## THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

30th May, 1938.

Dear People of All Saints,—

At our Annual Vestry Meeting held on May 4, Messrs. W. P. Bannan and S. L. Rankin were unanimously re-elected People's Wardens, and Mr. E. C. King again did me the honour of accepting nomination as Rector's Warden. The people elected to the Parish Council Messrs. L. C. Calver, A. S. Cusiter, C. E. Tanner, J. M. Boyle, W. Sopwith, Junr., D. B. Hunter, W. Webster, H. F. Jones and F. L. Browne; whilst Messrs. G. A. Guilfoyle, W. F. Stephenson, and J. McK. Williams subsequently accepted my nomination.

Notwithstanding the fact that we finished the year with a debit balance, we claim we have had a satisfactory year. Whilst there have been some things that have been disappointing, from the Rector's point of view, there have been other things that are definitely encouraging.

I understand there are some (not present at the Vestry Meeting) who look upon the debit balance as a sign that we are going back, and I hasten to assure them that this is **NOT** so. You have to remember that there was no Easter in the financial year 1937-38, and that the Wardens were faced with additional expenditure for which they could not budget. Elsewhere in this issue our Treasurer has kindly explained this for the benefit of those who could not be present at the Vestry Meeting, and it is hoped his statement may dispel the mists of pessimism from their minds.

We cannot "go back" if we retain the keenness and enthusiasm of the many loyal workers we have, and through them, perhaps, penetrate the apathy and indifference of those who, for no apparent reason, have cut themselves off from the family of the Church. By that phrase I mean a company of people which maintains religion as a personal experience. Religion must not be a mere tradition which we have inherited from the past, but a living **Faith**. It must not be mere interest in religious subjects and zeal for religious institutions, but the reality by which we live, giving comfort in sorrow, guidance in perplexity, and power in all times of weakness. When people talk about brotherhood and economic justice and universal peace, and show no signs of self-criticism and self-discipline; when they would reform the world and yet refuse to face up to their own spiteful tempers and uncharitable judgments, they are in a bad way. They are in danger of making religion an excuse instead of a way of salvation. When they reproach the Church, its leaders, and its worship, and **never themselves** they are not unlike the men of old who saw splinters in other eyes and were quite unaware of beams in their own. All true religion begins with the self—with facing selfishness, personal pride, jealousy and avarice—it begins there, with the evil that is within; and no one who is sincere will make light of that problem in his own heart. It goes on to repentance, and gratitude, and prayer and out of that will flow something real and abiding which can bring healing to the nations. There is nothing so necessary to-day in this bewildered, struggling, slaughtering world of ours, as a revival of personal religion.

We ask your co-operation in the appeal which is being made for our Parish Hall Fund per medium of the collecting boxes. It is not too late if you will act **promptly**; for you have the whole of June and July and three weeks in August before the boxes are called in. There are one hundred and thirty-four boxes already issued, and we would like to place another sixty-six throughout the parish. There must be that number of people who could help in this way. Ask your District Visitor for a box, or apply for one at Church, and it will be immediately forthcoming. Most of you know, I think, that this method is adopted in lieu of a fete; because we find it far more effective, and it certainly entails far less work. We would like to make it clear that what you give to the District Visitor each month is for general Church funds; the Box appeal is a **special effort** for our Parish Hall debt.

Some have said that they cannot afford to give to the District Visitor


and take a box as well. We know that this is definitely so in some cases, and we appreciate what they are doing for the General Fund; but at the same time we would point out, in the kindest possible way, that there are many who give through the offertories at Church twice on Sunday, who give to the District Visitors, and who also have taken a box. It involves sacrifice; of course it does, but can you tell me of anything really worth while that doesn't?

It is with regret I record, that after more than eleven years' association with All Saints' as Organist and Choirmaster, Mr. R. E. G. Moon leaves us to take up similar work at St. Stephen's, Willoughby. He has been a faithful and most reliable officer, of genial personality, whose duties have been conscientiously discharged at all times. He has always looked well ahead and planned accordingly, thus establishing a reputation for outstanding reliability. Mr. Moon takes with him to his new work the good wishes of All Saints' people.

His successor will be Mr. A. B. Kerrigan, who brings with him from his nine years' work at St. James, Croydon, a record of great skill as an Organist and Choirmaster, and one who has special gifts of leadership in the musical section of Church life. We extend to him a hearty welcome, and in so doing, feel sure the Choir will give to him its utmost loyalty in the important task of leading the Church's praise and rendering the service in a manner that will create an atmosphere of worship at all times.

In conclusion, may I say that whatever we have been able to achieve together during the year past should be an incentive to do even greater things in the future, and should encourage us to go forward with Keeness and Enthusiasm to meet the challenges of the new financial year. It becomes increasingly obvious that nothing of any lasting value can be done without sacrifice of time, energy, and money. Let us resolve, then, to tackle whatever lies ahead in gratitude to God for the past, and with hope and courage for the future.

Will you please ask the Rector to convey to the congregation our very sincere congratulations on their splendid Lenten Offering of £17/1/6. This seems to be the largest amount from All Saints' for some years, and we much appreciate your practical help at this time of special need and opportunity."

