PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends,

When Jesus sent out His disciples, He told them to use this greeting - "Peace be in your house" - and so I greet you in like manner. I am sure, like me, you have all praised and thanked our Father for that wonderful day we shared on 18th May. My favourite word is "Come!" and come you certainly did on that day, literally in hundreds, to worship together and share such joyous fellowship. I'm sure the Holy Spirit was with us in a very special way and I pray that such gatherings will become more and more frequent, with more and more attending.

May the blessing of the Father, Son and Spirit be with each of us, as we strive to fulfil our Mission.

INSTALLATION of NSW STATE UNIT PRESIDENT:

On Monday 18th May 1992, more than three hundred women and men gathered at the Catholic Cathedral of Saint Patrick at Parramatta, for the Annual Dedication Service of the N.S.W. State Unit of ACW. It was a very special day, for the Unit was also installing a new President, Miss Phyl McKinnirey.

The congregation was welcomed by the Bishop of Parramatta Diocese, Bishop Bede Heather, who made us feel instantly "at home in the Cathedral, by telling us its history and explaining the points of interest in this lovely building. Of very special interest to us was the Bishop's own banner, with its symbols of his life, ministry and beliefs. The words on the "motto" were taken from the words of the pronouncement of Vatican II and reinforced to us what we already knew about Bishop Bede, that he is vitally involved in the ecumenical movement in New South Wales.

Members of the Executive of ACW took part in the Service and the members of the Council dedicated themselves for another year of witness in ACW. A moving part of this Service is always when the outgoing President hands on the Presidential Bible, having first 'signed off' and then the new President receives from her predecessor her Badge of Office; Joan Tong did this with her customary touch of love and grace.

We felt truly blessed as we took part in the prayers, heard the readings from God's word and enjoyed the beautiful singing. Thank you to our new President Phyl for planning such an inspiring morning. It was truly a Service of Thanksgiving, Commitment and Dedication.

The members of the Catholic Women's League in the Diocese had prepared lunch for all of us in the hall behind the Cathedral. What a marathon effort! And how attractive the hall looked. It was evident that this had been a labour of love for someone admired and respected by these women. Among the worshippers and those gathered for lunch were the Lord Mayor of Parramatta and members of Parliament, as well as family and friends of the President. Her commitment to ecumenical groups and to service in the community was also reflected in the attendance of people from these organisations.

This is the largest gathering of ACW members in NSW in the year, so it was not surprising that many took advantage of the lunch-time to catch up with friends from many parts of

Sydney. There were also women from areas out of the city and 'near-country' people. We also took time to thank those members of the Executive who were going out of office, in particular President Mrs. Major Joan Tong. Her two years have greatly blessed ACW in New South Wales.

So we all went home 'well-content' with the day and inspired for another year of service.

A group of 12-15 year olds worked extremely hard to develop, write and produce a Video about a very different Friday night. It is a story of a young Aborigine girl who follows her peers into abuse of Serepax (a minor sedative) and the resulting dramas and relationship break-downs - a statement about the right to say "no" to drugs, and other pertinent issues. A popular activity at the Y is the Breakfast Club for Women, held at 7 a.m. about once a month. Speakers are interesting and topical. FROM THE NEWSLETTER OF MARLENE GOLDSMITH M.L.C;

In the wake of the Strathfield massacre, the Premier convened a Committee of interested MP's and MLC's to advise him on aspects of violence other than guns, which were already the subject of a special inquiry. A number of us believed that other aspects of violence in society might get ignored in the media frenzy over firearms.

VIOLENCE And The MEDIA:

Of particular concern to me has been the issue of the responsibility of the media themselves in creating a climate for violence in our society. In the movie Total Recall almost 300 people are violently murdered on the screen; it has been estimated that the average child is exposed to well over a thousand killings on TV every year.

The news media sensationalise murder and mayhem, giving them extensive coverage, while ignoring positive news stories. Mass murderers such as Strathfield's Wade Francum are glamorised and their photos and life stories splashed all over the front pages and the TV News. Serious researchers and commentators, including Kevin Waller (former Coroner) are now telling us that such massacres - and violence in general - can only increase in a society fed increasingly on a diet of violence.

VIOLENCE And PORNOGRAPHY:

Research is increasingly showing connections between violence and pornography. In a number of countries, including Australia, rape rates have been found to vary with the availability of pornography. Some academics try to argue that there is more reporting of rape and it may be only the reporting that is increasing. However, societies which have brought in restrictions on pornography, after initially making it more available, have seen dramatic drops in their rape rates.

The last straw for me was a recent 'People' magazine cover depicting a woman as a dog, naked, on hands and knees, in a dog collar and tight leash, with the caption "More Wild Animals Inside." I have since then given the Parliament notice of my intention to bring in a Bill for the Protection Of Children From Indecent Materials - a Bill that will prevent the open display of such covers in public places where children can see them. It is not a Bill about censorship. Those magazines will still be freely available for those who want them. It is a Bill that will allow those of us who wish

it to have freedom from such materials, for ourselves and our children, in public places.

Meanwhile I have met with the Newsagents' Association, who have now advised their members that magazines such as People do not have to be prominently displayed. The newsagents I have spoken with are mostly as concerned about some of this material as I am, and may be very happy to have their customers' support in not putting it in shop windows or on footpaths. If you find any item in your newsagent's to be offensive, request that it be put out of reach and above the eye level of children.

