THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

29th January, 1940.

Dear People of All Saints',

Very soon after this letter comes to you Lent will commence, Ash Wednesday falling on February 7. Lent is not a popular season in the Church; in fact, some find it irksome, because it makes demands upon them. Lent is a period of approximately six weeks, wisely set apart by our Church as an opportunity and a challenge to face facts, and to see things as they really are, starting with ourselves, our own individual lives. It has been called a period of self-denial, or saying "No" to one's self, and to many people the plan of giving up some particular kind of food, or an amusement or two, seems rather futile—something that makes very little difference one way or the other. That is the case, if it means that by so doing we are thinking only of ourselves. There is a type of self-denial which leaves one as self-centred as ever, and it is definitely harmful—but any form of self-denial which leads us to forget self and to transfer our thoughts to other people and their needs, cannot fail to do a two-fold good. Even in Churches you can find people working away in various departments of Church life, with their thoughts not on the work itself, but upon themselves—the cause is just a secondary consideration, the self primary, and they wonder why happiness eludes them so often.

Let our self-examination, as far as possible, concern motives. If we confront ourselves with the Christian character as it is set out in the Beatitudes (S. Matthew v) or in S. Paul's list of the Fruit of the Spirit (Galatians v: 22), and see how far our characters correspond with this, as exhibited in our actions, feelings, plans, and hopes, we shall have a self-examination which is helpful and worth while. The height of unselfishness is to like giving up our own pleasures for other people's welfare, because then the desire itself is sanctified.

On another page I have passed on to you a portion of a message sent by the Archbishops and Bishops to the Clergy of Australia. I ask that you will read it carefully, and do your utmost to respond to its challenge to Australian Church people, living, as we are, in comparative safety. Lenten boxes or envelopes of both the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society are available, and I hope we shall do our share during this Lenten season to meet the need.

No one knows what sacrifices may be asked of us in the year ahead, but the offering of our money—whether we have little or much—seems a small thing in comparison with the offering of men's lives.

All those who are trying to be loyal to Christ and His Church will keep the season of Lent in accordance with the dictates of his or her own conscience, and will gladly respond to the invitation and accept the opportunities our Church provides for the observance of this sacred season, remembering always that behind the call of the Church is the greater call of Christ Himself. What is going to stimulate us to a real repentance is not just shame at our own shortcomings, but a steady, daily practice of companionship with Christ in everything that we do; listening to what He has to say about human life and human destiny, about God and His will for the world, about human evil and Divine love. There is grave danger in these days of other voices drowning the voice of religion. A man may be devoting himself to science or to many another interest which is entirely praiseworthy in its own sphere—it may be art, or politics, or sport—but devoting himself so exclusively that he cannot hear the voice of God. There is nothing wrong with many of the fascinating voices of the modern world, but we have to put first things first. And we dare not forget that many of these voices are frankly pagan, the voices of a secularised world in which God does not count at all, sometimes the voices of men in deliberate rebellion against Him. Make this Lent a time of listening to the voice of God through the medium of prayer, Bible-study, and corporate worship. I hope to arrange a course of special addresses for the Sunday evenings and Wednesdays during Lent.

I am hoping to secure a colleague in place of Mr. Gardner (who concludes his ministry here at the end of January) early in March, but at the time of writing I am unable to tell you anything definite. If he does come to All Saints', he will be able to give more assistance than we have had hitherto, and I shall feel bound to ask the Churchwardens for an increase in stipend for him. They can grant this only insofar as the parishioners respond to the Assistant Curate fund, so I would ask all those who possibly can to assist in this way. It is not possible to run this Parish single-handed; no man should be asked to do it—in fact, if funds were available, there is sufficient work here for two assistant clergymen. Meanwhile, I shall probably have to allow some of our day school classes to lapse for a month, but that will only be where no alternative is possible.

I would ask your co-operation in the Church of England National Emergency Fund (mentioned elsewhere in this issue) with regard to our Church's effort to serve the soldiers in the camps and when visiting the city.

**A MESSAGE FROM THE ARCHBISHOPS AND BISHOPS
TO THE CLERGY OF AUSTRALIA.**

(Referred to in the Rector's Letter)

With the outbreak of war a serious position has arisen with regard to contributions to Missions. In England there is already a fall in receipts, and there is every prospect that English support of our Australian Missions will be seriously diminished, if not withdrawn altogether, and that England herself will require help from us in order to meet her commitments and maintain her Missions. The Secretary of the Jerusalem and the East Mission writes: "England is entirely calm, but it is evident that life in many ways cannot carry on on normal lines. Evacuation of businesses and of individuals from certain areas must affect many private incomes seriously. The difficulties of travelling, due to petrol rationing and curtailed train services, and, above all, the peculiar difficulty of movement after dark during black-out time, is making it almost impossible to hold meetings, and also affects attendances at Church services." In addition to these disabilities there are the immense demands of the war, and the income tax of 7/6 in the £.

It is almost inevitable, therefore, that the New Guinea Mission, the Melanesian Mission, the Diocese of Central Tanganyika, and some of the C.M.S. Missions will be deprived of large sums of money which have hitherto been contributed by England. As an indication of the serious position with which the great missionary societies are confronted, we would quote the fact that the C.M.S. has had to reduce its estimated income by £75,000. The Australian C.M.S. also owes the English C.M.S. over £6,000. The A.B.M. has its own arrears of £9,000 to pay off, and every diocese has its quota to raise for the current year. Obviously, a great effort is called for, in order to maintain the work for which we, as a Church, are responsible. Can the Australian Church, in addition, come to the aid of the Mother Church of England, to help her in other mission fields at this time, as the Dominions have come to the help of the Motherland?

A goodly number of gifts were brought in, also gifts of money. We are very grateful to the donors. During the evening we were pleased to welcome our President, Miss Adams, who returned from her holiday in Brisbane, and the opportunity was taken to present, on behalf of the Guild, a parting

gift to our Curate, the Rev. A. E. Gardner, who is shortly leaving us to return to Canberra. Our Rector, in a happy speech, made the presentation of a white stole, and in the course of his remarks invited others to link up with the Guild and help in the fine work that this band of women of the Parish is doing. Mr. Gardner thanked the ladies for their gift, and also spoke of his work at All Saints' as being of incalculable value to him. Supper, provided by Mrs. Brady's group, brought a happy evening to a close.

The Guild will next meet at the service on Ash Wednesday, February 7, in the Chapel, and this will be followed by a short business meeting in the Guild room.

On Thursday, February 22, Mrs. E. Cranswick, who has recently returned from England, will give a "Travel Talk," at 8 p.m. The Guild invites all ladies of the Parish to be present on that evening.

C.E.N.E.F.—His Grace, the Archbishop, writes:—

"The Church huts at Ingleburn and in the Cathedral grounds are already in course of construction, the latter to be officially opened on February 1 by His Excellency the Governor, and the former shortly afterwards. We are also putting in hand a smaller building at the Royal Australian Air Force Headquarters at Richmond. The united cost of these three buildings, with necessary equipment, will run into about £5,000, of which a sum of £1,500 has already been subscribed by individual donors.

"I would be glad if each Parish in the Diocese would make an effort to collect, on Quinquagesima Sunday or another Sunday in February, a sum of £10. . . ."