**Acknowledgement.**—The following letter will be of interest to Women's Guild members. On his way back to England (where he is now secretary of the C.M.S. in the Diocese of Canterbury) Mr. Cranswick visited King Edward School, Chapra, of which he was Principal:—

"Dear Mr. Adams,—

I have been back to Chapra, and have seen the lad, Amrito, who, with the help of friends at Dulwich Hill and the contribution of your Women's Guild, enjoys an Agriculture Scholarship. He is doing very well and is in his 2nd Year.

The Revd. J. Jones, who has just joined the Staff is an agriculturist as well as a parson. When he 'gets' his language, he will take over the School as Principal.

I am ashamed to think that you have had no written acknowledgement and thanks before, but in getting away from India last year, I did not note that your gift was in with that of Dulwich Hill as a half-scholar-ship. Now I have been back and seen with my own eyes that the Farm Scheme is going strong, I can thank you with more assurance, and ask you to remember Amrito in your prayers. I am sure a line to Mr. Jones would elicit more information.—Yours very sincerely, G. F. CRANSWICK."

**The Financial Statement.**—In comparison with last year's accounts the present statement, although showing we have turned a credit balance of £27/2/1 into a debit balance of £51/3/11 at end of March, 1938, the amount, viz., £78/6/-, can be easily accounted for if parishioners will study statement of accounts. On account of there being no funds in the Hall Account and it being necessary to comply with the Mortgagees' demands to have the Hall and Rectory painted, it was therefore the only alternative to have same done, and payment was made out of General Account, viz., £63/19/-. During the year we had also to meet an expenditure of £13 for treatment of borers in choir stalls and portion of seating. The roof was repaired, costing £17/8/-. We also had a liability of £16/1/7 owing to missions which was unpaid at 31st March, 1937, if parishioners will consult last year's statement. From the above it will be seen (leaving out the last item) we had to meet the large amount of £94/7/-, which was not anticipated, so the position would have been a credit this year had it not been for matters mentioned. As soon as funds permit, the amount of £63/19/- will be refunded from Hall Account. Up to the present I have had £15. The general items offertories, etc., in comparison with last year's are up to the mark, and generally we are in just as good position as previous year.

**Women's Guild.**—The meeting on Thursday, 11th May, was devoted to business matters in connection with the Guild. It was decided to hold a small sale on **Thursday, 23rd June**, in aid of the C.M.S. Annual Gift Appeal, when the members of the Y.P.U., quite a talented little band, will provide a varied programme. The sale was so successful last year that it is hoped members will redouble their efforts this year for such a worthy cause. Cakes, jams, pickles, and useful articles from the Shilling Stall will be for sale. The Guild is also arranging a series of Parish Re-unions, to be held quarterly, the first one being in July. These will serve a twofold purpose. Parishioners will be able to foregather for social intercourse and the Curate Fund will benefit financially. Every parishioner is asked to help make these functions successful. **Thursday, 9th June**, will be the Quarterly Rally of the Guild. Service will commence in the Church at 3 p.m., and will be followed by a social time in the Parish Hall.

**Girls' Club.**—The meetings for May have been of a very diverse character. On 16th May it was a great pleasure to have Rita Finlay as our special speaker, and she took us to Singapore, in imagination, for the evening. The talk was enhanced by a splendid collection of photographs. Then, on the 30th May, the Club had an evening with the great composer, Handel. Miss Adams read an interesting paper on the composer's life, which was interspersed with excerpts (per gramophone) from his works. Records of the "Water Music," Concertos 7 and 13, choruses from "The Messiah;" "Largo" and "Where'er You Walk" helped to make an enjoyable evening. A cordial welcome was extended to some new members by our President, Miss Chipindall, and supper brought the evening to a close. There will be no meeting of the Club on June 13 (King's Birthday). June 27 is our L.H.M.U. Gift Evening, when every member is asked to bring one article of baby clothing, the said articles being forwarded to the L.H.M.U. for distribution amongst the poorer parishes of our diocese. It is hoped that a deaconess will be the speaker for the evening.

**Y.P.U.**—This enthusiastic little band of workers is to be congratulated on the success of the Missionary Evening held on May 2. A splendid programme was arranged and carried out, the Misses Belfield and Carolus, the Assistant Leaders, being mainly responsible for the various items, which consisted of two missionary plays, "Go Tell" and "The Last Doll;" "A Missionary Alphabet;" "Idol Worship;" "Chinese Hospital Scene;" tableau, "The Harvest;" and last but not least, a "Pageant of All Lands." Miss Adams, the Leader, had a lovely gift of flowers from the members at the close of the evening. The function resulted in the sum of £6, which has been forwarded to C.M.S. Members are now busily working on articles for the Gift Boxes which go overseas in July.

**The Choir.**—After the Ascension Night Service, members of the Choir assembled in the Guild Room to bid farewell to our Organist and Choirmaster. Supper was served and speeches were made by several senior members and by Mr. King; after which the Rector presented our guest with a case of fish-knives and forks from the Choir members. Mr. Moon carries with him our very best wishes for the future.

Earlier in the evening, Chorister J. Wood, on behalf of the Choirboys, presented Mr. Moon with an umbrella, which bears the trade slogan "Carried unanimously," thus expressing the boys' unspoken goodwill. Boys are usually good talkers, but there are times when they would seem to be smitten with temporary dumbness, and an occasion such as the above is one of them!

Will members please note that practices during the month of June will be held on Wednesday evenings.
