution, it seems that religious freedom will be guaranteed to minorities, among whom the Christians are a large group. But it is still not clear just what are the limits of this freedom."

..... " The Bible Society remains confident that it has a future in Iran, although it will take time to adapt to the new Islamic society."

and we will enjoy more the "burst of Spring"


Thank you all for your letters and news during

Dein's planned arrival for 4.35p.m. was delayed
until approximately 8.45p.m. so members of the work-
ing committee and the Southern Branch of the State
Unit of A.C.W. had a long wait before they were able to
welcome Dein to Tasmania.

A busy week was planned for Dein. On Tuesday
morning she was met by Father Jim Smith and taken to
the Risdon Jail to meet the women prisoners, then to
a radio station for an interview, followed by a visit
to the Royal Hobart Hospital. After lunch, it was off
to the Mercury Office for an interview with the report-
er of Church News; then on to Channel Six for a live
talk back programme. Tuesday evening was spent in the
home of her hostess, meeting people from Indonesia.

Wednesday morning dein was invited to the Link
Group which meets at St. John's Presbyterian Church and
as a result of her visit, the group has asked for a
speaker from A.C.W. to attend another meeting and give
them more information about the Fellowship of the Least
Coin and the Winifred Keik Scholarship. After the meet-
-ing, her hostess Mrs Vanemmerick, took Dein to lunch
at Fern Tree, then into the City to buy warm clothes and
a lovely pair of warm boots. In the evening she as the

EASTER ON CHRISTMAS ISLAND (from our West Aust.con.)

this is an extract from an account by Major J. Linsell)

From our vantage point in the 'plane, we saw it! and, as the 'plane circled around the island we gathered our first impressions. Ruggedly beautiful in its remote location in the Indian Ocean. 14525 miles north west of Perth, 224 miles south of Java Head, 815 miles south from Singapore. It is difficult to think of it as the summit of a submerged mountain, but such it is.

Light had barely dawned as our little Christian group, interdenominational and multiracial, and varying in degrees of social status, gathered silently and reverently in a beautiful garden on the morning of Easter Day.

In this pause between dawn and sun-rise, the air was very still; the settlement below was scarcely astir, although bright with lights. Rugged cliffs, topped by towering rain forests, was contrasted by the cantilever loader, its mighty arms stretching seaward. This is an integral part of the island's machinery, belonging to the phosphate company, which provides work for the majority of the residents on the island.

There were those who were awake and on the job bright and early to keep production moving, and high above, in the lovely nursery garden, the faithful group, curious and wondering, prepared for the dawn Easter Service,the first ever held on Christmas Island.

There is no resident minister on the island. One from Perth visits annually, arriving on special Govt. chartered 'plane; which flies fortnightly via Cocos Is. and Perth.

Standing in the grey of that early overcast, Easter morning, we were conscious of a new and very wonderful experience. To the accompaniment of the sound of a solitary Flugal Horn, the fervent group of worshippers stood in the semi-darkness "Christ the Lord is risen today" (cont. on page 7)

"DEAR AND GLORIOUS PHYSICIAN" by
Taylor Caldwell (1978) £3.25

Before reviewing this book which I recently read and thoroughly enjoyed, I would like to quote from the end of the Gosple of John:
(v25) "There are many other things that Jesus did"
(v24) "these are written, that you may believe, these things are true. and believng you may have Life Everlasting".

The author has taken time and prayfully written a biography of Lucanus, the beautiful Greek boy, who after the untimely death of his father, is fostered by Diedorus, a Roman soldier, who later became his step-father. This was the point in time when ancient Greece had fallen to the might of All Powerful Rome.

From his early childhood, Lucanus is torn between loyalties and loves. His great love for his young and beautiful mother Iris, from whom he learned of the Greek gods: the influence of Diedorus, whom he respected and who taught him the so called power of the Roman gods: the household physician Keptah, who believes in the "One True God" of the Jews. This learned and kindly man has a great influence on the boy and at the early age of eight years, they share an experience together when, one warm summer's night, they "see a great, bright star in the East".

It is through the influence of Keptah and the money of Diedorus, that the young Lucanus was sent to Athens to study to be a physician. Before this, however, he has suffered personal grief and loss of a loved one and he
