THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Récory

30th August, 1947.

Dear People of All Saints',

It is with a deep sense of thankfulness that we record, once again, a happy and successful Consecration Festival; we are very grateful to **ALL** who helped to make it so, particularly the members of our Choir, whose good work throughout the day added much to the inspirational character of the services. We were glad to have the Revd. John Price (of the King's School), as the occasional preacher at Evensong, and thank him for his helpful and practical message. Within the Octave of the Festival we had a visit from Bishop Wynn Jones, of Central Tanganyika, who also kindly came and spoke to the girls and boys in Sunday School before morning service. It was unfortunate we had bad weather on the occasion of the Bishop's visit; no doubt, weather conditions, together with prevailing sickness and some of our people being way for the school vacation, combined to make our congregation not up to standard numerically. However, it was good to hear of the fine work being done in the great diocese of Tanganyika, which is largely staffed by Australians.

You will be glad to know that the objective of our Special Appeal has been attained, the total to date being £205/14/2. The Churchwardens join me in thanking very sincerely **ALL** parishioners and friends, who, by their very generous response, have translated our aim into actual fact.

We were fortunate in the weather for our Parish Festival Tea. The day chosen proved to be a beautifully fine one, sandwiched in between two blustery, cold and wet evenings. All will agree that the annual parish tea was no exception to the happy times of fellowship and reunion we have been privileged to enjoy for many years, and for which we are indebted to the enthusiasm and hard work of the women of the parish (under the leadership of the President of the Women's Guild) and the kindly assistance of so many who assisted them with gifts of many kinds. The Revd. E. T. Montgomery represented the neighbouring churches, and apologies were received from the Revd. Allen and Mrs. Brooke, and Mrs. Montgomery. After tea, Mr. W. Rowland Eagar was associated with Mr. Albert Schofield in a most enjoyable organ and violin recital, and at the conclusion of Evensong, an attractive programme (arranged by Mr. Eagar), was presented in the Parish Hall, when Miss Wright, Messrs. Bamford and Schofield entertained us with their music, Miss Del Ifield with her graceful solo dances, and our old friend, "Weirdo," was again a most popular and mystifying entertainer. After the Treasurer had reported the progress of the Special Appeal, and had expressed the Wardens' thanks, and the Rector had added a few words of appreciation of the efforts of **ALL** who made the Tea possible, another very happy Festival was brought to a conclusion by the singing of the National Anthem.

We can and do "thank God and take courage" as we look back upon this year's Consecration Festival. The church comes in for a good deal of criticism these days. An article entitled "The Steeple and The People" appeared not so long ago in an English paper. It dealt with the relation of the Church to the masses. It was frankly critical. The writer suggested that, metaphorically, the steeple was too high, too remote and cold, and was not concerned with human needs, and was too self-conscious. It seemed to say "admire me" not "come to me." The steeple seemed to have no suggestion of genial warmth and human fellowship and fraternity. In plain words, that the Church is apathetic, and indifferent to the daily needs of men. That is the indictment, and there may be **SOME** truth in it. But it is not the whole truth; it is not even half the truth. The steeple is not so high, so remote, so cold as some people suppose. As a matter of fact, the Christian Church to-day is behind all our benevolent and philanthropic institutions. It is behind every practical programme for a new and better world order. It is the chief dynamic behind all great and good

causes. No other society makes such strenuous moral demands upon its members. No other society makes such constant appeals for heroic self-sacrifice. The fact is, many who charge the Church with cowardice, indifference and hypocrisy hold aloof because they are not prepared to comply with its high demands. For the Church to-day is demanding conformity of life to noble ethical demands, and a readiness to serve our fellows in the Name of Christ.

The function is being arranged and sponsored by the Guild, and we seek the co-operation of all organisations in making the day a tremendous success. Watch for the date!

Fifth Missionary Appeal.—Now that the special appeal for our Parish Hall Fund has so successfully concluded, we may turn our attention more freely and enthusiastically to the Fifth Missionary effort, by which we have set ourselves the task of raising an additional hundred pounds before Advent Sunday (November 30). This year, you remember, the money is to go to the Church Army to help train an aboriginal girl as a fully qualified nurse for work amongst her own people. Years ago, Church Army trained Sister Muriel Stanley, who is to-day doing great work at Yarrabah (the A.B.M. Station, in North Queensland). Don't be misled by the thoughtless, ill-informed person who glibly asserts, "you can't do anything with the aborigines." Sister Stanley is one of the many who disprove this wild statement. So also is Lieutenant Reginald Walter Saunders, who made history by becoming the first full-blooded aborigine to be commissioned in the Australian Army. Son of a Gallipoli veteran, he himself joined up at the beginning of the war, taking a notable part in the Libyan, Greece and Crete campaigns. As a sergeant in New Guinea, he took command of his platoon for five months when his officer was wounded. His highest hopes were fulfilled when he graduated amongst the first ten of a class of 33 in an Officers' Training School. "The aborigine does not ask for privileges," he said, "merely equal opportunities with fellow Australians. Given that opportunity, many will succeed in walks of life not open to them now." . . .

We know full well that "the Church that refuses to be missionary ceases to be Christian." **THIS IS OUR EFFORT TO GIVE AN ABORIGINAL GIRL HER OPPORTUNITY**; and what a blessing she may become to her own people in the days that lie ahead! Have **YOU** had a share in this great privilege yet? Time is marching on—only twelve weeks to go! Thanks to an anonymous donor of £1, and to Mrs. M. Watson, 10/-, and Miss Humphries, 10/-, the fund moves on to £33/18/-.—E. V. ADAMS, Organiser.
