THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
23rd April, 1938.

Dear People of All Saints'.—

From the outburst of praise in the fine old eighteenth century Easter Hymn—"Jesus Christ is Risen to-day"—sung as a processional to the first Communion, to the triumphant notes of Handel's Hallelujah Chorus, beautifully sung by the large choir as an Act of Praise and thanksgiving at the close of Festal Evensong, we have every reason to be devoutly thankful for our services on Easter Day.

Notwithstanding the fact that white flowers were difficult to obtain this year, we seemed to have our fair share, and Mrs. Morris and her helpers are to be congratulated upon the artistically decorated Church. The services throughout the day were very well attended, and, what to my mind, is most encouraging, is that the contents of our Lenten Boxes and Envelopes (which are always devoted to the missionary work of the Church) were greater than any previous year of my incumbency of All Saints'. We are most grateful to all who contributed in any way to the inspirational character of the Easter Festival.

We have long thought that the results of a fete are not nearly an adequate return for the enormous amount of work such a venture involves; and last year we instituted a system of Box Collections, in lieu of an annual fete, for the Parish Hall Fund. Encouraged by the success thereof, we have launched a similar appeal this year. Between the issue of the Boxes on Easter Day and the date of our Consecration Festival—August 21—there is a period of eighteen weeks, and if you and your friends will place something in the box regularly each week, we feel sure that the result will be even greater than last year. One hundred and four boxes have already been allotted, and we aim at placing at least another 96 amongst our parishioners. If you would like to help in this way, please ask any of the Church Officers or your District Visitor, and a box will be supplied you at once. Our objective is £200 by August 21, and, given the enthusiastic support of all parishioners, we feel this is not by any means beyond the bounds of possibility. You will, of course, understand that what you give regularly each month to the District Visitor is for General Church Funds, whilst the Box Appeal is a special effort for the Parish Hall debt.


The hurrying days will soon bring us to another Festival, that of Ascension, on May 26th. Falling on a Thursday, as this great Festival does, and not being a holiday, Ascension Day is very often unrecognised by a great many Church people; but it ranks in the Prayer-book with Easter and Whitsunday, having Proper Psalms and a Proper Preface in the Holy Communion Office. We will observe Ascension Day with full Evensong on Wednesday, May 25 (the first Evensong of Ascension), and there will be a Celebration of Holy Communion at 7.30 a.m. on Ascension Day. There will also be additional Celebrations after Mattins on the Sunday after Ascension Day and on Whitsunday, so that everyone may have an opportunity of communicating at these two great Church Festivals.

As an Act of Fellowship, and in the belief that the things that unite us in Christian service are greater than any mere differences in forms of worship, the members of the Petersham-Stanmore Ministers' Fraternal have agreed to an interchange of pulpits on Whitsunday Evening, June 5th. The preacher here on that occasion will be the Rev. J. Robertson, M.A., minister of the Petersham Baptist Church. I feel sure that All Saints' people will, by their presence at that service, give Mr. Robertson a great welcome.

The special Synod summoned to consider the winning design for the proposed extension and enlargement of St. Andrew's Cathedral, resulted in a compromise, whereby a Special Committee is appointed, consisting of fifteen members of Standing Committee and fifteen members appointed by Synod. It was also agreed that all matters relating to the new Cathedral stand adjourned until the next Synod

One cannot possibly form an opinion upon the winning design until one has viewed the model. When the pictures were first published in the daily press, I was amongst the many who were woefully disappointed; but upon seeing the model and hearing Mr. Pinckney describe it, I revised my opinion very considerably. Admittedly, it is different from anything we have pictured, but that is no real reason why it should be condemned. However, the appointment of a Special Committee is doubtless the best thing, for we can never accomplish so great an undertaking as the building of a cathedral until we are much closer to that unanimity which makes for effective team work. Meanwhile, we shall watch with interest the deliberations of those entrusted with the task.
