**The Parochial Pleasant Evening**, held on Wednesday 26th June in the Town Hall, was worthy of its name. There was a goodly gathering, a capital tea, and an interesting and highly applauded programme. To produce these satisfactory results a good deal of arrangement was necessary, and many generous donors and willing helpers came, as usual, to make the enterprise a success. The Rector expressed the thanks of the wardens and the committee to all who had contributed to the success of the gathering, to those who had generously subscribed towards the tables, to Mr Lenton and the friends who provided the enjoyable programme of music, and to Mr Felix Booth for his mystic moments of skilled legerdemain.

A feature of the programme which met with the appreciation of all who have the welfare of the parish at heart was the addresses by the Clergy present. The Rector explained (at the request of the churchwardens) the new scheme of finance which the wardens and council have introduced, and, concerning which, a circular-letter is being sent to all the parishioners, and showed the necessity for another Curate in order that the work of the Church might be more efficiently carried out. The Rev. R. Rook, Rector of St. Aidan's, Annandale, made a most interesting and helpful speech which we wish all who were absent could have heard as well as those present. The parish is much indebted for his straight talk on Church finance and the duty of every churchman and churchwoman in the matter. His appeal for direct giving and for an increase in the clerical staff will not be easily forgotten, and will, we trust, be also responded to. The Rev. G. A. Chambers, the new Rector of Dulwich Hill, gave a telling speech in which he made reference to the fact that both himself and one of his curates (for

Dulwich Hill has two curates though Petersham only has one) had been church-workers in this parish, and that the relationship between the two parishes was of the most cordial and co-operative character. He commended the work of the Church in Petersham as that which they were emulating in his own parish of Holy Trinity.

The committee of helpers will meet at the Rectory after Evening Service on Wednesday 10th July to settle all matters connected with the Evening.

**Rev. J. E. Watts-Ditchfield and C. E. M. S.**—The past month has been a memorable one for our parish by reason of the visits of Rev. J. E. Watts-Ditchfield, of London, to us on two occasions. Petersham was appointed as the centre for a united meeting of the men of our own and the neighbouring parishes on Tuesday evening 11th June in the Petersham Town Hall. It must be confessed that the attendance was rather disappointing and much smaller than when Rev. H. S. Woolcombe held a similar meeting two years ago. Mr Watts-Ditchfield made a stirring appeal to the men to rally round the Church and strengthen her in her witness for Christ, and after the main meeting held an informal meeting for C.E.M.S. men for advice and prayer. On the following Sunday morning the missionary preached at All Saints' Church to a large congregation many of whom were men; in the afternoon a meeting was held in the School Hall to consider what steps should be taken to follow up the mission, and it was decided to urge men to attend the Wednesday evening service, at which special addresses should be given on matters of interest to churchmen; it was also agreed to hold a Men's Service on the following Sunday afternoon when the Rector gave an address and admitted four new members.

The missionary has given a large number of sermons and addresses throughout the diocese during the month and we naturally ask ourselves— with what result? It is of course impossible to adequately estimate the good resulting from any religious work, but we think that Mr Watts-Ditchfield's visit has had the effect of binding churchmen of all schools of thought closer together in this diocese, and that must be productive of untold good. He has also shown us the need there is for those who are still loyal and devoted to Christ and His Church, to recognise more clearly their own personal responsibility, and not to slacken in the least their efforts to witness for Christ in the public profession of their faith. It seems to us that we must stand shoulder-to-shoulder and each Christian man among us bear in mind that there is a battle before us to 'hold the fort' against the advancing foes of irreligion and indifference, and bring home to our own minds the words of our Lord: "He that is not with Me is against Me".

**St. Augustine's Church.**—The services at our new Church are continuing to be well attended, and the plan adopted by the council of devoting the collections on the first Sunday in the month to the Debt-extinction Fund has been quite justified by the increased offerings. We should be glad if any new members of the congregation who have not yet received a visit from the Clergy would leave their names and addresses, in case they may have been overlooked. A committee of district visitors is being formed who will, amongst other things, report to the Clergy about new residents, cases of sickness or trouble, or offers for Church work and any other necessary information, and will also receive subscriptions to the Church Fund. The next meeting of the Church Council will be held in the Vestry at 8 p.m. on Monday 15th July.
