THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
28th July, 1947.

Dear People of All Saints',

The Festival of the Consecration of our Parish Church draws very near, and we ask the co-operation of every parishioner in making 17th AUGUST a day of real Thanksgiving and Dedication. Thanksgiving for the vision, faith and devotion of those who erected our church, whose lives have hallowed it and whose gifts have enriched it; Dedication of ourselves to the task of further enriching our great heritage, and handing it on to those who shall follow us, not less but greater than we found it.

Our Church speaks to us again at this time, and she says: "What I stand for, and shall continue to stand for through the long centuries to come, is a vision of life: human life centred in and dominated by the vision of God. Here you see life in its true relations, in the perspective of God's purposes, not of man's; here you catch a glimpse of what life might become, and may become when built upon the enduring foundation of faith in God, guided by the divine Spirit, made strong through union with the Son of God, Christ our Lord. Here beauty and strength are combined, soaring aspiration and solid substantial dependability; here the human virtues are taught, and here they are consecrated to the glory of God and the good of men. From within my walls you may look out and see the life and labour of men as God sees them—the vast possibilities that arise for human brotherhood, for social welfare, for honest industry, for co-operation in trade, in production and distribution, in invention and discovery. These can take the place of our present bitter rivalry, deception, domination through superior skill or resources, and the whole divisive, paralysing scheme of things that threatens to destroy modern culture, and along with it all religion and everything that is related to man's higher life, his art, his philosophy, his science, his learning and his moral ideals."

Our Church should be full on 17th August, and it could be, if each one of you will help to fill it. Personally, I find myself becoming saddened when I hear people talking glibly about the "dear old church" who are so seldom found in it; for it is obvious that such easy expressions of affection mean little or nothing. Please communicate with former parishioners to invite them to worship with us on our Festival Sunday. This you may do by sending a copy of this "Chronicle" and drawing special attention to page five.

Will those who have collecting boxes please return them on 17th August? We hope that each box-holder will bring his or her box and present it personally; but if it is quite impossible for you to attend the services, will you help by sending your box by some friend? An envelope for your special offering will be found in this issue for the convenience of those who have no box.

The Annual Festival Tea and Social Reunion will be held on Wednesday, 20th August. With your help we shall maintain the high standard of the Parish Tea, and we look forward to a happy time of reunion. Donations from any who may be willing to give a table or portion thereof, and gifts in kind will be most welcome. Tickets (costing one shilling and sixpence, admitting you to both Tea and Social Reunion) are now available, and may be obtained from your District Visitor, from members of the Women's Guild, and may also be had at the Rectory. The prompt purchase of these tickets will be helpful, for it is by ticket sales that the organisers estimate the number of people for whom it will be necessary to make provision.

As already advised, Confirmation Classes commence during the first week in August. It is most essential that candidates should attend the classes regularly, placing their preparation before all other engagements. Special arrangements can be made for adults who desire to be prepared for Con-

firmation, if there should be any who would not care to join a young people's class. If you are eligible for Confirmation, it is unwise to defer it; take the opportunity which is offered you **NOW**. Confirmation will be administered on Sunday morning, 26th October, and the candidates will make their first Communion on Sunday, 2nd November—our Patronal Festival.

Gifts of white flowers (particularly arum lilies) for the Consecration Festival will be most welcome, and should be left at the Church not later than Saturday morning, 16th August.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

Confirmation.—Preparation classes are now being held at the Rectory each Tuesday and Thursday evening, commencing on Tuesday, 5th August, for boys, and on Thursday, 7th August, for girls; both classes commencing at a quarter past seven.