A COURAGEOUS GRANDMOTHER In KOREA:

(From the News Sheet of A.B.M. Women's Auxiliary)

A 69-year old grandmother and her 2 granddaughters are just one of 2500 poor families who will be helped by Australian Board of Missions Auxiliary's 1992 Project, to support the Diocese of Pusan in establishing a "House Of Sharing" in Bansong, a "squatter" area on the edge of the city. Mrs. Seong has supported her grandchildren alone since their father died and their mother abandoned them 6 years ago.

Mrs. Seong goes to the mountain-side each morning at 6 am to collect edible wild herbs used in Korean cooking. After some 8 hours, at 2 pm she returns home and catches a bus to market to find a spot to sell her produce and remains there till it is all sold, often till 7 pm. During this long day the girls, aged 10 and 8, make their own breakfast and get themselves to school. After school they play alone and unsupervised in the streets and alleyways of the area.

The family's home is a rented room of 4 sq. metres. For this she had to pay the equivalent of Aust. \$4,000 key money and the monthly rent is \$A80. She is worried because this key money and rent were to be raised in July; she is also worried as to how long she can continue to look after these girls - her herb-gathering is very difficult work for a woman of her age. Both girls remember their mother and miss her; as there is nobody to supervise them during the day, their homework is neglected which is detrimental to their education, and there is danger in them playing on the busy streets.

The "House Of Sharing" will care for pre-school and school children before and after school; it will have women's education programs, marriage and family counselling, counselling

for the unemployed; also Bible Studies and Christian teaching. The A.B.M. Auxiliary hopes to raise \$30,000 for this project during 1992.

ANOTHER HAPPY STORY from CHRISTIAN BLIND MISSION:

Franck Ismael from the Ivory Coast in West Africa is a 6-yr old boy whose life has been dramatically changed. When we first met him over a year ago, Franck was hungry, aggressive, dirty and dressed in just a few rags. His club-foot meant that he could barely walk.

Franck was introduced to Alexandre, a CBMI-trained rehabilitation assistant. Alexandre began by strapping Franck's foot with a splint and bandage each night, and taught him exercises 3 times a day. After 2 months of intensive care, Franck was able to walk almost normally.

A few months later, when a CBMI team visited Franck's village they found him happy, well-fed, clean, surprisingly shy - yet walking like a normal child. Although he must wear special shoes and keep up his exercises, Franck's grandfather has been able to enrol him into school for the first time. Franck Ismael is just one of hundreds of blind and handicapped people whose lives are being changed every day, in this chain of love that is reaching out to desperately needy folk in the Third World. Generous support is enabling CBMI to change lives.

THE 'FIREPROOF' BOOK:

The Bible has been the most attacked book in history - no other book has known the hatred of so many individuals or groups - and yet the Bible survives.

In the 4th Century the Roman Emperor, Diocletian, outlawed Christianity. All meeting places were destroyed and Bibles burned; he systematically attempted to destroy every copy and anyone found with even a portion received a death sentence. Thousands of Christians perished with their Bibles. On a column he built to commemorate his triumph, he had engraved: "The Name of Christians has been extinguished."

In the 16th Century the Reformation split the Christian Church. Some Reformers began translating and printing Bibles in the language of the people. Such were the circumstances of the time that churches began burning these new translations. Martin Luther's translations were burnt in

Germany; the Bishop of London burned Tyndale's English Testaments outside St. Paul's; Tyndale himself was strangled and burnt in Europe.

In the 18th Century, Voltaire, the French literary genius, said: "I am weary of hearing people repeat that 12 fishermen founded Christianity. I will show the world that one Frenchman is sufficient to overthrow it!" He predicted that within 100 years of his day the Bible would exist only in museums.

Later in the same century Thomas Paine, English free-thinker wrote "I have now gone through the Bible, as a man would go through a wood with an axe and fell trees. Here they lie, and the priests if they can may re-plant them. They may perhaps stick them in the ground, but they will never make them grow."

Modern Atheism: Since 1925, the American Association For Advancement of Atheism (the 4A's) has had the aim "to ensure a complete job in the wrecking of religion" saying "Religion was born of fear, reared by fraud and kept alive by lies; the supernatural does not exist; there is no God; religion deserves no more respect than a pile of garbage."

Adolph Hitler said "I am freeing man from the degrading self-mortification called conscience and morality. I will tear up Christianity root and branch, and annihilate it from Germany... the masses will never be Christian again."

Communism's leaders said "We hate Christians ... Christian love is a hindrance to the Revolution ... our task is to destroy all kinds of religion, all kinds of morality."

Modern Criticism: For the past 200 years the Bible has been exposed to the most sustained barrage of hostile criticism and subjected to microscopic examination by expert minds.

Yet, the Bible survives. It outlives its most implacable foes. The presses that printed Voltaire's books were used after his death to print Bibles. When Communism fell in the USSR there was a great desire by the people for Bibles. It has been said: "The Bible's obituary has been written hundreds of times, but this book has an uncanny habit of turning up at its own funeral!"

Today the Bible is available in 2400 different languages; someone somewhere buys a complete Bible every second, and to this may be added hundreds of millions of Bible portions. The Word of God is "living" and "active" (Hebrews 2:12); it will never perish!
