THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

27th September, 1943.

Dear People of All Saints',

We are drawing near to Sunday, October 24th, when the sacred rite of Confirmation will be administered in our Church by Bishop Pilcher. The parents and friends of the Confirmation candidates will naturally wish to be present at that service; and I have suggested to the candidates that where it is at all possible, their godparents should also be invited to the Confirmation Service, so that they may be able to witness their godchildren taking upon themselves the responsibilities their sponsors undertook for them at Baptism. The responsibilities of godparents do **not** end until they bring their godchildren "to the Bishop to be confirmed by him." In cases where distance precludes the attendance of the godparents, may I suggest that they be informed of the date and time of the service, in order that they may support the candidates by their prayers at the actual hour of Confirmation.

The newly-confirmed will make their first Communion at the eight o'clock celebration on our Patronal Festival Sunday, October 31, being the Sunday nearest to All Saints' Day. I hope we may have the usual Communion Breakfast for them.

Many of those who were confirmed here during my twelve years' incumbency are not now with us. War has scattered them far and wide, and there are others who no longer reside in this parish; but there is quite a number still with us, and it is "up to us" who are not denied the opportunity and privilege of worshipping in our Parish Church to make our Patronal Festival a day of re-dedication and thanksgiving. I again ask you to come to the Early Celebration on October 31, and use it as a time of Remembrance and Fellowship—Remembrance of your own Confirmation, and Fellowship with those who on that day will be enjoying, for the first time, the full privileges of membership in God's great family—the Church.

On that Sunday evening we shall have a special service for the relatives and friends of those serving in the King's Forces—especially inviting the relatives of those whose names are on our Prayer-list. There are over one hundred-and-sixty names on that list; and I particularly ask that their loved ones at home will join in an act of Corporate Prayer for, and Remembrance of them and the cause wherein they serve.

On page 8 you will find details of the services arranged for the Festival, and we would give this timely notice to parents and friends of the children, that November 7 is the Children's Festival, when we expect all parents to be present at the eleven o'clock service.

You will be interested to know that Mr. Nicholls has arrived in New Guinea, and is now working in that Diocese. He writes most enthusiastically of his arrival. Unfortunately I haven't the space to print the whole letter, but here are a couple of extracts. "My greatest joy was when headquarters was sighted, to see the great Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul, standing out as a great witness to our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. . . . Our many visitors seem to make the one remark: 'It seems difficult to believe that such a place could exist in New Guinea.' But it does exist, and fills one with great pride and admiration for those pioneer missionaries who have spent their all in this place for Christ. You just ought to see our glorious Cathedral, with a congregation of 400 people which we had at seven o'clock last Sunday morning; a wonderful building built by a wonderful people. It has been my great privilege to celebrate Holy Communion and to preach in it. . . . What a joy it is to hear these people sing, to watch them at school, at work, and at play! They certainly have character, intellect and ability. I feel it a great privilege to have been called by God to serve in this Diocese. When reconstruction days

are ours, much prayer, many reinforcements and many donations will be required. I'm really pleased to know that All Saints' people are doing their bit."

Our present "bit" is to help in every way we can to raise the one hundred pounds which is the objective of the Women's Guild for the Reconstruction and Advance Fund of the Australian Board of Missions, about which you have read in the last two "Chronicles." Our aim is to have the money in hand by the end of November, so there is not much time left in which to reach the goal.
