RECTOR'S LETTER

My Dear Friends,

Easter is with us again with its ringing note of faith and hope, the language of our Prayer Book, and the Scriptures at this season is the language of exultant victory. The Resurrection affects life and experience in ways so revolutionary and far reaching that those who really believe find themselves in possession of a wealth of spiritual power which infinitely exceeds the power of evil in the world around them. The reason Christ robs death of its bitterness, caused by man's unenlightened thought of it as a final ending. In man's experience of the Resurrection life, he sheds abroad the transforming light of his own great new beginning. "The sting of death is sin." The tyranny of sin crushes the very life out of mankind by filling the present with moral loss and degradation, and darkens the future with its attendant fears and forebodings. By Christ's Resurrection the reign of sin was broken. In the words of the late Archbishop William Temple, "The Cross was the devil's worst; but it is God's best." In the Cross evil attempts the overthrow of the power of good, and its defeat was decisive and irreversible. The reign of God stands vindicated. "The riddle of the painful earth" has its answer, creation is redeemed "from the bondage of corruption into the freedom of the glory of the children of God."

As the Resurrection reveals Christ's conquest of Death and sin, so it reveals also that the reign of evil will ultimately be completely abolished. "He must reign" is the exultant conclusion of belief and of our Faith, which grasps the cosmic significance of the Easter victory. "He must reign till He hath put all His enemies under His feet." The victory of the Resurrection is an enduring victory, it survives all shocks, and changes. Time cannot destroy or disturb what has once been firmly established as fact. Let this victory be ours this Easter.

I do hope that all parishioners will come to Church on Good Friday and on Easter Day. This year the services on Good Friday have been slightly altered. There will be a celebration of the Holy Communion at 8 a.m. on Good Friday morning, Children's Service at 10 a.m., and the 3 Hour Service commencing at 12 noon, till three o'clock, and an Evening Service at 7.45 p.m.

Mrs. Johnson, Howard and Patricia join me in wishing you all a Holy, Blessed and Happy Easter,

In accordance with our usual custom, the first meeting of the new Institute year was devoted to Impromptu Speeches. The meeting was held on Friday, 4th March, and attracted a large attendance of members who took a keen interest in the many and varied subjects discussed.

Members also "rolled-up" in large numbers to the meeting held on Friday, 18th March, when our Annual Music Night was held. Although there was more noise than music, all who attended thoroughly enjoyed the meeting.

ALL SAINTS' CRICKET CLUB

With the conclusion of yet another season's cricket, I am glad to be able to report a year of improved play and happy fellowship amongst the players who represent your Church.

The "C" Grade team, as has been reported from month to month in the "Chronicle", had success in the majority of its matches, winning nine, losing four and drawing one, to finish second in our competition. The "D" Grade team, founded by Mr. G. R. Minter, was inexperienced at the commencement of the season, but improved with each match, ending with 20 points. The "D" Grade is played on Saturday mornings, catering for lads under 15 years. This age limit will create a number of vacancies in this side for next season so that we would therefore be glad to hear from any prospective members.

Reverting to the "C" Grade, statistics reveal that Erik Olofsson scored most runs (462), Peter Marshall secured the best batting average (26.2), whilst Erik took most catches (16). Bowling strength improved greatly from last year, and of the 1,834 overs which we bowled, all but five were delivered by seven bowlers, none of whose averages exceeded thirteen runs per wicket. On behalf of the players of both teams, I would like to express my thanks to all our friends and supporters for their assistance and encouragement during the year. OPPORTUNITY IN NEW BORNEO CENTRE

A new step in the C.M.S. work in North Borneo has been heralded by the recent visit of the Rev. Walter Newmarch to Lahad Datu, the second largest town in the C.M.S. area.

Mr. Newmarch recently visited Lahad Datu from Tawau, where he is stationed.

The Church of England has no representative in Lahad Datu and owns no land. It is hoped that shortly land will be purchased and a Church built.

The arrival next month of the Rev. and Mrs. Kenneth Perry, new C.M.S. missionaries from Victoria, will probably enable new work to be done in Lahad Datu.

When Mr. Newmarch visited the town, which has a population of 5,000 (together with another 20,000 in the district) he found a very warm welcome. There were a number of people seeking baptism and others interested in the work of the Church.

MOBILE MEDICAL UNIT IN PAKISTAN

A Mobile Medical Unit—the gift of a number of Australian friends of C.M.S.—has revolutionised village work in the Sukkur District of Pakistan.

The Mobile Unit was taken to Sukkur recently by the Rev. Philip Taylor, with his wife, Dr. Kathleen Taylor and Dr. Judith Terry.

Once a week the Mobile Unit goes out to the villages, staffed by medical and evangelistic missionaries.

Attached to the unit is one tent for the use of the doctor and nurse and another for interviews and dental work. The back of the main truck is a sterilising room and the trailer is used as a general wash room. The opportunity is taken for explaining the Christian Gospel and distributing Christian literature.

INDIAN CLERGYMAN IN TANGANYIKA

The problem of providing a suitable ministry for the many Indians in East Africa may be partly solved shortly by the appointment of an Indian Clergyman to the Staff of the Diocese of Central Tanganyika.

The Bishop of Central Tanganyika, the Rt. Rev. Alfred Stanway, has recently announced a plan to bring a clergyman from the Diocese of Central Travancore, South India, for this work. This will fulfil long hopes in this direction.

A major event in Central Tanganyika recently was the ordination of 12 deacons at Kongwa. The ordination took place on the 20th anniversary of the Bishop's own ordination to the diaconate.
